SISTERHOOD HOLD GET-TOGETHER LUNCHEON

Splendid Tribute Paid to Mrs. Goldstein

The Institutional Synagogue Sisterhood held its second annual get-together luncheon at the Synagogue building last Wednesday.

Mrs. Annie R. Morris, delivering her presidential message, said in part: "It is indeed a pleasure to speak on so rare and joyous occasion, and as I look around and see the contented and sisterly feeling we have for one another, I know that the Sisterhood has not been in vain. As I look back the seven years that I have been associated with this institution, it reminds me greatly of the seven-branched candle stick lit up in its glory of God. Each socket a symbol of the faith we so proudly uphold. We cannot conceive what a superstructure of strength our sisterhood means. How, during the Pass-over, we investigate the wants of the needy, trying in our humble way to appease the hunger of those Jews less fortunate than ourselves, with Passover supplies, money and clothes.

"The I. S. Succa, built under the auspices of our sisterhood, is another deed worthy of note. Cakes, wine, fruit and challos being donated by many and three to four hundred people attending the Synagogue those days and making Kiddush. On Shevouth, that glorious holiday with its extremes of sadness and joy, we decorate and beautify the Synagogue with flowers. Every year we hold a bazaar, but 1925 changed it to a rummage sale, the proceeds of which is turned over to the Building Fund, and which will be read to you later in the Treasurer's report."

THE JEW IN AMERICA

IN AMERICAN LITERATURE

Thyra Samter Winslow, whose most notable work is "Picture Frames," is still a comparatively young author. She has an uncanny acquaintance with rural American types which predominate in the stories she has written.

Anzi Yezierka, author of "Hungry Hearts," "Salome of the Tenements," etc., is a young Russian Jewish immigrant who with amazing rapidity has made herself a master of the language. Miss Yezierska worked her way from the sweatshop to a well-established place in the American literary world.

Rose Gollup Cohen has to her credit a career strikingly akin to that of Miss Yezierska. She, too, is an immigrant girl, having arrived in America at the age of twelve. She worked fourteen hours a day in sweatshops until the age of seventeen, when she went to the hospital to recover her health. Here she stayed three months and learned to read English from the Bible. Her "Out of the Shadow" is an autobiographical narrative, replete with human interest. This volume has been translated into French and Danish. Her second volume is entitled the "Voice of the Sod."

Mary Antin has won fame with the "Promised Land."

Joseph Anthony (Rosenblatt) is the author of two novels "Rekindled Fires" and the "Gange."

One of the most significant of the Jewish American novelists is Abraham Cahan, whose "Rise of David Levinsky" and the "White Terror and the Red" are in some respects real works of art.

There are also a number of other Jewish novelists—Sydney Nyburg, Octavus Roy Cohen, Elias Tobenkin, Ezra Brudno, Robert Simon, Viola Brothers Shore, Herman Bernstein, Robert Nathan, Maurice Samuel, author of "The Outsider," "Whatever Gods," etc.

In the field of literary criticism, Albert Mordell, Isaac Goldberg and Joel Springarn play prominent roles. Mordell is the author of "Shifting Literary Values," "The Literature of Ecstasy," "The Erotic Motive in Literature," etc. Mordell is essentially an exponent of modernism in the literature of today. It was the work of "Date and Other Waning Classics" that George Brandes, the world's greatest literary critic, wrote "If I had originally any scruples against your fundamental ideas, these scruples completely ceased when I thoroughly examined the execution of your plan. Now I am of your opinion. It is necessary to say once for all that these books of the past no longer conform to our intellectual needs.

"You have had the courage to say so frankly. Even if they attack it at present, in the near future, and not at all in the distant future, they will be grateful to you for having said it."
