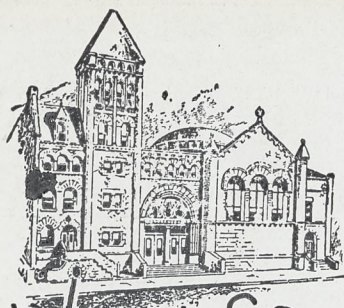

"PHONY" WAR

Almost daily, some super-statesman or ultra-profound editorial writer refers to the present situation as a "phony" war. The sole reason for this derogatory reference is that there is an apparent lack of destruction and murder on the Western Front.

If murder and destruction they must have, let the critics take a look eastwards. Mendel Mozes, refugee ex-chief of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency's Warsaw bureau, sent a dispatch from Vilna, which was printed in the press:

"The complete ruin and physical destruction of Polish Jewry under Hitler is a question of months, if not weeks.

"Every branch of life has already been closed to the Jews in the areas held by the Nazi troops, and some 1,500,000 of their numbers are threatened with starvation and extinction."

Nothing "phony" about that condition, is there? That ought to satisfy the most gory inclinations of our sadistically inclined.

However, there is one point that ought to be made clear, and should remain fixed in our minds, the immediate cause of this catastrophe.

That Hitler marched in and Hitler destroys we know. We also know that Stalin and the bloody Communists induced Hitler to march in

and made it possible for him to do so.

Some day there will be a reckoning. Some washday, when the world's dirty linen will be cleansed and hung out to dry, we shall be happy to see, hanging side by side, with bloody hands no longer dripping and murderous hearts no longer throbbing, the unspeakable Nazi and the filthy Communist.

Don't worry. There'll come a day. Soon, we pray.

OPTIMISTIC VIEWPOINT

The Rev. Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick, reconciling science with religion, expresses a point of view that is hopeful and refreshing.

"Across numberless ages mankind in segregated geographical localities worked out its inveterate differences, with all their accompanying prejudices—deep-seated prejudices of color, custom and religion—gathering around them the strongest emotions of the human heart. And now in a few centuries we are suddenly poured together, forced to live in a physical proximity for which we are not prepared by spiritual sympathy. The wonder is not prejudice; the wonder is that we have gone as far as we have with good-will.

"We sometimes hear it said that science denies religion. That seems to me nonsense. Science does not deny it—it demands religion. It is science that has thrown across these ancient, segregating boundaries the new, reticulated meshworks of intercommunication so that willy-nilly we have to live together.

"It is science that has forced on us these close proximities so that the United States and China are closer together now than Massachusetts and Georgia were when the Constitution of this nation was written."

CONSCIENCE

I.

Conscience is as a compass which God has put into every man's being by which he may, when in doubt, chart his course through life. Conscience is also the ambassador of God. Spiritual faults bring punishments and no amount of wealth, position or power can ease the torment of the soul that is chastened by Conscience. Despite the heights we may scale, upon a ladder of lies and stealth, we may never climb fast enough or high enough to outdistance "Conscience," the accuser within. A story is told about President Garfield that two men had approached him about some questionable deal. He refused to be a party to it. The men protested and said, "But it will be a secret." He replied, "Don't you know that every night I go to sleep with Mr. Garfield?"

Our conscience pervades us ever. It is omnipresent, like the Deity. We may well apply the words of the Psalmist, "Whither shall I go from Thy spirit? Or whither shall I flee from Thy presence? If I should ascend into heaven Thou art there; and if I should make my bed in the nether world, behold Thou art there."

I have said that we cannot escape the consequences of our deeds; I have said that we cannot escape God. Once men searched for Him, sought Him out, devoted their lives to discover a way toward God. Today we have no time for God, we try to escape Him. We have cast Him out.

Be not deceived. We cannot cast Him out. None of us can wander so far or travel so fast that we can outreach ourselves. Our own moral code is not enough. Man errs often in his sense of righteousness as applied to self, and even oftener in his judgment of others. "Every way of a man is straight in his own eyes," says the Psalmist. Jewish teaching has it that, "Man is closest to himself" and therefore he cannot and should not trust himself, for he may from time to time sully his conscience.

OUR BRETHREN THE WORLD OVER

A Jewish Reservation:

Hitler's diabolical intention to establish in conquered Poland the world's largest and most systematic ghetto is being carried out.

A narrow strip of land on the San River in the vicinity of the former Polish city of Lublin is the destination of bands of enforced exiles from various parts of the Reich. Poles in the region are being uprooted from their homes to make room for the unwilling Jews.

So far the largest numbers have been transported from Austria and the Slovakian protectorate. Nazis proclaimed that Vienna will be "Jew-free" by March 1, 1940. Already, 4,000 have been evacuated from the former Austrian capital. And in the Sudeten region of Maehrisch-Ostrau, hundreds more have been lined up, stripped of most of their possessions, and herded into railway cars en route to Lublin. Children of the exiles are being left behind, in care of the Jewish communities.

Far from actually establishing the promised homeland, Nazi officials in the new "reservation" are organizing the new arrivals into labor camps. The property that they leave behind is being confiscated for distribution to the German repatriates, who are streaming in from the new Russian sphere of influence on the Baltic.

