HIGH SCHOOL AUTHORITIES NOW SANCTION SEMI-RELIGIOUS ORGANIZATIONS

Dr. William J. O'Shea, Superintendent of Schools, in an address on April 2, to high school principals, announced that organizations of a semi-religious nature, such as Menorah, Hatikwa or Habonim, may, under faculty supervision, be founded among the students attending the public high schools.

In the past, many of the high school principals had refused to permit these societies to operate in the absence of a specific authorization from the School Superintendent's Office, notwithstanding that no rule ever existed against their creation.

THE QUESTION BOX

(Conducted by Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein) Do You Believe In Early Marriage?

I certanly do. Judaism urges early marriage, first, because it serves as a prevention against immorality, and second, because it is most constructive for the upbuilding of the individual. Early marriage brings with it the responsibility of home building and of communal obligations. It leads to courage, ambition, and all the nobler strivings of life.

I have just been reading "My Concept of God," symposium of those considered big in religion. I would like to know yours.

My concept of God is personal. He is unseen yet real. Man writes history and God rights it. My God is all powerful. To Him I speak daily in prayer, and His will I seek at all times. His will is presented very clearly to us through His law, our Holy Torah. My conception of God is expressed in the Odon Olum hymn, the translation of which follows:-

"He is Lord of the Universe, who reigned ere any creature yet was formed.

At the time when all things were made by His desire, then was his name proclaimed King.

And after all things shall have had an end, He alone the dreaded one, shall reign; Who was, who is, and who will be in glory. He is One, and there is no second to compare to Him to consort with Him:

Without beginning, without end: to Him belong strength and dominion.

He is my God-my Redeemer liveth-and a rock in my travail in time of distress. And he is my banner and my refuge, and the portion of my cup on the day when I call.

Into His hand I commend my spirit, when I sleep and when I wake;

And with my spirit, my body also; the Lord is with me, and I will not fear.

RABBI GOLDSTEIN EXPLAINS THE LAWS CONCERNING THE COUNT-ING OF THE OMER

- 1. The counting of the Omer is begun from the second night of passover. It is counted whilst standing. This commandment is performed in the beginning of the night, yet the entire night is the proper time for its performance. On the nights of Sabbath and festival, the Omer is counted in the synagogue after the Kiddush has been said. At the conclusion of Sabbath and festival it is counted before the Habdallah is said, in order to say the Habdallah
- 2. If one had forgotten and did not count the entire night, he should count in the daytime without pronouncing a blessing thereon, but the following night he should pronounce a blessing thereon, but the following night he should pronounce a blessing when counting, but if he had forgotten to count that entire day he should count every night thereafter without pronouncing a blessing. If he is in doubt as to whether he had counted the previous night or not, although he did not count on the following day, he may nevertheless pronounce a blessing when counting on the remaining nights.
- 3. If one is asked, at twilight or later, previous to counting the Omer, how many days are to be counted on that day, he should tell him the number of days that were counted on the previous day, for by mentioning the number of days to be counted on that day, he will afterward be forbidden to pronounce a blessing when counting the Omer.
- 4. Before one pronounces the blessing, he should know the number of days to be counted, however if one did not know it, and pronounced the blessing with the intention of counting as he will hear his neighbor count, he has also fulfilled his obligation, likewise, if one pronounced the blessing with the intention of counting four days and was afterward reminded that he must count five days, he does not need to repeat the blessing. Likewise, if one erred in counting and when he should have said "six days" said "five days," if he was immediately reminded thereof, he should count properly and he is not required to repeat the blessing, but if he had paused slightly he is required to repeat the bless-
- 5. Neither men nor women should do my work during the days that the Omer is counted, from sundown until after the organized Silver Star Club. This group Omer has been counted.

The above cards must be mailed into the office before April 30th, preferably sooner, so that they may be had for the Memorial Services.

- 6. One should not marry on the days that the Omer is counted, nor should one have his hair cut, but the Sandek, the Mohel, and the father of the son are permitted to have their hair cut on the day before the circumcision toward evening. It is permitted to make engagement parties; even to have a feast thereon is permissible on the days of counting the Omer. However, dancing and music are forbidden.
- 7. Up to Rosh Hodesh, Log Be'Omer (the 33rd day of the Omer) and the three days before Pentencost, one is permitted to
- 8. On the first night of "Shebuoth" the evening service should be put off until the stars appear.

The counting of the Omer begins on the second night of Passover, commencing Thursday evening, April 25th, and continues for 49 days.
