WOMEN WORK ON PROGRAM FOR NOVEMBER LUNCHEON

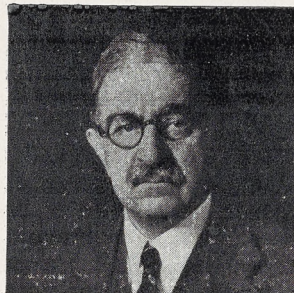

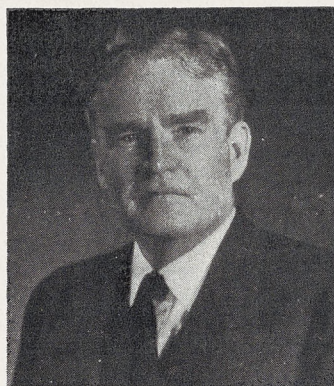

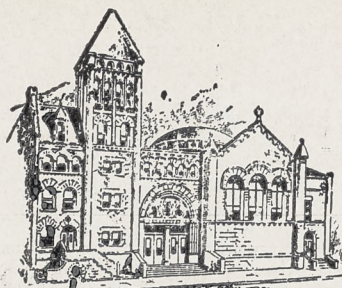
Groups and Parties

THE ROAD BACK

When the ancient Roman kings conquered a country, they brought back with them the wealth of the land and the male population as slaves.

When Hitler conquered Czechoslovakia, he immediately sent back to Germany all the gold in the treasury and when he conquered Poland, he did the same; but, in addition, thousands of able-bodied Poles were sent into Germany to work in labor gangs, the modern version of slavery.

In the Middle Ages, we had the ghetto in which the Jews were concentrated by force and from which they could not depart without the permission of their masters. Today, we have a similar situation not only in Germany but in other parts of eastern Europe. The press, in the last few days, has been hinting at a more startling development. Instead of a concentration camp for a few hundred or a few thousand, instead of a ghetto for a local community, the latest evolution of Nazi terrorism contemplates a national ghetto; a sort of Indian reservation for the Jews. The great minds of Germany have decided to take a substantial slice of Poland and drive all the Jews into that particular section. There our brethren are to be concentrated so that they can be more easily exploited and oppressed.

Populations are being shifted around in a sort of international October 1st moving day. 200,000 Germans are being moved from northern Italy and, in addition, other thousands of Germans from the newly re-acquired Soviet sphere of influence on the Baltic.

The world is certainly taking the road back, back from civilization, back from human decency, back from the teachings and preachings of thousands of years.

BIRDS OF A FEATHER

The Klan always professed the noble sentiment of patriotism as its motivating force. Anti-Semites, here and elsewhere, have continuously laid claims to the promptings of "love of country." They are all "patriots." Samuel Johnson said: "Patriotism is the last refuge of a scoundrel."

"By their friends shall ye know them," or, as the Spaniards say, "Tell me with whom you go and I shall tell you what you are." Such proverbs, numerous and prevalent in every language, demonstrate that the world, for ages, has learned to classify individuals, despite their claims to originality or individuality.

Now, along comes a "lady," one of those rabid, Madame La Farge individuals, keen on proving that the female of the species can be deadlier than the male. She seeks to establish a newspaper called "The National American Patriot," the ideal of which would be to solve the Jewish "problem" in the Nazi fashion.

The "lady" is Dr. Anna Bogenholm Sloane, of 547 West 123rd Street, New York City. The Dies Committee has made public some correspondence between this hitherto unknown doctor and Oscar C. Pfau, in Hamburg, director of the Nazi propaganda agency. Dr. Sloane wrote:

"I want to have a council of twelve leaders of patriotic movements connected with it in the hope that this would link together all patriotic movements in the United States for the purpose of recovering our country from control of the Jews."

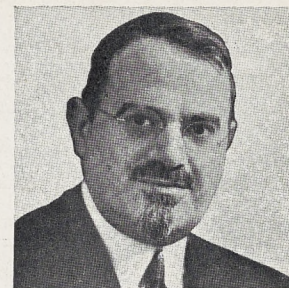
This letter continued:

- "2. Dr. Edward Hunter, president, Industrial Defense League.
- "3. Mr. Donald Shea, president, White Shirts, and Gentile League.