"There's Plenty of Room in the Vistula:"

This has been the retort hurled into the faces of despairing Jews when they appealed to German officers for a haven during the devastation of Warsaw. Conditions in the Polish capital, as described by several refugees, remain appalling, with Poles and Jews alike suffering privation and misery. Anti-Semitic practices are still in force. Jews, for instance, are prohibited from drawing more than \$5 from their bank accounts.

Polish Refugees:

Little better off than their brethren at home are the 200,000 or so Poles,

He was one of that smallest of all classes into which mankind can be divided--of men who accumulate wealth without ever doing wrong, taking an advantage, or making an enemy; who become rich without being avaricious; who deny themselves the comforts of life, that they may acquire the means of promoting the comfort and elevating the conditions of their fellow men.

many of them Jews, who managed to flee before the Nazi invaders.

In Rumania alone there are 100,000 of these homeless, jobless, hopeless wanderers. Hungary has 50,000, and there are even 25,000 in Lithuania. Although some have found meagre shelter, many are so fearful of being sent back to Poland that they are roaming the countryside like stray animals.

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GAS MASKS FOR AMERICA

(Excerpts from address by Judge Jonah J. Goldstein)

Thank God, we have no gas attacks here. . . But we do have poisonous propaganda, and if we don't wear mental gas masks, we shall surely find ourselves poisoned.

Not all propaganda is imported; much of it arises within our own ranks. And most harmful is that kind which seeks to defame an entire race or nationality. How often have we heard: "I hate all Germans!?" But let us consider that there are tens of thousands of Germans--Christian Germans--who are in concentration camps because, as Christians, they refuse to be anti-Semitic.

No people has a monopoly on virtue, or on iniquity.

We Jews, as a people, must learn not to become "anti-Semitic" toward each other, or anti-anything toward others. When we carry old world discriminations into this country, they become ridiculous. Our ancestors, whether they were among the earliest emigrants to this country--the Dutch Jews--or whether they were among the later Spanish, German, Russian, Polish, Lithuanian, or other Jewish groups, all settled down to life in the new land as peddlers. How ridiculous it is that we have set up an aristocracy of peddlers!

THE FEDERATION OF JEWISH JUNIOR LEAGUES--

AN APPEAL FROM YOUTH

Early last year, the Junior Leagues of the several Synagogues in our community began to function along the same general lines as in the past. Among the youth groups, there was duplication of programs. There was also a membership problem, since the groups drew members from each other.

Later, the officers of a few of the Leagues realized the necessity of co-ordinating all the groups under a Federation. A meeting was held, and immediate plans made for the formation of the Federation of Jewish Junior Leagues. At that time, it was discovered that, although these groups were connected with Synagogues, there was considerable lack of knowledge concerning Jewish history and culture. As established in the constitution, the purpose of the organization is "to cultivate a spirit of Judaism in our Youth" and "to unite Jewish Youth in the defense of democracy in America, and of world peace."

The question now is: How have we attempted to accomplish these aims, and how do we expect to do so in the future?

The Federation now sponsors an annual inter-club debating tournament, and each month a group forum is held on timely Jewish problems. A Speakers' Bureau has been set up, through which affiliated Junior

ENLARGED SYMPATHIES

Jews with strong leanings toward assimilation have, in recent years, become quite aware of their Jewishness. Discrimination and mass Jewish suffering have helped them discover that they are members of the Jewish people, unable to escape the fate and destiny of Israel. This awareness has driven them from their snug and cozy emotional shell of spiritual well-being. They have become panicky and frightened.

But, what of this awareness? Does it mitigate and lessen their anxiety, or intensify it? Does it simplify life processes, or make them more complicated? Becoming aware of one's Jewish self without doing anything about it makes for atrophy of the spirit. A feeling of being apart from the majority of peoples in the world, and yet not being caught up in the rhythm of a planned Jewish reconstructive life makes for emptiness. To be aware of the cleavage without fusing oneself with a fortifying hope or ideal is like riding the sea in a rudderless ship — like being engulfed by waves of helplessness and frustration.

Jews are a nationality. There is no secret about it. By becoming part and parcel of the Jewish people, by sharing its woes, its sorrows and joys, by participating in its redemption from the Galut and its regeneration in the land of Israel, we can render our Jewishness no longer irksome, but a stimulating, vitalizing tonic in our life. Nor need anyone fear that identification with one's people and homeland makes for a diminished American loyalty. At this moment, there are millions of Poles and Czechs dedicated to the restoration of their respective countries. As American citizens, they are lending their moral, financial and political support. They are not less American because of their enlarged sympathies. In fact, devotion to one's historical, cultural and national traditions is the keynote to Americanism. We, as Jews, will find redemption in confirming our Jewishness.

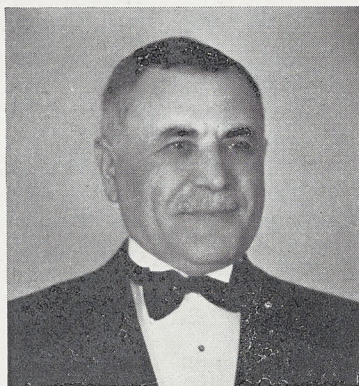
GETTING PERSONAL
