CURRENT EVENTS IN THE JEWISH WORLD

1. Sixteen Jewish candidates were elected to the British Parliament in the general elections held on October 27th.

2. Two Viennese Jews, Felix Salten, well known Austrian Jewish writer, and Dr. Alexander Horowitz, general secretary of the Agricultural Stock Exchange, received awards in recognition of their services to the Austrian Republic.

3. The study of the Bible has been introduced into the curricula of the public schools throughout the city of Omaha. The course in Bible studies will extend from the kindergarten into high school.

4. Louis Marcus, wealthy retired Jewish motion picture exhibitor, was elected Mayor of Salt Lake City. He is the first Jew ever to be elected to this post in Salt Lake City.

5. William Susman, a Jewish pathologist in the Manchester Jewish Hospital, was hailed in the English press as the discoverer of important treatments for cancer. The treatments, which are in connection with the pituitary gland, are lauded as major discoveries.

6. "The Vilna Courier," a Jewish daily, reported that a society for the transference of Polish Jews to Spain for settlement has been established in Vilna.

7. Two thousand Jewish children in Kishinev are unable to attend school as the Jewish Congregation is unable to pay teachers, states a Jewish Telegraphic Agency report.

RABBI HERBERT S. GOLDSTEIN ON "THE AFTERMATH OF THE ELECTION"

The election of last Tuesday proves conclusively that the people have spoken most clearly as to their notion of political parties and political leadership. I urge that ministers of religion, social workers and lay communal leaders take an active part in the political affairs of their districts. I know of no greater piece of social service work that can be done anywhere than in and through the political club. The political club takes a deep, personal and not organized cold charity interest in those who seek its aid.

What do the figures of the last election show? The combined Republican and Socialist vote was less than one-half of the Democratic vote, in spite of the recent disclosures by the Hofstadter Investigation Committee. This simply shows that the people believe that the disclosures reveal evils which they think are part and parcel of every dominant political party drunk with power. It is a grave danger to a democracy when the people two to one take for granted that politics must be low, sordid and reeking with graft. This is a sad reflection upon the men now holding public office. And yet this fortunately is untrue. We have in some branches and departments of the nation, state and city, the finest men and women whose probity will never be challenged.

What, then, is the trouble and where is the difficulty? The trouble, my friends, lies

in the fact that the unit of our political government, the districts, is not properly manned. Some of our district leaders have too much in their tin boxes as a result of the tenure of their office. Then men of the highest calibre, mentally and morally, are not chosen for leadership. The trouble lies with the people. The Bible says through the prophet Isaiah "like people like priest." The people who have joined political clubs have, as a rule, done so not because of any political program or enlarged social vision, but because of the opportunity for political office-holding. Therefore I believe the time has come for the clergy, the social workers and the lay communal leaders to take not merely a passive but an active and leading interest in the affairs of our political clubs.

Our political clubs are not civic centers as they ought to be, but gambling houses and gambling dens, where the law of the land is openly, proudly and defiantly violated. Shall we allow these conditions to remain? The answer is in the keeping of the religious, social and moral leaders of the community. I call upon the best element of our citizenry to join a political club in their neighborhood, lest we become like Rome, swollen with voluptuous wealth and pride, and fall as the mighty have fallen. We cannot remedy the situation by absent treatment. "It is justice" says Holy Writ "which exalteth a people." America will realize once more this exaltation when the people will be interested in the complete welfare of their community, then and only then we will enjoy a real and true democracy.

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
