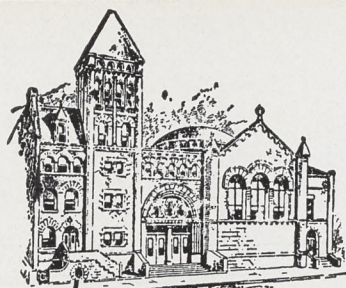
## YOUNG FOLK'S ROUND TABLE

## THE RATS ARE SQUEALING

Squealing is a tradition among the famed rodent tribes. Without ideals, making no contribution except as carriers of infection and destroyers of goods, they are given to lurking in dark corners, furtively darting hither and yon, bent on their nefarious missions.

However, let a little light penetrate the murk in which they are wont to be most at home, the biggest and most destructive of the tribe promptly react according to best rat tradition, by squealing.

Such is the source whence emanates the term "squealing" so popular among the biological monstrosity known as the racketeer, the cowardly, vicious, parasitic adhesion on the wounds of mankind. The term indicates the terror that seizes upon the evildoer, facing retribution at the hands of the law.

In true, rat-like or racketeer form, our local Communazi rodents are beginning to squeal on one another. Former Comrade General Krivitzky, having become surfeited with blood-letting, and having escaped the letting of his own blood in the purge, visited us and "squealed" considerably on his former pals. ## MOURNING PREFERRED

For decades, we build up the personification of an ideal in some historic character, like truthful George Washington, honest Abe Lincoln or thrifty Benjamin Franklin, only to have some zealous and persevering research "noodnick" dig up the evidence that shatters one's faith.

Now, along comes a Pennsylvania banker, with an investigating inclination, who has dug up Ben Franklin's banking records, to disclose that thrifty Ben's bank account was overdrawn on the average of about three times a week.

Of course, being overdrawn is nothing new, as a rule, as any depositor, lady or gentleman, knows. Banks are notoriously bad at arithmetic and frequently send checks back by mistake. At least, that is the stock explanation by a depositor whose writing ability exceeds his financial responsibility.

But for the great Ben to overdraw, and frequently at that, is a severe shock. We have always pointed to him as the epitome of thrift and financial carefulness.

It looks as if we shall have to dig up a new hero, with whose virtues we may impress the young and the not-so-young who suffer from arithmetical vagaries. But we are sore nevertheless.

## THE FOURTH COMMANDMENT

### II

Since the Bible says that Passover must be in the month of spring and Succoth in the period of harvesting, if we simply allow the lunar year to proceed without any leap years, in the course of time we would celebrate Passover in the winter and Succoth in the summer. For that reason, the leap year was instituted and we have 7 leap years in every 19 years. Because we lose in each year about 11 days, in 19 years the loss amounts to 209 days, or 7 months. Thus we have 7 leap years in 19 years. The leap years occur in the third, sixth, eighth, eleventh, fourteenth, seventeenth and nineteenth years of each 19 year cycle. In this way, we harmonize the solar and the lunar years. When leap year occurs, we add another month to Adar, calling it Adar II. There is a difference of opinion as to whether the setting of the new moon and the creation of the leap year are separate commandments. According to Maimonides (Rambam), they are one, and according to Nachmonides (Ramban), they are two. The Law is with Maimonides. Since Hillel, (the Palestinian), the months and the years have been set according to the astronomical calendar, which he arranged.

The sanctification of the month and the season is dependent upon Israel, while the sanctification of the Seventh Day is not up to Israel. The first seven days represent God's creation. Israel sanctifies time. Israel takes a new moon day or any other day, like Passover, Tabernacles or Pentecost, which would have been ordinary, secular days, and transforms them into consecrated, uplifting days of our lives. Thus, in exile or persecution, the Jew is above time. He even makes a holiday out of a blackout day in his life. This thought was suggested by a remark of the late Chief Rabbi, Kook of the Holy Land.

## OUR BRETHREN THE WORLD OVER

Rigid enforcement of the 8 o'clock curfew for Prague Jews began suddenly one day last week after a long period of only lax observance of the law. Police raided restaurants and coffee houses and arrested all Jews they found there or on the streets.

