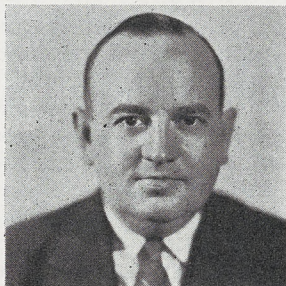
CLUB SHIPBOARD DANCE

SCOUT WEEK PROGRAM

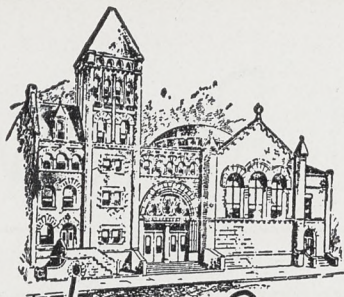

THE OPERA HOUSE

The Met has launched a drive to raise \$1,000,000. It deserves to succeed and should be helped by all, regardless of whether or not we attend the opera or are opera lovers.

Opera is true democracy and internationalism. One may be at war with the Germans but, simultaneously, enjoy German music. Russia may be raping Finland, but we can still attend a Sunday night concert and hear the orchestra play Tschaiikowsky and Sibelius on one program.

Opera rises above mean, petty, grasping provincialism, and broadens the viewpoint. It is an all-enveloping cloak of brotherhood, worthy of being relined with the golden support of the populace.

Respond to the Met appeal at once. Join the international fraternity of culture, which accepts God's gifts in the human packages in which they come, regardless of race, creed or color.

IMPUDENCE PREFERRED

It is strange indeed how some individuals lose, if they ever possess, any sense of perspective. If people could only see themselves as others see them, they would not make themselves so ridiculous.

We are thinking of a certain politician, or so he is regarded in the district club-house, who served several terms in jail, whose legal wife

is serving a long term as an habitual criminal, thereby enabling him to take unto himself another wife without benefit of clergy, and who, after becoming a prosperous bootlegger, got up in the club-house and made a speech to the effect that it was no longer a place for decent people to come into. This man became infuriated at Governor Lehman for some reason or other and regrets to this day that he elected him. He really thinks his vote elected the governor.

Now along comes another, who also regrets electing Governor Lehman. We refer to Comrade Browder who cannot get through his head that Commies and Nazis are not above the law. They feel that since they make the laws where they are in control, no law should apply to them. The comrades who testified against him (now called comrats) should have been purged according to Browder. And, above all, the direst purge should be directed against Governor Lehman who, the Commies say, was elected by them and failed to rescue Browder.

Yes, Americans are degenerates. They insist on giving their children milk and water. In Italia, milk is a luxury for the rich and water is unsafe. So the children revel in wine.

"THE PASCAL LAMB," THE SIXTH, SEVENTH and EIGHTH COMMANDMENTS

The 6th Commandment deals with the eating of the Pascal Lamb. This commandment had to be carried out on the night of the 15th of Nisan, "And they shall eat the meat on that night, broiled with fire" (Exodus, Chapter 12, verse 8). Each person was to eat at least a כזית (a portion the size of an olive). It is interesting to note that we have here the first positive commandment in the Bible enjoining us to eat.

The 7th Commandment is a negative commandment forbidding us to eat of the Pascal Lamb, either in a raw or in a boiled state. The Bible says, "Eat not of it raw, nor sodden at all with water, but broil it with fire." (Exodus, Chapter 12, verse 9.) The water referred to in this verse includes any liquid or fruit juice. The punishment for the violation of this commandment was stripes. We were bidden to eat the Pascal Lamb only when it was broiled because that was the way the princes and freemen ate their meat. The poorer classes could not afford this. Broiling causes the quantity of meat to shrink, whereas boiling causes the meat to become inflated. The poor had to consider all this.

Furthermore, broiled meat also indicates haste. The Israelites were forced to leave Egypt in haste and therefore they had no time for any but the most speedy process of preparing their food.

The 8th commandment bids us not to leave any meat of the Pascal Lamb over for the next morning, namely for the 15th day of Nisan, for the Bible says, "And ye shall let nothing of it remain until the morning" (Exodus, Chapter 12, verse 10). The reason for this is that princes and freemen do not have to be economical and leave meat or other food from one meal to another.

OUR BRETHREN THE WORLD OVER

Things are indeed not what they used to be in the Men's Clothing Industry. A recent survey of 5,720 workers in the industry found that Italian workers now outnumber considerably the Jewish workers. 56.1 per cent of all the workers were Italians, while only 38.6 per cent were found to be Jews.

The Joint Distribution Committee, making an estimate on reports received to date, conjectures that more than 250,000 Jews have died in Poland since September 1. Causes of death are listed as military operations, disease and starvation. The report further states that 80 per cent of the remaining 1,250,000 Jews have been reduced to beggary. Nor is suffering limited to Nazi Poland. Also in the Soviet occupied areas, the JDC finds, the 600,000 Jews who have taken refuge there are almost all destitute.

Enforced labor for Polish Jews became a fact last week with the publication of a decree requiring that all Jewish males between the ages of 12 and 60 report for at least 2 years of such work. The term, in every case, is subject to extension.

Reports from the Reich state that Jewish physicians are now being mobilized for army work. It is said that a special uniform, bearing the inscription "Juedischer Arzt," has been introduced for these new recruits.

