

BISHOP McINTYRE

Our brethren of the Catholic faith recently celebrated the elevation of Father James F. A. McIntyre to the position of Bishop. We extend to the new Bishop and to his flock our best wishes for peace and happiness. We also hope that his reign will be marked by brotherly love and goodwill to those of other faiths.

To Jews, many of the ceremonies connected with the inauguration of the Bishop were reminiscent of, to a large extent, our ritual for the induction of the high priest in Temple times.

The consecration of a Priest in our Temple was effected by his being anointed with oil and having both hands of another priest placed upon his head. In the report of the inauguration of the new Bishop we read that he was anointed with oil and that "Archbishop Spellman. . touched with both hands the head of the kneeling priest", and "In that very instant, through the simple but essential rite, the bowed priest became a Bishop."

THE 50th COMMANDMENT

The 50th Commandment deals with that form of punishment that is exercised by the sword. For transgressing certain few of the commandments we are commanded to slay the transgressor by the sword. Punishments by means of the sword, our Rabbis say come under the category of "to slay". This is an easy death. Easier than this is strangulation.

He who smites his slave, even his Canaanitic slave, is slain by the sword. For the Bible says in Exdous, Chapter 21 Verse 20 "And if a man smite his slave or his maid with a

rod and he die, he shall be surely punished". Commenting upon this verse, our Rabbis say, that this punishment is through the sword.

God wanted to uproot from His people a heart that might become so brutal that it could allow it to rise to such anger that it would slay any human being, even one's slave. We must always remember that a slave was regarded as one's possession. One thinks he can do as he pleases with his own possession. Therefore, the Torah commanded us that anyone who will permit himself to get so enraged that it will lead him to slay even his slave, he himself should be put to death. Even though after all is said and done he has lost his money through the loss of his slave, and thereby suffers punishment because of his wrath, nevertheless the Torah wants us to control ourselves. Anger and rage are deprecated to the nth degree by our Holy Torah. Thus we say that "the statutes of the Lord are true, right altogether." Because at first, the slave was regarded as a chattel. Chattel-owners assumed the privilege of acting as they like with them. Thus the Torah, whilst on the one hand recognizing that a condition of slavery existed, denies unto the owner any cruel treatment that he may believe he can rashly accord his slave.

which we have symbolically repeated each Yom Kippur throughout the ages. This too was followed literally in the recent inauguration services.

The Bishop was greeted with the words "Peace be with you" (Sholom Aleichem).

Toward the end of the service Bishop McIntyre presented the Cathedral with two lighted candles, two small casks of wine, and two loaves of bread. We are told that "this symbolic offering dates back to early Christian times, when offerings in kind for the maintenance of public worship were commonly made." Every Saturday morning, after "Yikum Purkon" we pray for those who form synagogues and for "those who give lamps for a light and wine for Kiddush and Habdalah, bread to wayfarers."

In this, as well as in various other matters, the Roman Catholic Church has copied many beautiful ceremonies which are found in our religion. Let us hope that they will heed the motto "Into the well from which thou hast drunk do not cast stones".

Forward we advance the cry of let my people go, on like a mounting wave sweeping all in its wake and breaking the rock of bondage. We are the wave of the future, the wave of liberty, Hitler the last ripple of Paganism. Jewry must. stand united and eternal, it is our will, it is God's will.

THE U. P. A. CONVENTION By RABBI EMANUEL L. LIFSCHITZ

Last Sunday fifteen hundred delegates, gathered from the forty eight states, assembled in Washington D. C. to proclaim and initiate a 12,000, 000 dollar campaign for the United Palestine Appeal. This was indeed, a most courageous, visionful and statesmanlike effort. For it indicated first, the faith of American Jewry in the survival of world democracy despite the vicissitudes of the present war; and secondly, the faith of American Jewish leadership in the redemption of the people of Israel.

Especially now, when our European brethren have reached a new low in their shockingly tragic hourto-hour existence, it is incumbent upon self-respecting Jews to rally to the support of the United Palestine Appeal. For the body of Israel is ill and in great agony. It is besieged by false accusations, overwhelmed by insult and injury, and stands buffeted about, helpless, in the lands

of dispersion.

Only the restoration of Eretz Israel and the reestablishment of Israel and its ancestral soil will liquidate the Jewish problem. "In Palestine the Jew might be exposed to physical danger, but spiritually he would find healing. There might be injury but no insult". Jewish statesmen of the last century understood that to add to the number of Jews in any country in the world is to advance anti-semitism. But to add Jews to Palestine means ultimately to re-

To be of sound heart and mind as a Jew one must be affiliated and identified with one's religion, one's people and one's land - one must participate in the forging of one's destiny.
