WOMEN'S OPEN MEETING

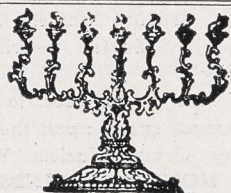

Hostesses at the social hour following the meeting were Mrs. Ettie Jaffin, Mrs. Max E. Sanders and Mrs. Morris Steinberg.

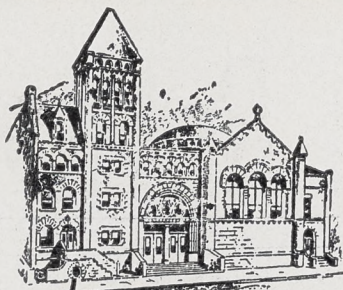

COMMANDMENT NUMBER ONE AND BIRTH CONTROL

The Bible contains תרי"ג 613 Commandments. The first commandment is found in the First Chapter of Genesis, Verse 28, "Be fruitful and multiply."

"Be fruitful" is both a blessing and a command to have children; "and multiply" means that we must leave the race more numerous than we found it. The Prophet Isaiah gave a generalization of the Divine policy on this subject as follows: "For thus hath said the Lord who created the heavens; God Himself who formed the earth and made it. He hath established it. Not in vain hath He created it. He formed it to be inhabited." The Rabbis point out in the Talmud, Niddah 13a, that the gravest sin, and the one which was responsible for the destruction of the generation of the Flood, was the custom of husbands and wives living the married life without the possibility of propagation.

At first the female was called "Ishah," "Woman," the companion to Adam; later she was called "Chava," "Eve," the mother of all living. Woman reaches her highest and most exalted function in motherhood. This lofty and eternal privilege of woman cannot be degraded because of ignoble and selfish ease on the part of our young people.

Often the legitimacy of birth control is justified because of the economic question. As a matter of fact, birth control is usually practiced by those of the middle and well-to-do classes. Judaism recognizes, however, exceptional cases where birth control is permitted. In certain cases, to be sure, where health is involved, the Rabbis (See the Responsa literature) have indicated methods for legitimate birth control. In such cases, the laity should not take the law into their own hands, but should seek counsel from the proper religious authorities. Indiscriminate birth control is against the law of God, "Be fruitful and multiply."

OUR BRETHREN THE WORLD OVER

In Europe:

From the Nazi-occupied sections of former Polish West Galicia comes news of the most vicious and severe oppression of Jews since this war began.

It is reported that, in several sections, entire portions of the Jewish population have been massacred, and that only charred ruins of Synagogues and overcrowded cemeteries give witness to the Jewish communities that once existed there.

Severe too is the plight of Jews attempting to flee from German-occupied Poland into Soviet territory. Several thousands have found themselves barred from Soviet territory and marooned without food or shelter in a narrow stretch of "No Man's Land" between the two borders. The harried refugees, upon turning back, find that border guards will not re-admit them into German territory.

Promise of some measure of relief in the near future is contained in the recent announcement of the American Red Cross that immediate relief supplies are being sent to Poland in accordance with satisfactory arrangements made with the German Government for the impartial distribution of these supplies. The relief will take the form of hospital supplies and warm clothing.

A Great Loss:

Jewish circles the world over mourned the loss last week of Reuben Brainin, noted Hebrew writer and Zionist leader, who died in New York. Mr. Brainin, a delegate to the first World Zionist Congress, began his activities for a Jewish homeland long before the Zionist movement was officially launched.

Joint Distribution Committee:

At the annual meeting of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee in Chicago, several speakers attested to the fact that direct Government action in behalf of political refugees is nearer at hand than at any time since the current refugee problem arose.

The Committee re-elected Paul Daerwald as chairman. Edward M. M. Warburg was elected co-chairman, a new post.

ORTHODOX JEWISH INSTITUTIONS IN NEW YORK CITY

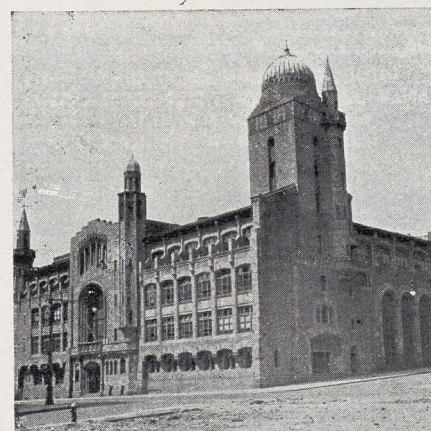
YESHIVA COLLEGE

It is fitting that we launch a series of articles on New York's orthodox Jewish institutions with Yeshiva College, one of America's proudest monuments of Jewish learning and culture.

