I. S. DEBATERS PRIMED FOR CHAMPIONSHIP BATTLE

Brooklyn Y To Be Their Opponents On January 19

The final debate for the I. S. Senior Team will be held on Sunday, January 19th, at 3 P. M. This debate will have as its stake the Metropolitan League Championship and will be fought against the representatives of the Brooklyn "Y."

The subject of the debate will be: "Resolved, That the restoration of Palestine is indispensable to the growth of Jewish culture in the Diaspora." The I. S. representatives, consisting of Messrs. Alexander Sternbuch, Jack Lefkowitz, Irv. Briskin, will uphold the affirmative of the argument.

The I. S. Team were the winners of the Manhattan-Bronx championship and have already debated this subject last year against the Bronx "Y," but on the negative side. These men anticipate a victory because of their acquaintance with the subject matter and because historic facts favor their position.

The Brooklyn "Y" in preparation have interviewed several rabbis in order to secure their viewpoint. From present indications indeed an interesting debate is expected. A large turnout of I. S. is expected on the afternoon of January 19th.

FREE MOVIES SHOWN TO I. S. MEMBERS

Under the auspices of the Social-Educational Department and the Talmud Torah, free moving pictures were shown in the Auditorium last Sunday evening, January 5th, at the I. S. A large and appreciative crowd of youngsters attended.

An industrial picture was first shown depisting the working of the Sheffield-Farms Co. This was followed by an "Our Gang" comedy. These free movies will be shown at least once a month, and it is expected that the next one will also show a popular feature picture. Announcements of the future exhibitions will be made presently.

PREPARATIONS BEING MADE FOR BIG DRAMATIC SHOW

The first presentation of the "Institutional Players," coached by Mr. I. Baron Kapelson, entitled "Razor Blades," will take place on Sunday evening, February 2nd. This is the first attempt of the I. S. to organize a distinct players' group, which is so popular in similar institutions.

As an added feature of the program, a one-act skit will be enacted by the staff members of the S-E Department. This was suggested by Mr. Shapiro as a means of entertaining the audience. Tickets may be secured from any member of the S-E Department staff at the ridiculously low price of 25 cents.

The performance will be staged with special scenic and lighting effects and will entail quite a bit of expense. In order to encourage dramatics at the I. S. it seems that the small subscription fee that it entails is certainly merited by this activity.

BIGGER THAN "GENERAL CRACK" IS THE I. S. THEATRE PARTY

In our peregrinations about town, we have chanced upon that I. S. individual who claims smartly to have seen "General Crack," and who, for that reason, questions whether he should buy tickets for the I. S. Theatre Party. Now, we don't deny that to have seen "General Crack" is indeed to have enjoyed a superlative treat. But, we submit, to have seen "General Crack," with beforehand knowledge of the fact that it is the cinema featuring the I. S. Theatre Party is a social calamity that should call for no evoking sympathy.

REVENUE FOR THE PEOPLE

Big as the reputation of "General Crack" is in its dramatic effect and grip upon the hearts of the I. S. community, it should not be overlooked that bigger by far is the I. S. Theatre Party to be held on the evening of January 14th. "General Crack" will run its course and, like all other perishable things of its kind, will pass into oblivion, having been a means by which the pockets of the producers were fattened and distended considerably. But the I. S. Theatre Party—yes! that already has become an event in the striving and hopeful hearts of hundreds of Jewish mothers and fathers, young men and women—Why? Simply and plainly because the revenue to be derived from the party will be used for the benefit of the people themselves, their children and their ideals, the promotion of Orthodox Judaism and ideal Americanism.

Not even the very individual who refuses to buy tickets because he already has seen "General Crack" will gainsay the nobility and effectiveness of the work that the I. S. is doing. We go a step farther: this very individual, at another time, would offer an encouraging word were the promotion of the I. S. ideals suggested to him. Yet, indirectly, this very individual is doing what he would not do directly. By seeing "General Crack" before January 14th, he is thereby depriving the I. S. of the sale of so many tickets, which, but for his having seen "General Crack" he would have bought in the first instance.

SEEKING TO MAKE LIFE WORTH WHILE

The self must be forgotten for the moment. The onrushing urge of the average New Yorker (and the I. S. member drinks with him at the same fountain from the same chained cup) to see a new play or cinema at the earliest opportunity in order to be the first of a social set or group that is always "in the know" of things, must be stilled for the while.

Let us not overlook that life carries with it certain responsibilities in all its various spheres of activity. Of these spheres of activity, Institutional Synagogue is one of the very essence of life, for the I. S. seeks to make life worth while. If this be true, then, why not co-operate with everything that stands for Institutional Synagogue, especially in a matter that means so little to the individual, yet so much to the Synagogue at large? The I. S. Theatre Party will recur once only, on January 14th; but its benefits will continue as long as we have Jewish children who must be shown the way of Jewish life.
