COMMUNITY LEAGUE

I. S. Looses Triangular Meet

Although the day was intensely hot, a small group of loyal I. S. members performed gloriously in the Community League Meet on June 7th. In spite of the fact that our best men did not appear, we placed second with 53½ points against 63 for Emanuel Sisterhood. The Jewish Center of the E. S. took third with 37½ points.

Moe Levine, Al Solomon and I. Lubowitz were our whole Senior team and they scored 8, 4 and 3 points respectively, besides placing second in the Senior Relay with the aid of Abe Klinger.

Marvin Richwald was high scorer for the meet with 13 points, with a first in the running broad jump and the high jump, second in the 70-yard dash and second in the relay.

Saslow won a fine victory in the 440-yard run. Leff took a point in the 70 and second place in the broad jump, while Markowitz scored a point in the broad jump.

The Relay took second.

In the Junior division, Garbulsky took second in the 50-yard dash, Polansky third in the standing broad, and the relay placed second, losing by a foot.

In all our team made a fine showing and the boys that took part deserve much credit for their fine spirit.

INSTALMENT NO. 5

The aggregate of the indebtedness or demand of the memorialist against the Government and of the moneys advanced to the public men of the Revolution, as shown by the papers and recognized by all the committees of both Houses which have examined the same, may be stated thus:

Government obligations of the various species before stated	\$353,729.43
Specie advanced at various times to Superintendent of Finance	211,678.00
Haym Salomon's six promissory notes 34-758 18s. 2d., or in Federal currency, say	92,600.00
Making a total of	658,000.43

Besides the note of \$20,000, evidently loaned to Robert Morris, and the \$10,000 and upwards advanced to Don Francisco Rendon, the ambassador of Spain, an indefinite amount advanced to many of the most devoted men of the Revolution, which is not enumerated or claimed by the memorialist.

In former reports in favor of the memorialist it has been recommended that a bill be passed appropriating to him the amount of Government obligations held by his father at the time of his death, viz: \$353 729 43, except the report of this committee made at the last session.

The intense humidity confronts a serious problem in the way of suggesting good books. Success is assured only by the amount of chills the "papyrus" can give. We are therefore listing for our readers' comfort "The Return of Peter Grimm" by David Belasco and "Loyalties" by John Galsworthy.

THE RETURN OF PETER GRIMM

BY DAVID BELASCO

This play is an out of the way production not involving a universal appeal, nor attempting to moralize. Neither has it any characterization of general natures. Barring these, the play is excellent. The theme includes the death of said Peter Grimm and his attempted spiritual return as agreed upon before death. It is accompanied by many gusts of wind and rainy weather, which sounds rather cooling. However, the intelligent reader will find much food for thought evidenced throughout as in the question: "Is the practice of choosing a mate, by parents or guardians, without assent from one involved, practiced?"

LOYALTIES

BY JOHN GALSWORTHY

This is unquestionably one of Galsworthy's best attempts in the field of playwriting. As the name suggests, one finds many types of loyalties, that of loyalty to profession, loyalty to class, religion, husband to wife and to friend. The plot is woven about a young Jew who accuses an acquaintance of robbery. Into the play enter the several loyalties, which when destructive, are in turn destroyed before justice, or if constructive help magnify the philanthropic sentiment in man.

Incidentally, the interest in the play does not wane but is intensified continually.
