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RELIGIOUS-REVIVAL

"A religious revival will make America American. By that I mean, that it will restore the spirit of the founding fathers of our republic to its pristine state, making us once again a God-fearing, law abiding people. It will make us understand that we have duties as well as privileges.

The Communists in this country are demanding every privilege we can give them. They want the right of freedom to rebel. Let us ask in turn are any of these rights given in Soviet Russia to those who are opposed to that form of Government? Needless to say, I am for freedom of speech, but I am opposed to one who demands for himself rights which he will in turn deny to his neighbor. The most illiberal and oppressive country in the world today is Soviet Russia and yet its devotees demand of us every liberty and would, if they could, oppress us with their tyranny. I cannot see how any American who loves freedom and liberality can give comfort to the Communists who represent the complete suppression of freedom of conscience and liberty of religious belief. I would describe the Commu-

nist in the world of our Sages as one who claims "what is mine is mine and what is thine is mine."

Our aspirations must include spiritual as well as material yearnings. Cold and bare have we been without the generous glow of idealism. What your aspiration is, is the measure of your inspiration. Do you aspire merely to grovel in the countinghouse, or do you aspire in addition to being materially successful, to be spiritually successful, right with God, man and yourself? The true measure of what you really are can be answered therefore only by the breadth of your aspiration, for "not by bread alone doth man live, but by everything that cometh out of the Lord doth man live."

I plead for a religious revival as the true foundation of personal happiness. A religious revival is the only antidote against depression. It will enable men to sing as did the royal bard King David during troublous times. "Thy word hath quickened me. Thy statutes have been my song, in the house of my pilgrimage."

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TEN COMMANDMENTS FOR PARENTS

- V. Remember that it is thy child's privilege to make a hero out of thee, and take thou thought to be a proper one.
- VI. Remember also that thy example is more eloquent than thy fault-finding and moralizing.
- VII. Thou shalt strive to be a sign-post on the highway of life rather than a rut out of which the wheel cannot turn.
- VIII. Thou shalt teach thy child to stand on his own feet and fight his own battles.
- IX. Thou shalt help thy child to see beauty, to practice kindness, to love truth, to live in friendship.
- X. Thou shalt make of the place wherein thou dwellest a real home—a haven of happiness for thyself, for thy children, for thy friends and for thy children's friends.

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
