HIGH HOLY DAY SERVICES FOR ADULT BEGINNERS

We are delighted to report that Kehilath Jeshurun will reinstitute *free* Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services including Kol Nidre night for people with little or no background in Judaism. We are able to do this thanks to a battery of volunteers of the congregation led by our Trustee, George Rohr who have agreed to lead and direct this service.

Running from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. on both days if Rosh Hashanah and on Yom Kippur and beginning on Kol Nidre at 6:45 p.m. attendants will not only participate in prayers but have them as well as holiday ritual explained. There will be Biblical insights, historical oversights, congregational readings and singing. And, of course, the required shofar blowing. There will be lots of opportunities for questions and answers.

In Memoriam

JOHN CASTAGNELLO

A relatively recent member of our congregation, he was taken from us and from his family suddenly and without warning on a Shabbat during the summer.

Mr. Castagnello was a fervent Jew who loved to learn and who enjoyed practicing Judaism. He and his wife, Gail, were extraordinarily proud of their two children, both of whom will be students in the primary grades of the Ramaz Lower School this year. John only wanted the best for his children, to give them the kind of education which would prepare them for an active and involved Jewish life.

A brilliant man, with a wide knowledge of the classics of world literature, he brought to his Judaism a depth of feeling and understanding from which all could learn. His passing leaves a terrible void for his family and for the community.

RABBI NOAH CHODOS

He was a big *talmid chacham* and an outstanding servant of the Jewish community. At one time Rabbi Chodos was a practicing rabbi in the Bronx. More recently, he devoted himself to Jewish causes and to the growth of religious life here in America and in Israel.

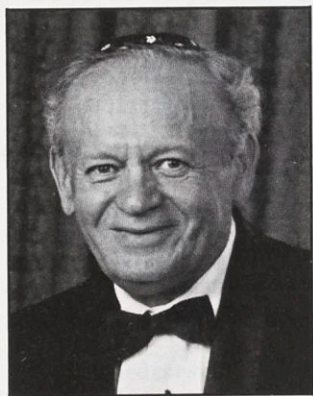
He was a very generous supporter of many important institutions and, in many ways, he exemplified what it means to be an observant, learned and thoughtful Jewish leader.

ADOLPH CITRON

Adolph Citron had been a member of our congregation for over 40 years. A learned and pious Jew, he loved to *daven* in our synagogue and he was very much involved in the well being of our community. A proud father and grandfather of a family which is carrying on his tradition, Mr. Citron was heroically devoted to his family. His two happiest days in his life were in 1940, when he negotiated successfully with the highest German authorities to ransom his sister, brother-in-law and family from Austria and, more recently, when he successfully redeemed a cousin after arduous negotiations with Rumanian authorities.

It was typical of Mr. Citron that no one knew of these heroic efforts. They came to light only by chance and gave us a miniature picture of a deeply committed Jewish gentleman.

Stanley Gurewitsch, President of the Congregation, has announced the designation of Dr. William Major, Benjamin Brown and David N. Kahn as Grooms of the Law for this coming High Holy Day Season. They will be installed in their positions on *Sh'mini Atzeret* morning and they will preside over services at *Simchat Torah* night and day.

Dr. William Major *Chatan Torah*

Better known in KJ as Willie Major, he was born and educated in Hungary. A Holocaust survivor whose dream from adulthood was always to emigrate to Israel, Dr. Major escaped with his widowed mother to the United States after the Hungarian Revolution in 1956. Although already a full-fledged physician in Hungary, he had to take an additional year of medical school here and go through internship and State Boards in order to be able to practice medicine in the United States.

His wife Gabriella, known to us as Gaby, had already been a worshipper in our congregation for three years before meeting Willie. They were married in 1961 and joined KJ 26 years ago. Since that time they brought to our congregation Eugene, Susie, Yankie, Debby. And now Rochelle and Daniel.

A regular member of several Talmud classes at KJ, Dr. Major has always been involved in Adult Education in the community and, together with Gaby, they have led many activities, Shabbatonim and Ramaz events while maintaining a standard of exceptional hospitality to the members and friends at KJ.

An attending psychiatrist at Roosevelt Hospital, Willie is very well respected in his profession and a beloved member of this community. He and Gaby have enjoyed much nachas from their children's education at Ramaz and in Israel and in anticipation of their grandson's entry into Ramaz in the near future. We congratulate the whole family on this much deserved honor to the head of the family.

RABBI LOOKSTEIN'S SHABBAT SHUVA DISCOURSE

"HACHNASSAT ORCHIM: HOSPITALITY AS A MITZVAH AND AS A WAY OF LIFE"

This Shabbat Shuva, September 15, after Mincha services, (6:10 PM) Rabbi Lookstein will devote his Shabbat Shuva Discourse to the mitzvah of *hachnassat orchim* and to an explanation of its expression as a fundamental principle in a Jewish life.

Since the time of our forefather Abraham, Jews have been known for their hospitality. In fact, however, *hachnassat orchim* is not just a way of life; it is an obligation with rules and regulations, limits and parameters.

In halakhic literature the subject is discussed in breadth and in depth. In Aggadic literature it is analyzed for its inner meaning both as an active performance and as a way of giving content to a person's life.

As we begin a new year this mitzvah looms particularly large on the agenda of our congregation as a compelling issue for each of us personally. It is also a major concern in Israel where the Jewish population is being asked to give hospitality to hundreds of thousands of Soviet Jews and to tens of thousands of Ethiopian Jews. Rabbi Lookstein will discuss all of this in a shiur which will be held following Mincha at 6:10.
