OUR GREATEST NEED TO-DAY

ish, but he that keepeth the law, happy is he." (Proverbs XXIX, 18.)

Herbert Hoover, our president, on the administration to him of the oath of office, kissed the Bible with his thumb on the above verse in Proverbs. The President, it seems to me, in the selection of this verse, has stated more clearly our greatest modern need than in the entire detailed inaugural address. A spiritual vision and a reverence for law observance are the two things to be mainly stressed in our day. In our prosperity we have gained riches and power and self-satisfaction, but lost a higher vision, a nobler aspiration.

America is rather a young nation, having just recently celebrated its Sesqui-Centennial. But vision is the earmark of youth. The prophet Joel furnished the real criticism of youth when he said, "Your old shall dream dreams, but your young shall see visions." Old men dream dreams; young men see visions. Old turn to the past: young men look forward to the future. Old men nurse their reminiscences as sitting in the dim light of the setting sun. They reflect upon and live over again the long lost flown years, while young men kindling the beacon fires on the hills of time, watch for the morning ready to greet with morning faces and shining morning eyes, the first glimmer of the hoped for and awaited dawn.

I should want to see my people again become young in accordance with the prophet's conception of youth. I would want to see it rise above the tides of time. I would want to see it once more a people

"Where there is no vision the people per- | that has and believes and relates not only of a glorious past, but a people whose present justifies the beliefs in a glorious future.

> Especially our truly young who in life possess all the vitalities and qualities of youth, let them cultivate a vision. Let them acquire the soul of the nation, the soul saturated with the word of God. With hope, faith, vision, old men are young; without these, young men are old. May we all show ourselves that we are truly young, and thus we will lay claim to the prophetic Divine promise of (Hosea, Chap. II, 1) "Ki naar Yisroeil veiohaveihu." When Israel is truly young, and when the truly young are Israel, I love each one of them. Indeed Herbert Hoover has with his thumb pointed to our need. Vision and law observing. Education alone does not provide us with these things. The Religion supplies that want.

Addition of More Activities To S-E Dept. Program Receives Encouraging Response

Music Courses, Advertising Class and Piano Instruction Classes are Features.

Several more interesting and instructive innovations have been announced by Mr. Shapiro in regard to the Social and Educational Department. Among these is the inauguration of an Advertising class beginning with an enrollment of twenty-five, and a piano instruction group with thirty members. Another activity is the Choral group and Music Appreciation class.

The Advertising class will take up the subject of copy-writing, typography, directby-mail sales letters, circulars, etc. The course will be conducted by Mr. William Shapiro and Mr. Maxwell T. Cohen. These men are well qualified, having taken this work as part of their college courses. Mr. Shapiro will take up the economic and psychological aspects, and Mr. Cohen the more practical points. This course will be offered Tuesday night.

The Elementary Piano Instruction group will be led by the charming Miss Goldman, of the Talmud Torah staff. A nominal fee will be charged. There will be two sessions a week, on Monday and Wednesday, consisting of two classes a session. No more than eight members will receive instruction at one time. These classes will begin with the fundamentals, and at the end of the year a concert by the more advanced pupils is planned.

Our talented Chazan, Zalman Yavneh, assisted by Miss Helen Friedman, of the Gamma Sigma Pi, will direct the Choral group, which will take up the aspects of group choral singing, solo and concert work. Cantor Yavneh promises a treat at the coming Chanukah entertainment program. On Thursday evening the first meeting was held.

The Music Appreciation group, conducted by Mr. Maxwell Cohen, will supplement the activities of the piano and choral groups. A history of music, an appreciation of various musical selections will be taken up. The group will also attend several concerts during the year.

Among the other activities begun this year which are having very successful careers, is the Jewish Culture group led by Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein, in which the "Question Box" is featured. Rabbi Goldstein answers questions put to him during the course of the evening, and intends to publish the questions and answers in the near future. The Leaders' Training course for club leaders takes up the relations of community club work. Lectures of this nature are given weekly by the S-E Department staff members every Sunday evening in the Social Room. On Monday evening the Art and Poster class meets, and on Wednesday night, the popular Dancing class, conducted by the Kosac club.
