A large crowd is expected to attend the debate this Sunday evening between the Institutional Synagogue and the 92nd Street Y.M.H.A.

The members of the house have promised to support the team and will be present to witness the presentation of the Championship Trophy and Debating Medals to the winners of last year's winning combination. The last debate with 92nd Street "Y" was held at their institution about four years ago. At that time the two teams met for the purpose of determining the championship, which went to the Y.M.H.A. team. This time the I. S. team meets 92nd Street "Y" in our auditorium, and as the champions of New York City for 1926.

Hon. Isaac Siegel, president of our institution and a director at 92nd Street "Y," will preside. At the time of going to press the two judges who have accepted invitations are Hon. Leopold Prince, a judge of the Municipal Court, and Hon. Max Salomon, Assistant District Attorney of New York County in charge of Commercial Frauds Bureau. The debate will start promptly at 8:15 P. M. The debate will be followed by a Victory Dance given by the Intermediate Council in the gymnasium. The topic is: "Resolved That The Policy of the United States of Isolation and Aloofness From European Affairs Has Been Harmful to American Interests." There will be an instrumental concert program by Elias Cohen, of the True Pals Club, violin soloist, and Robert Kroll, of the Abraham Lincoln Club, piano soloist.

DAUGHTERS TO BE HOSTS AT FORUM TONIGHT

Intermediates Discuss Present-Day
Problems

The Daughters will be hosts tonight at the regular Friday Forum circle. They have planned a splendid program, and a large crowd is expected to attend.

Last Friday night the Intermediate Clubs discussed the topic, "The Problems of Modern Youth; Some Solutions." The three speakers who introduced the discussion were Paulint Kussoff, of the Ko-Hart Club, Jessie Grossman, of the Alhoa Club, and Alexander Katzowitz, of the Parlex Club.

They spoke at length concerning what they believed to be the most pressing and current problems. One of the speakers ascribed the difficulty of the modern youth today to the lack of understanding on the part of the parents. Another speaker attacked the matter from the viewpoint of an evolutionary fault, feeling that the gradual process of assimilating the Jewish immigrant was responsible for most of the problems. Still another argument was that the boys and girls should be given a clearer understanding of the beauty of religious worship.

Mr. Sidney B. Alexander then supplemented these remarks with a summary of these problems and a suggestion that a clearer understanding of traditional Judaism concepts would be the most adequate solution. He also stated that more solutions could be found in the Bible than in any other institution, dogma or manuscript.

After the usual summary by Mr. Sylvan Saffren, refreshments were served by the Alhoa Club.

NEW RABBI TO BE INDUCTED AT CONGREGATION TALMUD TORAH OF FLATBUSH

Rabbi Goodman Is Honored

The installation of a new Rabbi at the Congregation Talmud Torah of Flatbush, one of the leading Orthodox Congregations of Brooklyn, Sunday, February 13th, 1927 at 2:30 in the new synagogue recently completed by the Congregation at 1305-25 Convey Island Avenue, at Avenue J, is calling forth elaborate preparation to make the event a Red Letter Day in the history of Brooklyn Jewry, and this well known Congregation.

The new spiritual leader of Congregation Talmud Torah of Flatbush is Rabbi Isadore Goodman. He is a native of Palestine, although he received his education in the United States. Rabbi Goodman comes from Beth El Congregation, Indianapolis, formerly occupying a chair in Semitics at Butler University, and previously Associate Rabbi of the Institutional Synagogue of New York.

The installation exercises will commence at 2:30 after religious services have been held, and the new incumbent being inducted by the President of the Congregation, Isadore H. Pankin, assisted by a number of outstanding Rabbis of this city. Among them, Rabbi M. Z. Margolis, Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein of the Institutional Synagogue. Rabbi Leo Jung of the West Side Jewish Center of New York, Rabbi J. Levinson, President Mizrahi Organization of America, as well as a number of prominent laymen, among them: Judge Alexander H. Geismar, Senator Philip Kleinfeld, Congressman Sol Bloom, Honorable Isaac Siegel, Hon. Albert Oettinger, Attorney General State of New York.

Rabbi Goodman's inaugural address to his charge will be on the subject of Modern Judaism and Orthodoxy, after which a dinner is to be tendered to the Rabbi in honor of the occasion, at the Hebrew Academy of Borough Park, 1363-50th St., Brooklyn. Rev. Joseph J. Gold, cantor of the Congregation will render musical selections.

