APATHETIC PROGRESS BEING MADE IN ALLIED JEWISH CAMPAIGN

New York's Quota of \$2,500,000 Well
Towards Realization

The Allied Jewish Campaign which has begun so auspiciously last Tuesday evening at Town Hall is not well under way toward realizing its goal of six million dollars. New York Jewry with its quota of two and one-half million dollars has only made fair progress thus far.

The Allied Campaign is the merger of two great enterprises—the Joint Distribution Committee, together with the Jewish Agency of Palestine organized in Zurich, in August, 1929. The Joint Distribution Committee alone in previous years raised eighty million dollars to feed the hungry, to provide medical care and to rehabilitate Jewish sources of income through credit co-operatives, free loan societies, trade

schools, industrial co-operatives and colonization—a very comprehensive program designed to save hundreds of thousands of Jews from penury and demoralization.

On the other hand, the United Palestine Appeal and other Zionist organizations raised tens of millions of dollars for the rebuilding of Palestine, thus making it possible for many thousands of Jews to become pioneers and strike root once more in the land of our forefathers.

Proves by Interpretations that "God of
Vengeance" Essential for Justice

Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein in his Pentecost sermon on "The Divine Revelation," before the members and friends of the I. S. at the Main building Monday morning (the first day of the Pentecost holiday), replied to the Pope's suggestion that the expression in the Bible "The God of vengeance" be changed into the "God of love," said in part:

"With all due respect to the Catholic Church for its organization, for its power, and for its pontiff, the Pope, let me say that to propose to change even one iota of Holy Writ would be to have human and mortal hands tamper with the Divine and immortal words of God. Furthermore, as to the actual merit of the suggestion, I desire to point out that the Old Testament sides with the righteous and is denunciatory in no uncertain terms concerning the wicked. The righteous need have no fear for "The God of Vengeance."

God is "long-suffering," waiting for the wicked to repent, or as the prophet Ezekiel put it, "as I live, said the Lord Eternal, I have no pleasure in the death of the wicked, but in the return of the wicked from his way, that he may live." But, if there be no repentance, then justice demands that righteousness be vindicated.

Our teachings forbid us to lend the second cheek to the smiter lest wickedness be increased thereby. Punishment, whether we like it or not, is the greatest deterrent from evil. Without it there would be anarchy, with it there is safety, order and peace.

God in his attribute of vengeance needs no apology. To palliate strict accountability is to molycoddle with crime. Those who strive for righteousness need not be scandalized at this divine attribute, just as a law-abiding citizen is not horrified when unwavering justice is meted out by our judges."

COLLEGIATE SABBATH, AIMING TO INTEREST COLLEGIANS IN ORTHODOX JUDAISM, TO BE OBSERVED AT I. S. SYNAGOGUES

Collegiate Sabbath, sponsored by the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America, will be observed at both the I. S. Synagogues this Saturday, June 7th. Joseph L. Freiman, President of the New York Collegiate Branch, will occupy the pulpit of the West Side. Mr. Jacob Schwartzberg will be at the Harlem Synagogue.

The Collegiate Sabbath is being observed by orthodox congregations throughout the country in order to increase the membership of the Collegiate Branch of the U. O. J. C. A., which is composed of young men and women who are or have been students at higher institutions of learning. On that day a sermon with a view to interest the collegiate with the ideas represented by the Collegiate Branch will be delivered by a college man.

The objects of this Branch are to pro-

mote the spread of Orthodox Judaism in general, and especially among those who have received or are receiving the benefits of higher education. The Collegiate Branch bars no one from membership because of his or her non-belief in Orthodox Judaism, but it does require that its officers, who mold the policy of the organization, believe in and practice Orthodox Judaism.

At the present time there are only two such branches—one in Boston, the membership of which is composed chiefly from the student and alumni of the colleges and universities in and around that city; and the other in New York City, whose membership is composed in like manner.

They hope in time to be able to accomplish the resolutions at the last convention, namely, to form added Chapters of this branch, and where that is impossible, to form Young Folks Leagues, who will affiliate themselves either with the Collegiate Branch or the Union itself.

ALLIED JEWISH CAMPAIGN UNIFIED JEWRY

Ever mindful of the responsibility which rests upon American Jewry because of its comparative financial affluence, the Allied Jewish Campaign is now attaining its merited success. The purpose of this philanthropic effort is dual in its character. It aims first to alleviate the horrible conditions that our European brethren are now undergoing, and secondly to satisfy the needs of our growing homeland in Palestine.

Another most significant aspect of the movement has been the unity of all Israel in effectuating the purposes of this campaign. For once there is a jointure of all shades of opinion who are working towards the well being of the Jewish people as a whole. To paraphrase the "Haggadah": "If unity is the only product of the Allied Jewish Campaign, Dayanu."

PURPOSE of the PLAY DAY

A team for everyone and everyone on a team! This is the aim of the new plan for athletics among girls. Wherever it has been tried in the United States it has found favor with athletic directors, and above all, with the girls themselves. The aim, which is thoroughly American and democratic, is, in part, a development of our modern determination to give every girl—and boy, too—an equal opportunity for health. Play, as all progressive educators realize, is an essential factor not only for physical fitness in children, but also for mental growth and poise and for social adjustment. The new plan for athletics to foster in our American youth the spirit of play, has been given the name of "Play Day."

This name focuses attention on the purpose of all athletics—a purpose which many wise people have feared we were in danger of forgetting—which would be relaxation and fun for all, instead of over-exertion for a few, bleacher seats for the many, and too strained intentness for all.

Athletics needs no defense. It has long been established as part of our school and institution system. Only those who have made the winning teams, however, have heretofore had the full enjoyment of athletics. The others, the overwhelming majority of our boys and girls, have found athletics an uninteresting requirement of the schools. They reported to the gymnasium at the appointed hours and went through the appointed exercises. That was the sum total of their athletic outlet. For the rest, they have stood on the sidelines and watched the few at play.

Play days take care of this waste. They prevent it. They give everyone an opportunity to play, and develop in everyone an appreciation of play.

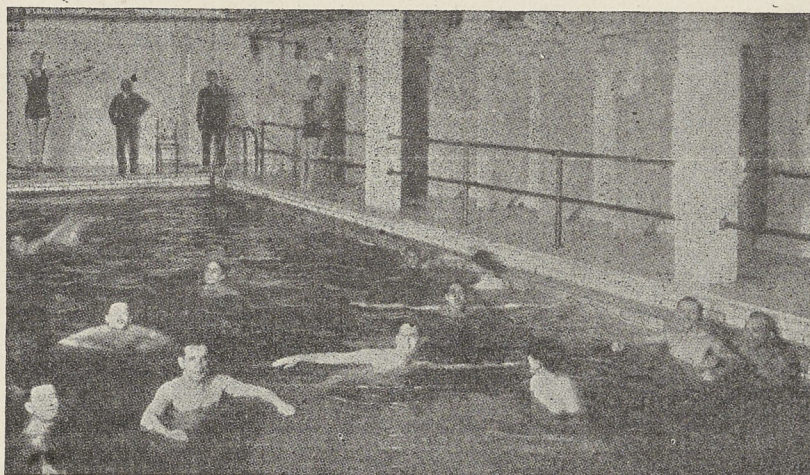
