PHASE ONE OF TWENTY FIRST CENTURY PROJECT NEARS COMPLETION

To the oohs and aahs of congregants and visitors alike as they enter the new auditorium for the first time, we are proud to report that the centerpiece of Phase I is now virtually complete. When the last finishing touches are put on the auditorium and the newly refurbished second floor lobby adjoining it, Kehilath Jeshurun and Ramaz will once again have a first-rate facility. The auditorium has many different uses - a room for Ramaz School assemblies and plays, a place for synagogue food functions and Shabbatonim throughout the year, lectures, kiddushim, the celebration of members' and community smachot and many other events that make us the special kind of community that we are. Of course, many people know the auditorium as the place they daven in on the High Holy Days. It took particular skill to make a room that satisfies all these needs in terms of decor, acoustics, lighting and audio-visual equipment and capabilities. Our new auditorium has been successfully designed to meet all these needs in an exceptional fashion.

Complementing the auditorium is a new state of the art caterer's kitchen, able to accommodate the finest caterers' presentations. Each caterer who has visited the facility is most anxious to use it.

One of the most extensive efforts was devoted to the installation of a brand new air conditioning system which provides new capability for the Main Synagogue, auditorium, and social hall and, for the first time, has air conditioned the entire school building as well. New piping should also ensure the best and most efficient use of our heating system in the winter.

The new audio-visual system gives dynamic new capabilities for educational, informational and entertainment purposes and perhaps even for a grand showing of the 1992 Super Bowl Game! The screen GIANT.

Those who have visited the synagogue office over the past few weeks have noticed the new furnishings and decorations are two-thirds of the way complete with a new modular design system. The balance of the work will be completed in the near future. In the meantime, the efficiency and ambience of the KJ office has been significantly improved.

Our star athletes are doing better than ever. The gym has received a complete facelift with new ceiling, new lighting and new, safer wall padding. Our stars will now bounce back even faster.

What's Next?

We expect the next phase of the project to commence in the summer of 1991.

This part of the project will include a painting and restoration of the ceiling and walls of the Main Synagogue. We will refurbish the pews and the carpeting. All ceiling leaks are now being repaired in order to take this next step.

There will also be a complete overhaul of the elevators both mechanically and decoratively. We will see a complete renovation of the first floor bathrooms as well as the woman's bathrooms on the 4th floor, above the ladies' balcony of the Main Synagogue.

We are pleased to report that plans are now in the formation stage for the renovation and refurbishing of the synagogue social hall, library and chapel. These rooms, used heavily by both the synagogue and school, will have a new look and will help complete the effort to upgrade the appearance and usability of our buildings which go back to the turn of the century. The project will be completed on the outside with a new sidewalk.

What Can You Do?

Rabbi Lookstein has been spearheading the drive to raise money to pay for the Twenty First Century Fund project. The project serves two purposes: The funding of the refurbishing project and the funding of the Ramaz Endowment Fund. We had and have a great need to secure the physical plant into one that will serve the needs of the congregation and school into the twenty first century. We must also secure the educational well-being of Ramaz School and, thus, the Endowment Fund is of particular importance.

Rabbi Lookstein has been obtaining outstanding results in gaining support for the Twenty First Century Fund. But much, much more is needed to secure our future. It requires cooperation from all members of the community so that we may complete our efforts in a satisfactory way.

No report on this project would be complete without a tribute to the people who have made it all possible. First, to Stanley Gurewitsch who, as President of the Congregation, has given leadership to the drive for these improvements. Secondly, and most importantly, to Second Vice President Fred Distenfeld and Financial Secretary Stephen J. Kule who, as Chairpersons of the Twenty First Century Fund project, have overseen every

TORAH IM DEREKH ERETZ: THE EDUCATIONAL PHILOSOPHY OF SAMSON RAPHAEL HIRSCH

February 24-Rabbi Haskel Lookstein

Samson Raphael Hirsch, rabbi, leader and writer, was the foremost exponent of neo-Orthodoxy in Germany in the nineteenth century. Hirsch based the name of his educational and religious philosophy upon the statement in the Ethics of the Fathers, "Torah Im Derekh Eretz," the pursuit of the study of Torah together with secular education. This ideal forms the ideological foundation of schools like Ramaz. Rabbi Lookstein will explore the modern applications and ramifications of Hirsch's thinking for educating today's Modern Orthodox community.

IN PRAISE OF THE YETZER HA RAH: AN IRREVERENT LOOK AT PIETY March 10-Rabbi Mark Dratch

Based upon a variety of traditional Jewish sources, including the Talmud, the Tanya, and the writings of Maimonides, nineteenth century chassidic master Rabbi Tzadok haKohen of Lublin, and Rabbi Joseph B. Soloveitchik, Rabbi Dratch will present a model of a religious personality that differs dramatically from the classical stereotype. This model, which may appear irreverent to some, may be meaningful and challenging to many modern Jews.

