I. S. EXTENDS SCOPE TO AID
UN-EMPLOYED

Many centers throughout the country have undertaken some program of emergency relief for the unemployed, and it is hardly necessary to point out the obligation of The Institutional Synagogue in common with other communal agencies, to aid in whatever way possible in effective programs of employment and relief.

The following general suggestions were offered us by The Jewish Welfare Board in a recent communication to our Executive Director Mr. A. Bernstein:

1. Unemployed members of the I. S. should be permitted to continue their affiliation and participation in activities without being required to pay dues if they are not in position to do so.

2. In general, as much opportunity as possible should be given to all unemployed young men and young women in the community to utilize the facilities of the Center. It is most important that in times of stress Jewish Centers should play their part in sustaining the morale of young people.

3. The Centers should register its unemployed members and endeavor to place them in positions by making a special effort to locate employment opportunities among members of the Board, other members of the association, or in the community generally.

4. The Executive and the officers of the Center should keep in touch with the plans for employment that are promulgated in local communities with a view to co-operating,—

(a) In referring employment opportunities to a Central Employment Committee, if such exists;

(b) In helping members of the Center to secure positions offered through existing employment agencies;

(c) By participating in any fund raising efforts for emergency relief.

5. If a fund is being raised for unemployment relief, and wherever it is practicable, the Center may conduct one or more social or other mass gatherings for the purpose of raising funds. (Suggested to our Council and Clubs)

6. The Center may offer its facilities as a clearing station for city-wide plans for employment or relief of unemployed.

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ARABS IN SHARP RIFT ON WHITE PAPER

The Jewish Tribune in its current issue reports that according to a leading Moslem member, the overdue reply of the Arab Executive in regard to the British White Paper is couched in ambiguous and indecisive language, purposely leaving unclear whether or not it is accepted. Opinion is divided regarding the publication of the reply, one faction believing that it is against the Arabs' political interests to publish any reply to a document which is clearly in their favor. The extremists, led by the Mufti, believe that continued silence would imply acquiescence to the Palestine Mandate. Elections for the Legislative Council will probably take place in March or April.

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
