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A TIMELY MESSAGE TO THE JEWISH YOUTH

Young people delude themselves sometimes in confounding unbridled license with freedom. They have at times been influenced by examples of personalities which do not represent the true, the real and the best America.

The lesson of historic traditions should be taken to heart by some young American Jews to avoid the pitfalls of lawless individualism which they confound with American freedom. They should remember that the founders of America as far back as the Colonial period were nurtured by the same spiritual sources which restored the soul of David, the Singer of the Psalms.

It is now one of the verities which cannot be too frequently repeated, that allegiance to our Jewish ideals is the best preparation for our duties as American citizens.

Let us, therefore, dedicate ourselves anew to the mission of our historic people—a mission of idealism and peace and good citizenship. We shall thus bring a tribute to our thought to our ancient faith and to the country of which we are so proud to be a part.

Let us hold high our heads like the Maccabaeans of old. Let us from their story of heroism and loyalty, tested by the ordeal of battle, learn the lesson of dignity which alone gives worth to our humanity, and let us consecrate ourselves anew to the furtherance of Jewish ideals for the greater glory of the America we love.

A JEWISH THOUGHT

As it is necessary that while we are endeavoring to attain our purpose, and bring the understanding into the right path, we should carry on our life; we are compelled first of all to lay down certain rules of life as provisionally good, to wit, the following: To indulge ourselves with pleasures only in so far as they are necessary for preserving health. To endeavor to obtain only sufficient money or other commodities to enable us to preserve our life and health. It is with the notion of money that the mind of the multitude is chiefly engrossed; nay, it can hardly conceive any kind of pleasure, which is not accompanied with the idea of money as cause. This result is the fault only of those who seek money, not from poverty or to supply their necessary wants, but because they have learned the arts of gain, wherewith they bring themselves to great splendor. Certainly they nourish their bodies, according to custom, but scantily, believing that they lose as much of their wealth as they spend on the preservation of their body. But they who know the true use of money, and who fix the measure of wealth solely with regard to their actual needs, live content with little.

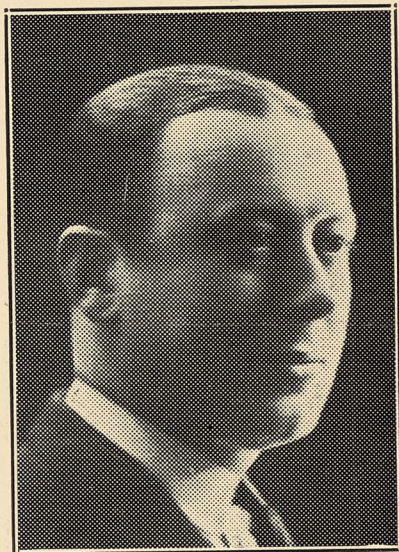

300 HONOR JUDGE IRVING

Three hundred outstanding representatives of Jewish and civic life, including Chief Judge Benjamin N. Cardozo of the Court of Appeals, Joseph V. McKee, president of the Board of Aldermen, and Joseph M. Proskauer, former Supreme Court Justice, and the Hon. Isaac Siegel joined Sunday evening in paying tribute to Judge Irving Lehman, at a dinner arranged in his honor by the Metropolitan League of Jewish Community Associations at the Hotel Commodore.

CURRENT EVENTS IN THE JEWISH WORLD

The \$10,000,000 art collection of the late Colonel Michael Friedsam, which he spent a lifetime assembling, was accepted on December 23rd by the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

The collection, which consists of 135 paintings and 200 prized pieces representing the fine arts will be kept intact by the Museum in accordance with the wishes expressed by Colonel Friedsam in his will. The collection will be placed on view in November of 1932.

A regular monthly stipend will be paid to Jewish beggars in Turkey in order to eradicate Jewish pauperism and begging on the streets, it was decided at a special conference called at the initiative of the B'nai B'rith and attended by representatives of Jewish communities and Jewish institutions in Turkey.

The Jewish Senator, S. Dinerman, Director of "Banca Moldava," was appointed on December 21st, a member of the Roumanian Supreme Council for Labor Matters. (JTA)

According to a dispatch from the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, 3000 Jewish youths will this winter be enrolled in leading factory schools in the Ukraine.

The youths will be recruited from 107 Ukrainian centers, where preparatory courses are now being given. They will then be sent to 21 of the largest factories in the Ukraine to receive training for various industries, including railways, ship-building, coal, mineral and chemical industries.

Orange shipping on a large scale from the port of Haifa, Palestine, was inaugurated with the loading of two big consignments.

Thirteen thousand cases were shipped to Scandinavian countries and two hundred and twenty-seven cases to Central Europe.

According to the Jewish Daily Bulletin, Jewish students of the University of Maryland were made the target of an attack a month ago in their dormitory, it was revealed recently through an editorial in the university paper, "The Diamondback," which sharply condemns the perpetrators.

The campus organ reveals that the attack occurred on November 21st following a dance, "during what is believed to have been a demonstration directed against Jewish students." Fourteen windows in the D section of Calvert Hall were shattered by stones. One person was showered with falling glass, and many more endangered by flying bricks, the paper asserts. The editorial states that the residents of the entire section were forced to move to the attic of a friendly fraternity house for safety.

The paper invites those responsible for the attack to withdraw from the university. "A bigot has no place in a modern university. The agitators behind this unfortunate occurrence, should it develop that their intolerance cannot be curbed, had best withdraw," it concludes.

Professor Richard J. H. Gottheil was the first Jew to occupy the post of Director of the American School for Oriental Research, it is pointed out in connection with the appointment of Dr. Nelson Glueck, of Hebrew Union College.

Professor Gottheil, who now holds the Chair of Rabbinic Literature and Semitic Languages at Columbia University, occupied the Jerusalem post in the academic year 1909-1910.
