WHERE I COME FROM

To brag of the efficient manner of handling an emergency, to boast of the particular skill and effectiveness in meeting unexpected situations, is a trait common to those who hail from somewhere else.

How often have we heard super-southern southerners say: "Where I come from, we put them in their place." The other night we saw a drunk push away a policeman who was trying to get the inebriated citizen to go home. An outraged Texan drawled: "Daown in Texas,

we strings up a feller who 'saults a officer," thereby mixing the brutal with the ungrammatical.

In true, blue-blooded spirit, in the wake of proud, Soviet tradition, we have this week been treated to an instance of "Where I come from" advice, that is at once sparkling, ingenious and superbly ironic.

By reason of Hitler's sell-out to the Reds, Russia gained a strong foothold in Estonia. The loud-mouthed, suddenly emboldened Communist brethren in Estonia, thought the time had arrived to assert themselves. So, crisis-bound, they strutted forth, only to be arrested in droves. Their leaders appealed to the Russian officials. However, as Stalin's communism is as unsubstantial as Hitler's anti-communism, the Russian officials informed their Estonian fellow-travelers: "In Russia, political agitators of that kind are hanged."

Very appropriate comfort. All we can say is "Well spoken, comrades."

HAVE YOU A CALLING?

We generally associate a "Call" with that of a minister. But every one of us, dear friends, receives a call. Some of us, as a result, go into professions, others into the business world. Even inanimate objects have a divine appointment. As the Bible puts it: "And God called light unto the Day and darkness he called unto the night". In other words, light was given to minister during the day and darkness during the night. When we so envisage our everyday labors, then the humdrum and the monotony of our work are removed.

The man in overalls works, divinely appointed, to aid industry, to clean the city, to make an honest living, to support his wife and family, to feel content with the product of his hands. "Sweet is the sleep of the worker," said the wisdom preacher in the Book of Ecclesiastics.

The lawyer certainly can feel his call in the opportunities given him to create a better understanding between litigants, to meticulously safeguard the interests of his clients and to elevate the ethical approach of the client to his problem.

The doctor, beside bringing healing to the body, should also bring solace to the mind and comfort to the soul, not merely by having a patient but by being patient. In this way he gives of his noblest self for the re-building of a soul.

The business man may answer his call by preventing communism through the treatment he accords his employees - by a sympathetic approach to those who are under him.

Unfortunately, too many charitable business men cause unrest by their attitude toward labor. They create irreligion although they may be scrupulous themselves because, while they may pray, they are unwilling to pay back love of neighbor by deeds of social justice.

I ask you then, dear reader, to elevate and ennoble your profession or employment into a divine calling that will bring contentment to yourself and radiate happiness to all with whom you come in contact.

OUR BRETHREN THE WORLD OVER

In Ravaged Poland:

Accounts of devastation in Warsaw, fallen Polish capital, this week, took special notice of the plight of the surviving Jews there. In the Jewish sections, said a United Press dispatch, the general state of misery and famine was at its worst. Horror stories of atrocities committed against the Jews who were not fortunate enough to escape to those parts of Poland now under Soviet domination were substantiated by dispatches of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

In one small Polish town, it was reported, Nazi officials decreed the execution of one male in each Jewish family. In many others, Jews were forced, it was said, to wear yellow badges or other shameful marks of identification and segregation. Throughout Poland, Jews were being forced out of their customary employments, robbed of their money, and denied the pittance of food distributed to the rest of the population.

Hadassah Convention:

While these fruits of unenlightened, medieval barbarism were being ripened across the Atlantic, Hadassah, American women's Zionist organization, held its twenty-fifth annual convention in New York, and rededicated itself to its constructive work of salvation, resettlement, and furtherance of democratic ideals in the Jewish homeland. Attending the convention were 2,000 delegates from other States, and 2,000 local members. They listened to many speakers, including Mayor La Guardia, Dr. Oscar I. Janowsky, and Dr. Solomon Goldman. Before adjourning, the delegates elected as their new national president, Mrs. David de Sola Pool, wife of the Rabbi of the Spanish-Portuguese Synagogue. Mrs. Pool succeeds Mrs. Moses P. Epstein in the office.

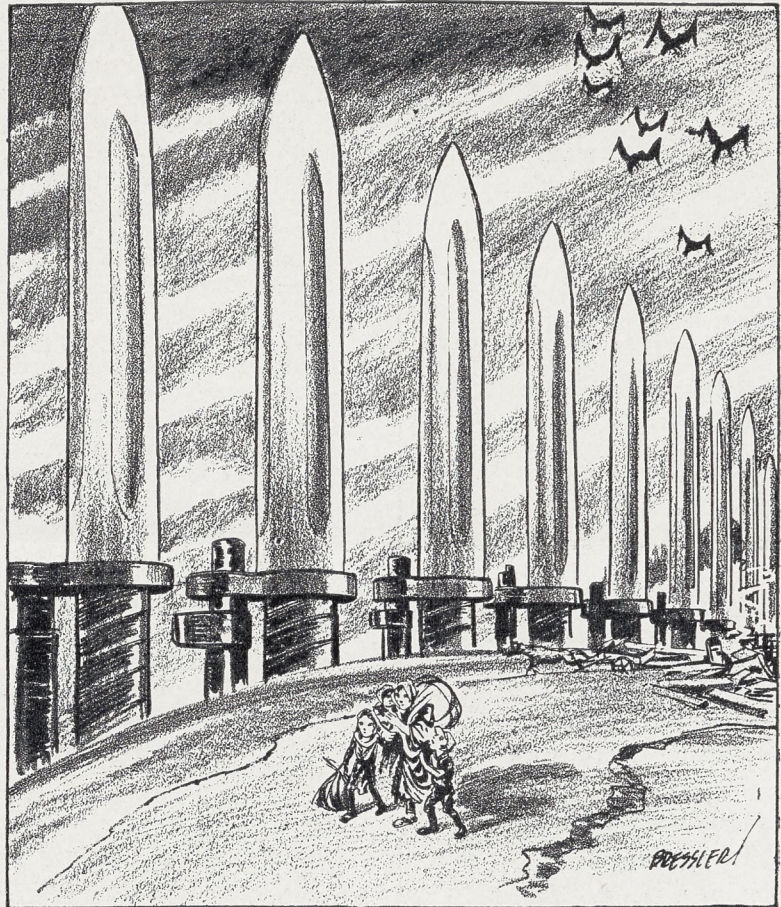
Refugee Talks:

