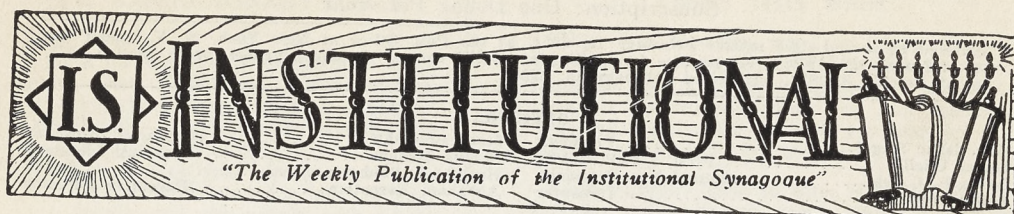

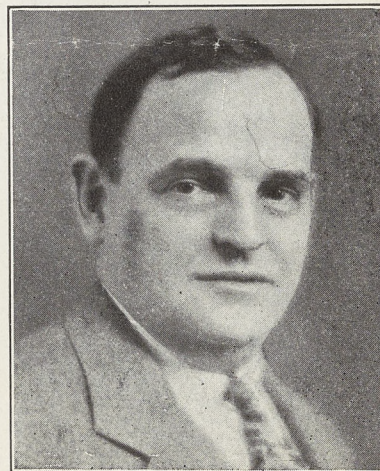

AN EXAMPLE OF THE WISDOM OF MAIMONIDES

Maimonides used to point out that there are eight degrees of doing charity, each one finer than the other.

The first, and lowest, is to give sorrowfully and with regret; for that is a gift from the hand, but not from the heart. It is to give because you "ought to," not because you want to.

The second is to give enough to relieve the sufferer. The third is to give willingly and sufficiently, but not until asked.

The fourth is to give willingly and sufficiently and without being asked, but to give it to the poor man in such an open and public way as to make him ashamed.

The fifth way is to give in such a way that the person helped knows who has helped him, but is not known to the benefactor.

The sixth is when the giver knows the person he is helping, but when the man helped does not know who it is that has come to his relief.

The seventh is when the giver does not know whom he is helping, and the person assisted does not know who his benefactor is.

But the eighth and finest of all is to be beforehand, and to act in such a way that it would not be necessary to give charity.

THE ROAD TO LIFE

From the Address of Professor Shalom Spiegel

In the early days of the emancipation movement, our brothers in Germany surrendered their Jewish distinctiveness in return for civic rights. They differed from the majority race in religion only—so they declared. And religion was no longer the whole of life which it was to their fathers. It was a mere Sunday affair, even as is was to their non-Jewish neighbors.

And so they followed the road of assimilation. They followed it, they thought, to victory and new life.

Today, amid the ruins of its tinsel glories, assimilation lies bankrupt and broken. Its folly and futility are apparent to all men.

Shall we learn the lesson of modern Germany? Shall we learn that the surrender of self, the sacrifice of one's own cultural heritage, is as useless as it is ignoble? Let the Jewish Education Association proclaim this truth in the hearing of all American Jewry.

We shall lose nothing by being true to ourselves. We shall, on the contrary, enrich our daily lives. We shall build up a fortress and a refuge against the day of distress.

Happily, our country opposes no obstacles to the road of our spirit. But are we using our opportunity? How many in this great Metropolis know the Hebrew language—know the sacred words in all their wealth and depth of meaning? For the child that pronounces "tzedeek" proclaims faith in the victory of justice. The child that learns the etymology of "emes" learns how to endure for the truth.

And let us teach our children Jewish history. It will tell them that they are of legitimate and noble birth. It will give anti-Semitism the lie.

Let us go forward to eternity in the name of the God of Israel.