DR. ZVI ZOHAR TO BE SHABBAT SCHOLAR FEBRUARY 9

We are pleased to announce that Dr. Zvi Zohar will be our first Shabbat Scholar on Saturday, February 9. He will speak from the pulpit Shabbat morning and again at a Seudah Shlishit between Mincha and Maariv Saturday afternoon.

The Scholar

Dr. Zohar, American born, made aliyah with his parents in 1958. After serving in the Israel Defense Forces, he studied for three years at Yeshiva Merkaz HaRav in Jerusalem and then earned degrees from Ben Gurion University and Hebrew University. He now teaches at both institutions and heads the Center for Halacha of the Shalom Hartman Institute in Jerusalem.

Our scholar is a prolific author on history, anthropology and philosophy of halacha with a special interest in halachic responses of Sephardic Rabbis to the challenges of modernization.

Saturday Morning

A Gentile who decides to observe all the mitzvot receives merit but does not count as a Jew. A person born to a Jewish mother is Jewish - even without observing mitzvot. If birth, and not commitment, determines Jewishness, then how is conversion to Judaism at all possible?

Come Shabbat morning and hear Dr.

Zohar's presentation on: CONVERSION TO JUDAISM-HALACHA AND REBIRTH.

Saturday Afternoon

Until the nineteenth century all Jews were "halachic Jews". Then some began to define themselves as "Reform" and in reaction others defined themselves as "Orthodox". To counter Reform demands for radical change, Orthodox Rabbis took the stance that innovation is prohibited. In certain ways, this has constrained Orthodoxy from applying halacha to twentieth century realities.

The development of Sephardic Judaism in areas where there was no Reform Movement provides different halachic responses than were found in the Eastern European Orthodoxy and Orthodoxy which then followed in the United States.

In his talk, Dr. Zohar will describe several fascinating halachic responses to challenges of modernity. He will suggest the significance of these phenomena for Centrist Orthodoxy today.

THIRD ANNUAL SIYUM PLANNED IN MEMORY OF RABBI JOSEPH H. LOOKSTEIN

This past fall, the Congregation once again embarked on the study of all of the books of Tanach in memory of Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein who served this congregation for 56 years from 1923 until his death in 1979. Rabbi Lookstein was also the founder of Ramaz School named after Mrs. Lookstein's grandfather, Rabbi Moses Margolies, who himself, was the Rabbi of KJ from 1906 to 1936.

The program began on Simchat Torah night, following Hakafot Unlimited with presentations by Ramaz students and parents on books of Tanach being studied in the upper grades of the Ramaz Lower School.

We now invite members of the congregational family to select a book of Tanach and to learn all or part of it in preparation for a siyum or concluding ceremony which the congregation will hold on the first night of Shavuot at the annual Shavuot dinner preceding Tikun Leil Shavuot. Shavuot marks the anniversary of the Jewish People's receiving the Torah from God at Mount Sinai.

KJ Dedicates Shabbat Zachor to Homeless!

Shabbat Zachor is a time when Jews throughout the world remember the ruthless attacks that Amalek so viciously carried out against the weak and defenseless Israelites. The Shabbat before Purim recounts how Haman, a descendant of Amalek, planned to destroy the Jewish people.

Shabbat Zachor describes the inhumanity of man and serves as a constant reminder that every generation of the Jewish people must declare that cruelty and hatred must be abolished.

This year on Shabbat Zachor, Friday, February 22, every members of Kehilath Jeshurun will have an opportunity to confront one further suffering that plagues our society now - homelessness!

It is estimated that within New York City there are up to 35,000 single homeless adults, with about twenty-five percent of them mentally ill. This article is not an attempt to analyze the problem of the homeless, nor offer comprehensive solutions. Rather, it is to raise

consciousness in our community.

It is too easy to look the other way, avoid the sight of reality, and put on rose-colored glasses. On Shabbat Zachor we must not avoid the issue. We must show our children that we are concerned with the condition of human suffering and take action to correct it.

And so, on this Shabbat Zachor, as a symbol of our love for humanity, THE SOCIAL ACTION COMMITTEE ASKS YOU TO DONATE THE MONEY YOU WOULD HAVE SPENT FOR YOUR SHABBAT FLOWERS AND GIVE THAT MONEY THROUGH THE KJ SIMCHA SHARING FUND FOR A SPECIAL EFFORT TO AID THE HOMELESS. Should you chose to buy flowers anyway, the Committee suggests an equal matching gift to the fund. All gifts will be given to help feed the poor through various organizations throughout the city.

And if your children ask "Where have all the flowers gone?" - please tell them!