LIGHT VERSUS DARKNESS

It has always been assumed that the Church and Synagogue represent reaction and complacency, whilst the University and the secular institutions represent progress and genuine leadership. Recent events in the world have proved the opposite to be true. Religion represents light; the University and secular training represent darkness. Listen to what Albert Einstein has to say:

Being a lover of freedom, when the revolution came in Germany, I looked to the universities to defend it, knowing that they had always boasted of their devotion to the cause of truth; but no, the universities immediately were silenced. Then I looked to the great editors of the newspapers. . . and . . . to the individual writers. . . but they too were mute. Only the Church (or Synagogue) stood squarely across the path of Hitler's campaign for suppressing truth.

What has happened in Poland? The great political leader, Josef Beck, and the outstanding Polish General, Smigly-Rydz, fled to other countries. As for the religious leaders, the great Rabbi Chiam Ozer Grodinsky stayed in Vilna, and the great Gerrer Rebbe remained with his Chassidim. How discouraging it must have been to the Poles to be bereft of their leadership, and how encouraging to the pious Jews to have their representatives with them!

Gov. Lehman said the other day: "Many Americans who have given little thought to religion are deeply concerned today over its preservation against the bitter onslaught of its foes."

Religion and democracy are so closely interwoven that neither can survive in the long run without the other. The United States of America was founded because religious leaders could not square tyranny with religion. The ministers of God dare to stand erect and refuse to abandon the commandments of God for the commandments of the dictatorship of man.

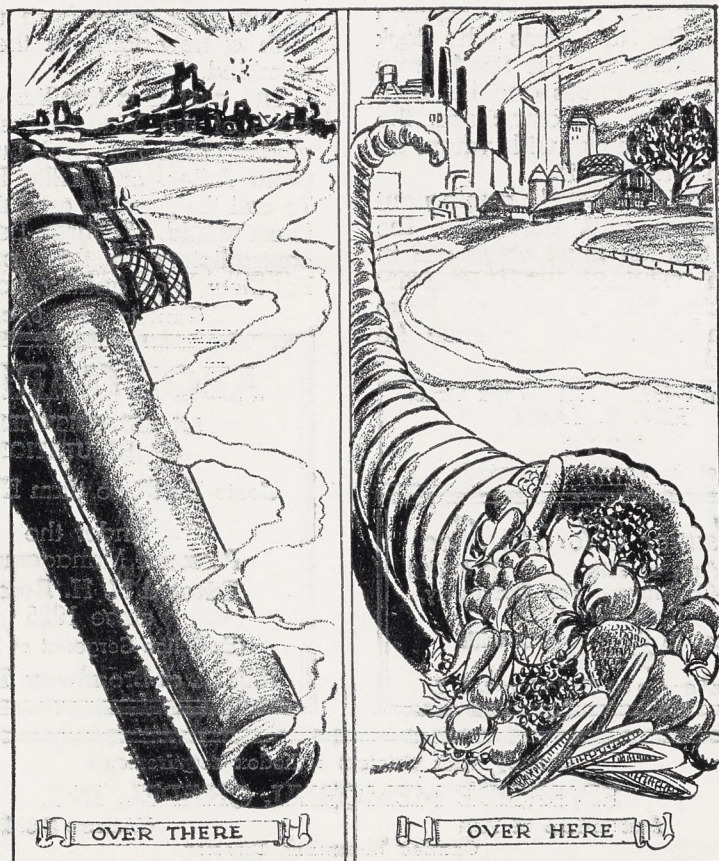
WHITHER REFUGEES?:

This was the question before the officials of the Intergovernmental Committee on Refugees that met in a two-day session with President Roosevelt in Washington last week. The only issue of last week's session--and it was slight enough in view of the immensity of the problem--was a twofold proposal by President Roosevelt: (1) Immediate resettlement of two to three hundred thousand refugees in dire need; and (2) Long range preparations to care for as many as 20,000,000 people who might be left homeless and destitute during the course of the present war.

Among striking examples brought to the attention of the Committee was the plight of 5,000,000 Jews in Central and Eastern Europe, whose security, as the American Jewish Congress pointed out, would almost certainly be shattered by the events of the war. Another more immediate refugee problem presented itself in Vilna, recently ceded by Russia to Lithuania. It is reported that 150,000 refugees from Russian and German occupied Poland have already swarmed into the ceded territory.

The proposals made at the Washington meeting were merely repetitions of plans to expedite the emigration of European refugees into neutral countries--the United States, Switzerland, Belgium, the Netherlands, the Scandinavian countries, etc.--as far as the immigration quotas of those countries will permit. As a more permanent and more comprehensive relief measure, the committee cited the planned early establishment of refugee colonies in the Dominican Republic and in the Philippines.

