

PRIME MINISTER SHAMIR SPEAKS TO PACKED SYNAGOGUE

More than 1,000 people jammed the Main
Synagogue and another 450 filled the
Auditorium while several thousand stood
outside in 85th Street as Prime Minister
Yitzchak Shamir came to KJ under the auspices
of the Jewish Community Relations Council
of New York on Saturday, November 23. It was

an evening for all to remember. The program was chaired by Kenneth Bialkin, Chairman of the JCRC. Rabbi Haskel Lookstein welcomed the Prime Minister, reminding him that the last time a Prime Minister of Israel came to our synagogue on a Saturday night it was Tisha b'Av 1977 and the Prime Minister was Menachem Begin. Rabbi Lookstein also told the Prime Minister that the people assembled in the synagogue to greet him stand solidly behind him and, contrary to the views of some Jews who were surveyed at the GA in Baltimore, feel that the Prime Minister is meeting the challenge of the peace conferences with strength and fortitude, with flexibility and a readiness to negotiate and with a prayer to God that it all turn out well. This is the way Jacob met Essau more than 3,000 years ago and we hope Israel's confrontation with its enemies will come out as happily.

The Prime Minister then delivered a stirring address in which he spoke about his readiness for peace, the need to maintain an Israel that will be large enough so as not to be threatened easily (unlike the situation which existed in pre-1967 Israel) and an Israel that is capable of absorbing hundreds of thousands of Soviet and Ethiopian Jews whose only place of refuge is Medinat Yisrael.

Many times during the course of the evening the audience burst into applause and on several occasions rose to give the Prime Minister a standing ovation, indicative not alone of their approval but of their enthusiasm.

The evening came to a close with our Cantor Mayer Davis singing his beautiful rendition of "My Chiefest Joy." What an evening!

Our apologies to members of the congregation and the community who could not be accommodated. This was not our function and we did not plan it. Moreover, the JCRC had little control over the number of people who would show up. Those who did not get in were, not forgotten and their presence made a profound impression on the Prime Minister and on his entourage.

KJ TESTING SEEKS LIFE-SAVING DONOR FOR LEUKEMIA VICTIM Sunday, December 15

A life-saving bone marrow donor is being sought for Jay Feinberg, a twenty-three year old leukemia victim who needs a bone marrow transplant to live.

Since no match has been found within his family, a worldwide search for a compatible donor is under way. The young man's best chance of a tissue match lies with Jews, particularly those of Eastern European origin.

In order to find a suitable donor, there will be a donor testing drive to which members of all neighboring congregations on the Upper East and West Sides are invited. It will be at Kehilath Jeshurun on Sunday, December 15, from 10:00 AM to 4:00 PM. Candidates must be between the ages of 18 and 55, and in good health.

All testing is free of charge to the donors. Since there is no federal funding for donor blood testing, the family is raising funds through donations. Contributions can be sent to the Friends of Jay Feinberg , P.O. Box 326, West Orange, New Jersey 07052.

We join Jay's parents, Arlene and Jack Feinberg in urging our members to make the marrow transplant "miracle" happen by being tested. ALL IT TAKES IS A SMALL AND SIMPLE BLOOD TEST TO HELP SAVE A LIFE.

It is not that often that we have an opportunity to perform the mitzvah of *Pikuach Nefesh* and to actually save a life. We have that opportunity now. Let us take a chance to give Jay Feinberg a chance!

SAVE THE DATE AND SAVE A LIFE KJ/RAMAZ BLOOD DRIVE Sunday, January 26, 1992

The Annual KJ/Ramaz Blood Drive sponsored by the Parents Council of the school and the Men's Club of the congregation will be held Sunday, January 26th, from 9:15 AM-2:45 PM.

Please come and donate a pint of blood to save another person's life. Let's all help to make this year's blood drive as successful as it has been in the past. Last year 122 pints of blood were donated by our community, which went to help over 610 patients who needed the blood products made from our donations. We urge you to set aside time on Sunday, January 26 to be part of our blood drive.

The Blood Drive committee does more throughout the year. During the past year, our members have responded with additional donations when emergency calls came in to the committee. We are called for whole blood donations for patients from the KJ/Ramaz family and the greater metropolitan area who face blood loss from major surgery and anemia associated with various diseases. If you are willing to donate during the year, please let one of the committee persons know; this is especially true if you did not donate during last year's drive.

We also get calls for Platelet Donors for patients with cancer receiving chemotherapy or undergoing bone marrow transplantation.

