DAY SCHOOL CLASSES OPEN NEXT MONDAY


Classes in the W. S. I. S. Day School, which is entering its second year with an enlarged program, will start next Monday, September 18.

ROSH HASHONAH. A "REMINTING"

New Year's day is a **covered** holiday. "Blow the horn", on Rosh Hashonah to stir up the people "for our festival is a covered one", cries the Psalmist. None of us knows of the Judgment that is about to be rendered concerning each and every one of us, our children, and our country. We can help make the Judgment decree a favorable one.

The Rabbis say in the Talmud, that what the New Year shall be is in our own hands on Rosh Hashonah. If we come to the Synagogue in the same old way, cold, and merely out of habit, we shall take away from the Synagogue what we bring to it. We shall be like old coins, used, worn, and well-nigh void of value.

There are times, however, when old coins are sent back to the mint, to be refreshed and dipped into a solution which gives them lustre and newness. So too, may it be with us. All of us, at the end of the year, are like old coins. We have been used up, worn, and are almost of little value, because of our lusts, our yielding to temptation, our environment or our business. When we come to the Synagogue on Rosh Hashonah to be refreshed, to receive new lustre, to pray, to make new resolutions, for a better, nobler, more religious life, to be reminted, as it were, then we must leave the Synagogue different than we were when we entered it. We have then decreed for ourselves on Rosh Hashonah what the whole New Year shall be, a year, religious and happy in spirit.

Just try it my friends, and I assure you that you will be amply repaid with the satisfaction of knowing you have made the proper approach to Rosh Hashonah by appearing before God with the willingness and determination to walk in His way for the coming year. "Life is divine when duty is a joy."

JEWISH QUARTERS BOMBED IN AIR RAIDS ON POLAND

WARSAW (JTA) — Despite Nazi assurances that open towns would not be bombed, a number of towns in the Warsaw district have been subjected to repeated aerial bombings by the Germans.

The city of Czestochowa, in southwestern Poland, which was captured by the German forces, has a Jewish population of 27,000. Thousands of Jews and non-Jews fled the city before the German occupation.

Two hundred Jews who were to emigrate to Palestine cancelled their departure.

The Jewish quarters of Warsaw, inhabited by approximately 350, 000, were among the hardest hit in the series of Nazi air raids. Two houses in the Jewish suburb of Kolo were completely destroyed by bombs. Ten persons were killed and 30 others wounded. Bombs dropped by Nazi fliers on the suburb of Otwock killed eight Jewish orphans, two Jews and two Jewesses, and wounded 30.

A special session of the Sejm (Polish Parliament) cheered a declaration by Jewish parliamentarians that the Jewish population without exception stood ready to make all sacrifices to ensure Poland's victory in her war with Germany.

Jewish communities throughout Poland formed coordinating state defense committees to cooperate with the authorities. All Jewish groups. including Rabbinical, Zionist, labor and youth organizations, responded enthusiastically to President Ignace Moscicki's manifesto calling upon the nation to resist Germany's invasion. All of the bodies published appeals to their memberships to cooperate with the Government in every way and voiced the Jewish population's determination to make every sacrifice in defense of the nation.


PALESTINE JEWS, 18 TO 50, REGISTERED FOR SERVICE

JERUSALEM (JTA) -- Registration of all Jewish men and women between the ages of 18 and 50 for national service was announced after a joint meeting of executives of the Jewish Agency and Jewish National Council.

Those enlisting will be used (1) for security purposes and (2) to render the British army in Palestine

any necessary assistance, it was stated.

"In this emergency, Palestine Jewry must maintain a triple front," stated the Jewish Agency, "for defense of the Jewish homeland, and security of the Jewish people and the victory of the British Empire."

Some 1,500 Czech Jewish exservicemen have been called to report to the Czech consul general here in connection with the worldwide preparations to raise a Czech army to fight Germany.

A wave of enthusiasm for Britain has swamped the bitterness engendered by the White Paper. On almost every street the conversation turned to how the Jews might help Britain. The Arab Christian newspaper Falastin said editorially that the Arabs must also support Britain if only to prevent the Jews from profiting by their support.

FORCED LABOR FOR JEWS IN FULL SWING IN REICH

AMSTERDAM (JTA) -- Compulsory employment of able-bodied young Jews and Jewesses on manual labor projects in Germany, which began early in August, is now proceeding on a large scale, according to telephonic information from Berlin.

The drafted Jewish workers are being paid the same rate as "Aryans" and are being treated the same, although they are kept segregated and work separately. The advent of forced labor for younger members of the community is an event of considerable importance from the economic viewpoint, because it may help to take some of the strain off the heavily burdened Jewish communities.

The Propaganda Ministry ordered the Juedisches Nachrichtenblatt, German Jewry's only newspaper, reduced to four pages, to appear on Tuesdays and Fridays, instead of the former 12 to 16 pages, and intimated possible further reduction in size, perhaps total suspension.

Telephonic contact between the Netherlands and German Jewish organizations and individuals was suddenly and inexplicably terminated. The disruption was interpreted

Shall we spend the Holy days in mere lip service, delighting in the tuneful rendition of the prayers, acquiescing in sermons, and then return to our spiritually sterile lives?

Fortunate are the people who properly comprehend the call of the shofar on Rosh Hashonah. Fortunate is the man who can set brakes on his purposeless and ideal-less merry-go-around of living and ask himself, "Quo Vadis, little man, whence are you heading?"

Why are we not with the Babylonians who conquered us or with the Greeks or with the Hellenized Romans to whom so many of our predecessors sold out spiritually?" Ordinary telephone service between Holland and Germany was normal, but exchanges at Berlin and Cologne served notice on callers that they were forbidden to connect the numbers of the Jewish organizations.

GRYNSZPAN ASKS RIGHT TO FIGHT FOR FRANCE

PARIS -- Herschel Grynszpan, youthful Jewish refugee whose assassination of a German Embassy official touched off last November's pogroms in Germany, has applied for permission to join the French Army as a volunteer.

From the jail cell where he is lodged pending trial, Grynszpan wrote to the Ministry of Justice: "In these tragic hours I apply for your permission to give my blood as a volunteer in the ranks of the French front fighters."

ONLY 2,500 JEWISH COMMUNISTS BROWDER TELLS DIES COMMITEE

WASHINGTON -- Concluding his testimony before the Dies Committee, Earl Browder, secretary of the Communist Party, declared there were not more than 2,500 Jews in the party in the whole country. More than half of these, he said, are in New York City. He gave his total party strength as about 100,000, and pointed out that the ratio of Jews in the Communist Party is no greater than the ratio of Jews to the population of the United States as a whole.

LATE NEWS BULLETINS

Geneva -- According to reports of reliable persons arrived from Germany, the Nazis have addessed an appeal to "Jewish compatriots" asking Jews to register with the authorities for service to the country in some capacity.

Philadelphia -- Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation told newspaper men that Philadelphia was a center of pro-Nazi and anti-Semitic propaganda. The agents disclosed that "at least seven" Army and National Guard officers, including a Brigadier-General who is a public high school teacher, regularly attended meetings of the German-American Bund.

Jerusalem -- The Czech Consulate General said that "hundreds of Czecho-Slovak citizens living in Palestine have expressed a desire to fight for the liberation of Czecho-Slovakia." A statement expressed the belief that a Czech legion already was being formed here, as in England and France.






PERMANENT SUCCA
