Off to a side are two spread copies of the last "Institutional," replete with news of the Building and news generally Jewish.

The Library Placard

One feature that does much to lighten the task and whet the interest of the average Sabbath-goer is the Library Placard that is kept up to date with news and references of a lightly entertaining and pleasing order. On a Sabbath morning it is not unusual to see three or four individuals huddled together, their eyes intently taking in all the culled news items that is the limited offering of this source.

Juvenile Delinquency is on Decrease, Authority Says

Gin fizzes, wild parties, excessive smoking and riotous living—said by moralists to be responsible for the rapid increase in juvenile delinquency—in reality have nothing to do with it.

That is the opinion of Dr. H. N. Adler, of Chicago, noted criminologist. "It's a mistake to think that boys and girls of today are any worse than in previous generations," said Dr. Adler. "As a matter of truth, juvenile delinquency is on the decrease all over the nation."

"The critical age in young people is from 17 to 25," he said. "It is during this stage that our most dangerous criminals are developed. Our purpose in searching for criminal tendencies in children is to protect the community and make it a safe place to live in. The State does not want revenge; it wants adequate protection."

Watch for Cruelty

"Schools should be on the alert for criminal tendencies in children. When a little child enjoys being cruel to animals, it is time to watch that child. Callousness and cruelty are sure indications of a criminal instinct."

"An ideal solution would be a two-way State institution—between the State Reform School and the State Prison—where individuals who are not hardened criminals could either be restored to society quickly or placed behind the bars."

Parole vs. Probation

"Parole is more successful than probation, because it continues penal authority and watchfulness after the prisoner is released."

**SUNLIGHT AND FOOD BETTER THAN
 SALVES AND PLASTERS**

For preventing colds this winter a prescription which is pleasanter and generally more effective than salves, plasters or other so-called cures for colds is suggested by the New York State College of Home Economics at Cornell University.

This up-to-date prescription the college recommends beginning at once. It is a combination of plenty of fresh air, sunlight whenever possible, foods containing bulk and those rich in vitamins.

Colds need no longer be feared or considered necessary winter ills if these simple rules are followed.

Fresh air, because it stimulates food circulation, is an effective weapon against colds.

Proper Elimination

Bulky foods are necessary for the proper elimination of waste from the body, an important item in keeping up general good health. Fruits, vegetables and whole cereals are the best foods for supplying bulk.

Foods rich in vitamins which should appear regularly in the diet are milk and milk products, spinach and carrots, tomatoes, eggs (especially the yolks) and cod liver oil.

The wrong clothing is often a cause for colds. Heavy dresses and wool underwear are too warm for modern homes or school-rooms kept at a warm temperature. A person dressed too warmly inside may perspire and on going outside be chilled. Thinner clothing and heavier outside wraps are often a more healthful arrangement.

**AGRICULTURE ON FIRM BASIS AS
 INDUSTRY IN JEWISH COLONIES**

**Experiment Successful in Crimea and
 Ukraine**

Welcome news indeed is the fact that the agricultural experiment in the Crimea and Ukraine, which fosters Jewish colonization in these countries, is now on a firm business basis and is no longer classed as a philanthropy.

Mr. James Rosenberg, chairman of the \$10,000,000 Russian Colonization Fund, announced that in the short period of five years the Jewish colonies have become self-supporting and that even this year's poor crop will not undermine their morale.

This \$10,000,000 fund should really be looked upon as a long-term loan, the dividends being the knowledge that Jewish self-respect is thereby enabled to be strengthened and that economic stability has thus been realized by thousands of afflicted brethren.

The Palestine work, too, is beginning to take on this aspect of self-sufficiency. Thousands of Jews have been re-established and have become self-respecting citizens of the Jewish homeland.