Yeshiva College is the only college of liberal arts and sciences in the world under Jewish auspices. It is authorized to offer courses leading to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Sciences, and to confer those degrees. It is an integral part of the Yeshiva, the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary, which was incorporated in 1896, later absorbing the Yeshiva Eitz Chaim, the oldest Yeshiva on American soil, founded in 1896. The institution in its entirety is known as the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary and Yeshiva College. Other departments of the Yeshiva, the first traditional center of Torah study and research on this continent, are: the Teachers' Institute; the Yeshiva Graduate School; and the Talmudic Academy (the academic high school).

The buildings of Yeshiva College, which stand on a large plot in Washington Heights, are the main college building, an auditorium, and a dormitory. On the ground floor of the main building are a well equipped gymnasium and the circulation library. On the first floor are a Synagogue, the Lamport Study Hall, offices and seminar rooms. Above these are a large library and two floors of classrooms and faculty and conference rooms. The top floor is given over to art rooms, advisors' offices and thoroughly modern scientific laboratories. The main auditorium is a high, well-proportioned chamber with seating capacity of over 1,100 and excellent acoustics. The dormitory is fully equipped with kitchens for the preparation of food in the orthodox Jewish manner. 200 resident students may be accommodated.

Although only completing the twelfth year of its work and having graduated but 250 men in eight commencements, Yeshiva College has established an excellent reputation through its alumni among the graduate and professional schools. Yeshiva graduates have won scholarships and fellowships both in

Harvard University Law School and the Law School of Columbia University. Other famous schools where graduates of Yeshiva have made their mark are: the University of London; the Hebrew University, Jerusalem; the medical schools of Johns Hopkins and the University of Chicago; and the graduate London School of Economics.

The select College faculty, headed by Dr. Bernard Revel, is strengthened by outstanding members of the faculties of other colleges and universities in the metropolitan area.

Yeshiva College is, by design, a small college with a body of select students, all of whom are required to pursue an approved program of Jewish studies in addition to the regular curriculum of the liberal arts colleges. It aims to educate liberally, as well as Jewishly, young men who consider the understanding of the culture and faith of historic Judaism an integral part of the equipment to be acquired during the college years. The Yeshiva and Teachers' Institute have not only sent forth approximately 400 teachers and Rabbis, who have been preaching and teaching Judaism in the genuine Jewish spirit, but have also sent forth thousands of men who have entered the professions and business and who form a group of Jewishly intelligent laymen, the virtual backbone of the perpetuation of traditional Judaism in America.

THE CRUSE

In the midst of the titanic spiritual struggles with which each of us is faced from time to time; in the debris of our moral, spiritual and emotional collapses resulting from life's crushing experiences, there is, upon careful search, to be found in every man a little cruse of steadfast and calm spirituality, a little cruse containing an indestructible faith in God and in His ultimate goodness.

In the days of the ancient Hasmoneans, when the Greeko-Syrians defiled and ravaged the Temple at Jerusalem, when our people were sorely pressed by the enemy and the lamp of Israel's hope burned low; in those days when many forsook the Torah and yielded to the Grecian manner, there was discovered amid the ruins of the Temple a little cruse of oil bearing the seal of the High Priest. It was thought to contain enough oil to illuminate the Temple of God for but a day. But a miracle was granted, and it burned brightly for eight days, each day gaining in cumulative intensity, until a fresh permanent supply of oil could be made.

Similarly in our own lives, when it begins to appear that life is losing its purpose, when ill health pursues us and pessimism overtakes us, when difficult problems and seemingly insurmountable obstacles face us and we are ready to yield to the belief that our temple of health, opportunity, success and happiness is in a heap of ruins; at that moment there is ever present in the midst of the apparent ruins a little cruse of spirituality containing an indestructible faith and promise for restoration and regeneration. In this cruse there are the elements of renewed strength, renewed health and vitality, renewed faculties with which victoriously to meet the battle of life.

Once one has discovered the cruse of faith, he has girded himself with the forces to drive the enemies, fear and uncertainty, from the sanctum of mind and emotions.