From Washington comes news that the Intergovernmental Refugee Committee, which has been meeting there, has decided to limit the scope of its activities to a short-range program of resettling the 200,000 or so pre-war refugees still in Europe. For the present no consideration will be given to President Roosevelt's suggestion that a long-range program be developed to take care of an expected ten to twelve million refugees made homeless during the course of the current war.

Meanwhile, figures on the resettlement of European political refugees during the last six years, made known in London, established that

THE PLAY

CLINTON STREET, performed by the
 Artef Players, at the Mercury
 Theater, 41st East of Broadway.

The Artef Players, in their twelfth season, present "Clinton Street," an episodic but vivid play of life in New York's ghetto, freely adapted from the novel by Chaver Paver. In theme, and even more in technique, "Clinton Street" is a striking departure from other current offerings in the Yiddish Theater. The spirit of Orson Welles, it would seem, still inhabits the Mercury; — to the effect that "Clinton Street" appears without scenery and with only a minimum of suggestive properties. A narrator, well played by Sol Eisikoff, sets the scenes and offers comments that, in their mixture of pathos and humor, are very close to the rushing, tragic, and flavorsome ghetto life portrayed on the stage.

There are plots, rather than a plot, in "Clinton Street." In this sense it is not really a play at all, but a series of illuminating glimpses into the every day life of Clinton Street people. Here, meanness, tragedy, and frustration predominate, and what there is of humor is always poisoned at the core with bitterness. The negligible unity of the play consists in the fact that the end, for each of the rather clearly defined character groups, is one of death or hopeless despair. Not much is added by the narrator's final appeal for social justice—it seems as bereft of hope as it is dramatically inept.

The very real worth of "Clinton Street" lies in the well-chosen situations, and in a few outstanding performances, which bring to the tragic themes an overpowering flow of genuine emotion. Morris Friedman, portraying the devastating spiritual and emotional conflicts of a pious father whose son has served a prison sentence for a fatal stabbing, gives a performance that is worth the entire evening.

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BIBLE CLASS WELCOMES

NOTED POLISH DIPLOMAT

Dr. Ludwik Krzyzanowski, attache to the Polish Consul General of New York, was the noted Guest speaker at Rabbi Goldstein's Bible Class last Monday night. He kindly consented to substitute for the originally scheduled speaker, Congressman Bruce Barton, who was forced to send his apologies because his membership on the House Foreign Relations Committee made his presence in Washington imperative during Neutrality legislation.

Dr. Krzyzanowski, whose subject was "The Polish Situation Today," spoke brilliantly on the conditions and circumstances leading to the outbreak of the current war, and on the hopes of Poland for the future. Particular heartening, he pointed out, is the determined Allied war aim to restore conquered Poland as well as dismembered Czechoslovakia. Already a Polish Government, now functioning in Paris, is recognized as constitutional by leading nations.

Europe, declared Dr. Krzyzanowski in closing, cannot be quieted until the destructive forces now in power in Germany are annihilated.

PREVENTION VERSUS CURE By RABBI EMANUEL L. LIFSCHITZ

It is said that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. Tons of curative literature are being distributed throughout our land in an effort to combat the virus of hate which is being fomented against the Jew by a handful of crackpot minds. Prevention, however, is an equally good, if not a better means of combat.

We Jews have much to do in determining the degree to which Americans may become gullible or immune to these scurrilous statements. This country has no inherent anti-Semitic tradition. One may, therefore, be reasonably certain that, by and large, American citizens gainfully employed have no interest in rabble rousers. Mr. Average American, by temperament, spurns any type of hatred and bigotry as oppressive. All he wants is work, friendships, peace, and a chance for self-fulfillment. Until very recently, all he knew about the Jew was what he was taught at Sunday School or what he read for himself in the Bible. And the Bible is still the world's best seller, - its authority is unquestioned.

Arguing the correctness of the stuff spoken by Coughlin and his kind will not convince people either way. The best way to belie these assertions is by a concrete, living demonstration of what the Jew really is as a highly ethical person, in the streets, offices, and factories of America; as one who is ready to serve his country in a wholesome and unobtrusive manner.

We must all recognize that in our every daily relationship we are ambassadors of our people entrusted with the mission of good will. Then, as people of sterling and unimpeachable character, acting in a manner befitting our sacred heritage, we should participate in all that is uplifting, worthy and positive in the American tradition, and look upon our Christian brethren as friends and co-workers with whom we share the great privilege of preserving, maintaining and fostering democratic ideals.

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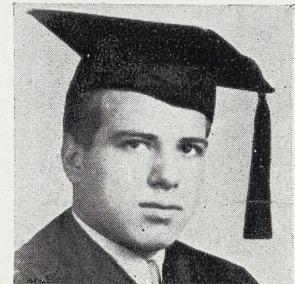
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OUR SUCCESSORS-TO-BE