Among the special guests who have been invited are: Hon. James J. Byrne, Borough President of Brooklyn, Judge Harry E. Lewis, Judge Edward Lazansky, Judge Mitchell May, Hon. Joseph Barondess, and the well known communal worker, Bernard Semel.

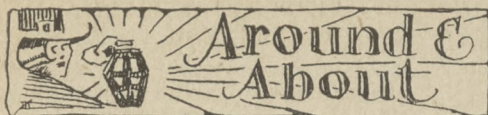

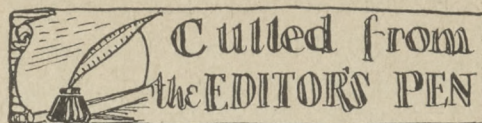
Sisterhood Holds Bridge Party

ABRAHAM LINCOLN

Abraham Lincoln, that man among men, was born February 12, 1809, in Kentucky. His father could not read and could barely write his name; his mother, however, could read and write.

Lincoln's life is more interesting and engrossing than the best story of fiction. We are all aware of the sensational growth of this gawky boy, frontier pioneer, to the presidency of the United States. Lincoln early made a name for himself upon his election to the U. S. Congress in 1846. Perhaps the most interesting and outstanding event of his brilliant career was the Lincoln-Douglas contest for the U. S. Senate. The climax of these debates revolved themselves into a pro-Lincoln boom, that eventually paved the way to the White House.

One purpose of this editorial is to bring out through the fine character of Abraham Lincoln his great theory of unity. Before the sensational nomination convention, above referred to, Lincoln called some of his friends together and said to them: "A house divided against itself cannot stand. I believe this government cannot endure permanently half slave and half free. I do not expect the union to be dissolved; I do not expect the house to fall, but I do expect it will cease to be divided. It will become all one thing or all the other."

Lincoln has always been and remains a respected character in American history, in this respect we can truly say—It certainly would be a finer world if there were more Lincolns about us.

This Is Boost Year for I. S.

THE JEW IN AMERICA

IN PUBLIC AND RELIGIOUS LIFE

A number of individual Jews have participated in the movement for a greater democratic organization of industry. Henry A. Dix, a wealthy manufacturer of women's garments in New York City, has deliberately turned over, with the assistance of his sons and heirs, a million dollar concern to his employees. Edward Hochhauser of the Altro Manufacturing Company has done pioneer work in the assistance of invalids. His factory is unique in that it gives employment to none save tuberculosis sufferers. Adequate provisions are made for the safeguarding of the health of the convalescents. Located at the top of a loft building it is equipped with a kitchen, rest room, steamer chairs and much of the paraphernalia of a convalescent institution. Food is served at cost price.

The Weinstock-Lubin Company, of which David Lubin was one of the partners, has been reorganized on a completely democratic basis. In 1919 the Board of Directors recognized the right of employees to have a share in the management. Now it has become practically a co-operative concern with the complete management vested in a Board of Directors chosen from the employees.

Other firms have followed in the pathway of the pioneers, who, to eliminate industrial conflicts, have reorganized their institutions. The Hart Schaffner Marx Company, the world's largest manufacturers of clothing, have a managing committee composed of representatives of the firm and delegates elected from the workers. The Sydney Blumenthal Company, owners of the Shelton Looms, Shelton, Conn., have instituted an industrial democracy modelled on the American form of government. Delegates from the employees constitute a House of Representatives, the foremen constitute a Senate, and the Cabinet consists of the managers. Measures concerning the welfare of the organization are discussed and passed by the three bodies.

Meyer Bloomfield is a high authority on industrial relations and Miss Rose C. Feld has written an illuminating work on "Humanizing Industry." Another authoritative writer on the subject of welfare and industry is Kee L. Frankel, who in conjunction with Alexander Fleisher, wrote the "Human Factor in Industry."

Frankel is a vice-president of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company and has distinguished himself in welfare work. He is president of the American Public Health Association, the New York State Conference of Charities, etc. He has been influential in organizing the National Health Council. Recently he was invited by the American government to draw up plans for welfare work among the 300,000 postal employees.

The Federal Reserve System, an epoch making piece of financial legislation which stabilized the flow of money and reduced to a minimum the possibility of financial stringency, is the child of the brain of Paul Warburg. It has been called the greatest financial measure since the days of Alexander Hamilton. Warburg is associated with the house of Kuhn, Loeb & Company. He is Vice-President of the Federal Advisory Council of the Federal Reserve Board, director of the National Employment Exchange, Treasurer of the Institute of Musical Art, and is active in a host of enterprises having philanthropic and cultural purposes.