Reports from Paris last week linked the recent German decrees drafting all able-bodied Jews in Nazi Poland and 30,000 Berlin Jews with a project for the construction of a Berlin-Moscow automobile highway through Poland. The highway is expected to supplement Russia's inefficient railway system in shipping Soviet goods to Nazi Germany.

\* \* \*

Leon Mizrachy, newly elected President of the Rumanian Zionist Congress, made one of his first official acts the sending of a cablegram to the United States Zionist organization asking increased aid for German and Polish Jews, approximately 1,500 of whom are stranded in Rumania. Mizrachy also cabled British authorities requesting an increase in Palestine's immigration quota.

\* \* \*

According to a dispatch from Jerusalem, British military authorities have given prison sentences to 38 young Jews, including four girls, who were arrested for bearing arms and drilling in violation of last October's Palestine emergency regulations. The move was interpreted as part of the British effort to stamp out the Palestine Jewish Army, which was founded by militant Jewish Nationalists in Palestine who despaired of receiving aid from the British in ending attacks by Arabs.

\* \* \*

Beside holding up shiploads of provisions bound for Nazi Germany, the freezing of the Danube River, due to the intense Central European cold weather, has stranded many barges and steamers carrying Jewish refugees at various Danubian ports. Few of the vessels carrying refugees were built to withstand the ravages of ice and snow, and the plight of the Jews is made worse

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## A JEW'S LIFE WORK

In our world, mad with prejudice and persecution and crippled by unemployment, the young Jew is faced with a great problem. What is the young Jew to do with his life? How far will he get, and what can he do to alleviate the status of his brethren? How can he keep himself free of the ill effects of a vicious opposition that saddens the hearts of even the best of men?

The Jew's only solution lies in living a life--choosing a life work--in which he may create not only good service or good products, but good will as well. Good will for his brethren can be created only by one who is content in his life work, one who finds delight in the zestful drive toward his own personal goal. The young Jew must work and earn his happiness so that he can transmit it to others. No man can give that which he has not.

Parents, admittedly, have the responsibility of guiding their children toward the attainment of happiness. Since happiness must be earned, it then becomes the parental duty to aid the child in finding that work for which he is ideally suited, physically, emotionally and temperamentally.

Let parents reflect that it is far better to be a good tailor than a poor doctor; that a happy and good business man is to be envied by a mediocre lawyer who does not find satisfaction in his work. Let parents ask themselves: "What will our son make of his life? Are we really giving him the opportunity we didn't have, or are we forcing upon him those things that we missed in life but that he perhaps doesn't want? Will our son find happiness in the work we have chosen for him; or will he be content in the

"Be strong and of good courage". These were the significant words which God spoke to Joshua when He invested him with the task of leading his people into the Promised Land. Joshua's responsibility was a difficult one. Israel was on the march. Hostile tribes had to be met. Food had to be secured and provision made for the safety and comfort of the women and children. Mountainous country had to be traversed. Nevertheless he did not flinch. Undergirded with faith, he pursued his goal.

Every worthwhile goal in life is preceded by difficult obstacles. The courage-less person starts out in life with a sense of defeat and failure. He merely exists, and so falls into accepted patterns. He is willing to take what he finds. He seeks comfort in an inherited social position, finds employment in an established business. To attain a goal, however, is different. It requires planning, dreaming, praying, thinking concerning it and toiling for it. To achieve a worthwhile goal in life takes more than mere wishful thinking concerning success. It necessitates the tapping of your undiscovered powers and mental resources. In a word, it requires consistent courage.

There are young men and women entering into the world with a false conception of the true meaning of living. They are being shielded by indulgent parents anxious to spare their children the hardships with which they themselves had to cope in their struggle to achieve their present position. These young people are becoming soft. They are being misled as to the nature of living. Living means the willingness to surmount obstacles, to grapple with odds, to learn to adjust oneself to unpleasant situations.

To the young men and women in our day, standing on the threshold of life expectantly viewing their goals, we say CHAZAK VEEMOTZ "Be strong and of good courage".

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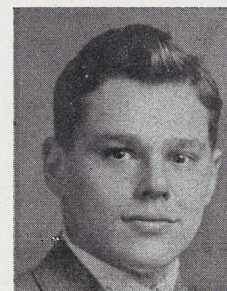
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## OUR SUCCESSORS-TO-BE