This type of donation requires two steps: a screening to draw a couple of vials (a few tablespoons) of blood and the actual platelet pheresis procedure. The 15 minute screening is performed at the blood donor room of the hospital where the patient is treated, and if your platelets can be used, an appointment for the 1 1/2 to 2 hour procedure, will be arranged at your convenience. If you are willing to be a platelet donor, please call one of us to be placed on the special platelet donor list, so that you can be called when the need arises.

We urge you to set aside time on Sunday, January 26, to be part of our blood drive. As always, brunch will be served. The New York Blood Center staff will make a special effort to ensure a quick and painless donation. If you are available for either whole blood or platelet donation during this year, please let us know as well. Our thanks are extended to those who have responded and to those who are polite to our committee when we call upon you.

RABBI LOOKSTEIN TO ADDRESS HALAKHIC ISSUES RELATED TO BRAIN DEATH AT SHABBAT SCHOLAR LECTURE ON JANUARY 11

On Shabbat morning, January 11, Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun will inaugurate the first in a series of Shabbat Scholar Lectures to be given by Rabbi Lookstein, Rabbi Dratch, and other invited guests during the course of the year. On a Shabbat Scholar day we will complete our service by 11:00 o'clock and the lecture will follow immediately thereafter, concluding by

On Shabbat morning, January 11, Rabbi Lookstein is planning to discuss a raging controversy in the Orthodox community on the subject of brain death. The question is:

does death come when all brain activity ceases, or must it wait for the cessation of breathing - with or without artificial stimulation? The implications of that controversy include whether vital organs can be harvested for transplanting, organs which require the breathing mechanism to be maintained until the organs are harvested for use in another body. Another of the implications also involves the signing of living wills and the nature of the will to be signed.

The entire community is invited to hear an analysis of this subject at the Shabbat Scholar Lecture on January 11, 1992.

Dr. Zorenberg teaches and lectures widely in Israel on Biblical topics. People come from all over the country to hear her because of her extraordinary combination of Bibical knowledge and literary analysis. MaTaN - the Women's Institute for Torah Study - is based in Jerusalem where it provides advanced study to women, special programs for new Soviet *olim*, and a scholar's program for young women, mostly from America, who spend a year or more as MaTaN fellows. MaTaN is one of the most remarkable recent developments on the Israeli educational scene. It is headed by Rabbanit Malka Bina who has lectured in our synagogue and who is well-known to many of us.

THANK YOU, SIMCHA SHARING FUND

KJ's Social Action Committee's Simcha Sharing Fund recently made three new generous contributions to Jewish organizations serving those in need.

The latest recipents are the North American Conference on Ethiopian Jewry, the Jewish Board of Family and Children's Services and the Jewish Association of Services to the Aged.

ETHIOPIAN JEWS

In response to our contribution to the North American Conference on Ethiopian Jewry (NACOEJ), its Executive Director, Barbara Ribakove Gordon wrote that the contribution was particularly timely. The nutrition program in Beersheva needs expanding in order to accommodate children in a newly set up caravan camp. The caravans house newcomers from Operation Solomon and they are having great difficulty feeding their children properly in Israel. The recent immigrants do not yet understand how to budget their allowances, and they certainly do not realize that a slice of Israeli white bread does not contain the nutrients of the homemade injera they fed their youngsters in Ethiopia. Our funds will not only help feed the children, but teach their mothers and fathers how to buy inexpensive, nutritious foods in Israel, and prepare them in modern kitchens.

Those working with Ethiopian Jewry were afraid that the concern of American Jews would drop sharply when most (though not all) of the Ethiopians were rescued.

There was a fear that the funds and attention needed to gives then a start in an overburdened Israel would not be there. Our contribution, therefore, gives not only help, but hope.

THE JEWISH AGED

In response to our contribution to the Jewish Association for Services for the Aged (JASA), David Stern, Executive Vice President wrote that the contribution will enable JASA to serve an additional 182 hot, kosher meals to the homebound, frail, elderly Jews that they serve. He further commented that at a time when their public funding sources continue to reduce the support for lifeline services, contributions from groups such as ours help close the gap and maintain their vital services.

IBFCS

The contribution to Jewish Board of Families and Children's Services was made in response to a call for funds to aid their direct services to the AIDS Respite Program.

The Friends of Refugees of Eastern Europe, F.R.E.E., distributes clothing to Soviet Jewish immigrants and from time to time to Israelis who are in desperate need. Every week, hundreds of people arrive in this country in need and F.R.E.E. is helping them.

The clothing should be clean and in good condition.

In addition to organizing clothing and furniture collections for Russian refugees, the organization also serves these emigrees with circumcisions, bilingual yeshivot, bar mitzvah preparations, weddings, Judaic literature in Russian and Passover sedarim.

We encourage our members to take advantage of this drop off service at KJ in order to do the mitzvah of helping other Jews in need.