Reactions to the Washington proposals were not all favorable. The Allied Governments resented the implication that the Allied war aims--one of which is to abolish the racial intolerance that accounts for most of the refugees' present condition--will not be successful, or that they are not sincere. As we go to press, it is said that informal representations have been made by Britain and France to the United States Government, alleging that President Roosevelt's statements may well be interpreted in Germany as an acceptance of Hitler's thesis of forced emigration.

last Monday night were treated to an unusually interesting address by Professor Nathan Isaacs, of Harvard University, who spoke brilliantly on the subject, "Moses and the Patriarchal System."

Professor Isaacs, whose field is Business Law, but who has written on Hebrew subjects, outlined in detail the transition of the Hebrew people from a tribal clan in the wilderness into a well-integrated nation. He stressed the thesis that it was essential, for this transition, to destroy the patriarchal system in which each household was a little state in itself, with its own priesthood and its own power of jurisdiction vested in the patriarch. He elaborated upon numerous laws which, in the light of this thesis, become more intelligible.

Among events seen in a new light from this point of view were several cases of resistance by those interested in preserving the old order, as, for instance, the heads of households.

"Chaver Nachman," dramatized from the novel, "East of Eden," by I. J. Singer, is a soul-moving drama of a young Jewish boy brought up in the home of an humble and pious father, who sees his home life destroyed by the death of his mother while he is yet a child, his sister betrayed, everything lost, and finally, his father called to the colors and killed in the service of his country.

Nachman cannot reconcile implicit belief in God with the tragic events that are shaping his life; so he gives up the study of the Torah for the study of Karl Marx. But even in the camp of the Revolutionists he can find no peace: he is imprisoned in Poland and deported from Russia as a spy; his own wife, a fervent Communist, turns finally to religion for her salvation.

In the final scene, Nachman, a weary and disillusioned man, falls onto the ground to rest. As he sleeps, an apparition of his father appears to him. In beautiful phraseology, he tells Nachman that there is a reason for man's suffering; that the tears men shed are not lost, but accumulated in a huge cup. When this cup overflows, he says, the Redeemer will come. Nachman awakens and, with his father's words still ringing in his ears, goes forth to face life with a new faith in the future of mankind.

The cast is a familiar one to patrons of the Yiddish theater. It includes Jacob Ben-Ami, Ludwig Satz, Celia Adler, and Tillie Rabinowitz. To call their acting anything but the finest would, of course, be incredibly contradictory to their past record. But there is an apathy, hardly tangi-

CONFUSING THE ISSUES

During the holiday season, so recently ended, our fellow Jews have been riding the wave of religious affiliation and spirituality. Today, that wave of high emotion, God-consciousness and awareness of Israel's inherent spiritual qualities has fallen back into the ocean of every day concerns.

Synagogue attendance, which literally packed the house, has fallen down to the old and constant group of faithful worshippers. The focus of the Jewish community has shifted from the spiritual to the social and organizational aspects of life.

Plans for theater parties, banquets, luncheons, and a variety of fund-raising projects have been advanced. Membership drives, too, will soon get under way.

All this is naturally quite necessary. Yet, much too often one gets lost in the sea of activity and loses sight of the real objectives and goals to be sought. One is prone to confuse the means of attaining the desired ends with the ends themselves.

At the destruction of the second Temple and the seeming downfall of the Jewish nationhood, it was Jochanon ben Zakai who saved his people, succeeding not so much through the organization of Jewish man power and material resources, but rather by conserving the spiritual resources and reserves of our heritage. He asked the Roman general staff simply for the little defenseless town, Jabneh. There he established a seat of Jewish learning. And it was from that spiritual center that our people drew its strength to regenerate as a nation and as a culture. It was the Torah that fortified and preserved the Jew throughout his long period of suffering and trial.

In our day too the well-spring of Jewish survival and creative living is to be found in the Torah, in the observance of Jewish tradition, in the sustaining faith of our fathers. Let us not only participate in the task of maintaining our houses of worship and study, but let us also be benefactors of its blessing.

ble, but very real, that has crept into the Yiddish Theater. Why? Perhaps a suggestion of some other Yiddish actors is after all the most logical--they cite the Jews' depression over world events as coloring everything they do.
