PROMINENT SCIENTIST GUEST AT FORUM

Monday evening, March 18, following Rabbi Goldstein's Bible Class, Mr. Abraham Balfour, distinguished scientist will address the Forum. His subject will be "Science in the Bible". Mr. Balfour will explain the references made to Leprosy in the 13th and 14th Chapters of Leviticus.

Born in Manchester England, in 1892, Mr. Balfour left England with his family at an early age to live in India His mother was a Mohammedan and his father an Episcopalian. Mr. Balfour, at a later age embraced the Jewish faith.

He graduated Kahalsa College, Amrista, India, and returned to England to study at the Universities of Oxford and Edinburgh. In 1920 he went back to India for research work in tropical diseases

Mr. Balfour accepted an invitation of the Government of Ethiopia to establish a leprosarium at Abbis Aquila. He remained in Ethiopia for 14 years, coming to America after the Italian conquest.

At the present time Mr. Balfour is engaged in research in the field of nutrition.


This year the Entertainment Committee is headed by Mrs. David H. Ullman. She has an extraordinary talent for providing expert talent for your enjoyment.

OFFERING HIS LIFE

On Heroes Memorial Day in Berlin, Hitler read a sombre address, in which he most patriotically offered his life for his country. Though the offer was only a rhetorical one and probably made with tongue in cheek, it is about time such a sacrifice, if that is the proper name for it, be made.

To-date, Hitler has sacrificed many lives other than his own; the lives of thousands of persecuted Jews and Christians in Germany and conquered countries; of Czechs and Poles; and not omitting the lives of Roehm and the rest of Hitler's own gang who helped him rise to power, only to be stabbed in the back.

Yes Adolf, do not just talk about sacrificing your life but go ahead and do it, ridding the world, at the same time, of a scourge of filth and beastliness.

THE IDES OF MARCH

The Ides of March are here today. From our high-school years, when we sat overawed with the spirit of foreboding, as we read the soothsayer's solemn warning to Julius Caesar, "Beware the Ides of March," we have never lived through so momentous a time as the present.

Beware" seems to be the word of the day. On all sides, the world is beset by threats; on the part of gangsters, national and international; by false prophets stirring up race hatred, false economists stirring up class ill-will, and generally false leadership, seeking to perpetuate itself in power by crushing all opposition.

Sometimes, the unexpected happens. Maybe this is the time. Perhaps, and let us hope so, the Ides of March presage the early reawakening of the conscience of the world, so that morality, honesty and godliness will again become the basis of human intercourse.

DEMOCRACY and RELIGION

Rabbi Goldstein in his sermon last Saturday morning said in part:

'What is religion's most needed message to the world today? My answer is, "Democracy." Religion and democracy are synonymous. Democracy is a definition of religion. When we think of the fatherhood of God, we must naturally come to the cardinal doctrine of the brotherhood of man. In other words, if we believe in God as the Universal Father of us all, we must believe in our neighbor as part of the common brotherhood of man.

The Bible, in no uncertain terms, lays down the law of the half-shekel, that the rich shall not give more nor the poor less in the membership support of the Tabernacle and the Temple. This is to serve as a religious symbol of the equality of all of us in the eyes of God. The rich are neither an object of contempt nor an object of admiration. They are just on a par with their poor fellow-man.

The law of the half-shekel indicates that every one of us is always to feel spiritually in a fractional state. Materially, we may be satisfied with what we have. We may be complete, whole and contented in whatever fortune we possess, but in the spiritual realm, we are only halves, - fractions, and we may never be satisfied. We must always be weaving the thread of our spiritual picture for eternal destiny. Every spiritual act makes for a religious habit; every religious habit makes for a divine character and every divine character makes for eternal destiny or immortality'

THE 16th COMMANDMENT

The 16th Commandment bids us not to break a bone of the meal of the Pascal Lamb, for it is said in Exodus, Chapter 12, verse 46, "Neither shall ye break a bone thereof." Since we became a princely, free people, it ill befits us on the holiday celebrating that event, to grovel with bones and to break them as dogs do. Here we have, first, the evidence of what the rabbis say that "where there is wealth, there should be no sign of poverty." A man who enjoys wealth should not stint in his household expenses, and certainly not in regard to charity.
We must not act "small" where we can afford to be liberal. Secondly, we have here a law which raises our status as human beings. The rabbis have always made the point that because God has created us above the beast, we are to indicate the higher kingdom which we enjoy, both by the way we eat and the way

The question may be raised, why do we need all these detailed ceremonies to remind us of the Exodus from Egypt. I wonder if we ever stop to consider that all life is made up largely of ceremony. What is a ceremony? A ceremony is a physical act which expresses a spiritual idea. Let me illustrate. If you meet a lady in the street and raise your hat, this is a ceremony which expresses by the physical act, the spiritual idea of gallantry. When you shake hands with your neighbor, this is a physical act expressing the spiritual idea of friendship. When you salute the flag, this is a ceremony expressing a spiritual idea, namely that of civic loyalty. If we fail to do any of these ceremonies, we would be considered as ungallant, unfriendly and disloval. It is only when it comes to religion that we balk and speak of "so much ceremony".

JEWISH EDUCATION -A WEAPON OF DEFENSE By MORRIS JABLOW

We are constantly assailed by raucous, blatant voices, preaching racial hatreds. In the preachments against Jews, little heed is paid to truth, the theory being that lies uttered often and loud enough will be believed.

One powerful weapon which can be used effectively to refute the many malicious lies, is truth. Unfortunately, we do not always take advantage of that weapon, for the simple reason that many do not have the knowledge necessary to distinguish between truth and falsehood.

To equip our children with that weapon of defense, we should give them a Jewish education, teach them the history of our glorious past and enlighten them on the magnificent contribution made by Jews to civilization and humanity.

If our children do not receive a Jewish education, they stand defenseless before the onslaught of vicious lies. Once we equip them with the weapon of knowledge, they are enabled to meet attacks with courage and conviction.

Knowledge of the truth, acquired through Jewish education will be the means of making our children standerect. They will become proud of the Jewish blood coursing through their veins, when they learn of the countless numbers of Jews who have devoted their lives and achieved undying fame in the fields of science, art, literature and philanthropy.

BOOK REVIEW

Bible Comments For Home Reading "Joshua" by Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein

Hebrew Publishing Company 1938

It has been an age-old tradition in the Jewish home to study the weekly portion of the Torah with the classical commentaries as well as the edifying and illuminating biblical comments contained in the Midrash.

Because of such close attachment to the Bible we, as a people, came to be known as the "people of the book." We developed into a spiritual and God conscious society; a people fortified with faith and quickened by transcending ideals and purposes in life. It was the eternal verities and assurances contained in the Torah that gave courage to Israel to persevere in its mission and destiny notwithstanding the inquisitions, pogroms and perennial exiles suffered.

Yet, with the gradual decline in Hebrew literacy in our day, and despite the access to English translations of the Bible, there appears a considerable decline in the traditional understanding of the Bible. The result has been felt in the dimunition of the religious attitude and the spiritual interpretation of life

Rabbi Goldstein has set himself the task of recapturing and preserving in the English language, the inspiring and sustaining thoughts and interpretations contained in the classical, biblical commentaries.

The first five books of the Bible comprising the Pentateuch were published some time ago. The most recent addition to the series is the Book of Joshua, the first of the early prophetic writings.

Rabbi Goldstein's labors have not been duplicated in the various attempts made by other biblical scholars. We therefore urge our readers and friends to procure the books in order properly to understand the Torah and thus enrich themselves from our abiding spiritual and literary heritage.