At least 60,000 Jews are serving with the French forces on the Western front, according to a recent announcement of the French League to Combat Anti-Semitism. The announcement was made with the knowledge of military authorities.

OUR SCHOOL SYSTEM

(Excerpts from an address by Dr. Harold G. Campbell, Superintendent of Schools in New York City)

Our school system has been described as 70 systems in one. Its 1,100,000 children make up the sixth largest city in the United States. About \$147,000,000 is being spent on our schools this year.

There has been much talk about the shortage of seats in our schools. There have often been more seats than students. The trouble is that the children and the seats are not always in the same place. Population shifts in New York are amazing. The school system always has the problem of following the population from one part of the city to another.

Among the interesting closeups of details in our school system is the manner in which all experiments of teachers, teacher groups and principals in the direction of individualizing education are passed on to others. Examples are the growth of the Vocational Schools, for students who plan not to attend college but to enter an industry. These are being established in co-operation with the various industries. Also, a child guidance program seeks to study all factors in the environment of children in a given community. Psychological and psychiatric surveys seek to iron out the underlying causes of maladjustments. Such a program seeks to organize an entire community toward the solving of children's educational problems.

We are concerned not only with the education of a child, but with the development of his ability to face the problems of life—in short, we are concerned with his whole development.

ORTHODOX JEWISH INSTITUTIONS IN NEW YORK CITY
HEBREW SHELTERING AND IMMIGRANT AID SOCIETY

Refugees from war-torn Europe, seen in "Father Abraham's Hotel" on the way to the dining room, where a kosher meal awaits them.

"Father Abraham's Hotel" is the name bestowed upon the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society's building at 425 Lafayette Street by the myriads of grateful refugees who find temporary lodging in this haven of hospitality in a new land.

This Society, which is a modern chapter in the age-old Jewish tradition of looking after the needs of refugees from oppression, came into existence in the 1880's, when the first wave of Jewish refugees—at that time from Czarist Russia—began to beat against the shores of the land of the free. In the decades that have elapsed since then, the HIAS has taken upon itself the many tasks involved in giving truly brotherly help to refugees. Its tasks have included advising the prospective immigrant in the selection of his routes, helping him to find his way through the maze of official red tape, guiding him en route, protecting him against the dangers that lurk from every corner, and, when need be, sheltering him upon arrival until he finds his bearing and adjusts himself, linguistically and economically, to his new environment.

Today, when the problems of a war torn world have stepped up the work of the HIAS, its headquarters in the former Astor Library Building are crowded and teeming with feverish activity. Long queues of American relatives wait in front of

the Information Desk, seeking guidance in their efforts to bring their relatives here. In another part of the building, newly arrived refugees unpack their meagre belongings in preparation for a brief stay at the hotel until relatives or friends will call for them. In a huge dining room, kosher meals are served to more than 300 persons at a sitting. In a spacious auditorium, former burghers of Vienna, Munich, Berlin and other cities of the Reich, assemble for instruction in English and Civics, in the Americanization Classes which are being conducted for the benefit of the new arrivals.

Abraham Herman, President, and Isaac L. Asofsky, Executive Director of HIAS have well in hand the heightened activity of the organization due to the difficulties caused by wartime dangers. The service which the organization maintains in 32 countries abroad is gradually adjusting itself to the new situation.

An amazing record was achieved during the month of November, 1939, alone. Refugees from 33 steamers were met by HIAS pier workers. 541 of the new arrivals were sheltered by the organization, where the sheltering capacity has been increased by two floors. In the same period, the organization's employment bureau secured business opportunities and occupations for 150 of the immigrants.

ACCIDENT OR CHOICE

Some Jews accept their Judaism as an accident of birth, while others affirm it with a conscious and voluntary allegiance. To the former, Judaism is a burden and an inconvenience. Its disciplines thwart them in their pursuit of life. To the latter, however, the Torah is the instrument for the ultimate salvation of the world.

The Jewish people, therefore, has a great responsibility and a unique task to perform in modern civilization. For Judaism is a divine moral and social way of life, dedicated to the task of establishing a universal brotherhood of people and a fellowship of faiths, each endeavoring to achieve spiritual upliftment and permanent happiness.

Judaism softens the hearts of those who live for themselves alone. Through its traditions and practices, it gives luster to those whose lives are emotionally colorless. Judaism, through divine worship, brings man's soul into communion with God. Judaism echoes the optimistic note struck by the prophet, Isaiah: "The wolf shall dwell with the lamb." With the improved world order, there must come a greater measure of individual joy and self-fulfillment.

These are days of spiritual darkness and moral confusion and it is apparent that so many have lost their faith in God, because the forces of evil have asserted themselves in the world. The human heart has sunk to the level of barbarism. Contracts between nations have lost their binding powers and men fail to live up to assumed obligations. Human personality has lost its intrinsic value, for innocent men, women and children, blind and sick, are, without a flicker of conscience, killed. In this sad hour, we Jews must steadfastly carry out our ancient mandate, which confers upon us the task of being the keepers of the Torah and transmitting it to those who follow us, so that, through its teachings, enduring social justice and peace may prevail and the abundant life become the privilege of all.
