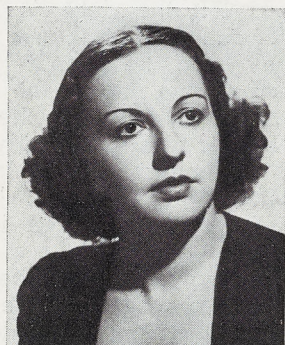

HAVE YOU CONTRIBUTED TO THE PASSOVER RELIEF?

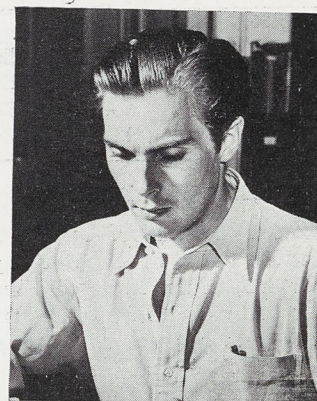

THE 58th COMMANDMENT

Plaintiff and Defendant

Our law has it that when one swears he does not take or get anything. However, there are few exceptions to this rule. The first is in the case of wages. If the employee said, "I was not paid" and swears, he gets his salary. The presumption, is that the employer always feels, after a lapse of time, that he has paid.

Another instance of swearing and taking, is that of the storekeeper and his ledger, when there are three people involved, as in the following case. A is the laborer, B is the employer and C is the storekeeper. B the employer owes A the laborer, \$5.00 for a day's work. B, the employer says to C, the storekeeper, give A, \$5.00 worth of merchandise. A and C demand \$5.00 from B. If both A and C swear, then B must pay because the storekeeper C, says, "I gave A, the laborer, \$5.00 worth of merchandise which the laborer denies, and I have no business of claiming anything from the laborer, but from you, Mr. employer." So also the laborer Mr. A says, "I did not receive any merchandise and I have nothing to do with the storekeeper Mr. C. but with you Mr. B., my employer."

Another instance is the case where one is suspected as to his character and he is the defendant and confesses part of the debt, then if the plaintiff swears for the other part he collects. If one is not suspected as to his character he swears and is therefore free from payment. But if later witnesses testify that he may not swear, then the plaintiff swears and takes what is due him.

Another instance is in the case where the defendant is obliged to

take an oath because he confesses part of the debt but is unable to swear as to the other half of the debt, because he says "I don't know whether I owe you the rest of the money" then the plaintiff collects, because the defendant is not sure and cannot swear.

If one confesses a debt although witnesses say, he has already paid, he must pay. We have a maxim that the confession on the part of the defendant is equivalent to 100 witnesses.

Notes

If one says to his neighbor, "Let me see my note that is with you because thereon I will find something in my favor," then the holder of the note must show it. If one causes a debt to be paid and has his note and witnesses, but the debtor is absent, he can collect, but he must take an oath to his claim.

If one gave his agent money to go and pay the debt and after the agent has left the debtor's house the debtor calls him back and wants the money back, he cannot take it back because the minute the agent who had the money, left the borrower's house, he had already represented the lender and our law has it that **זכין לאדם שלא בפניו** "good can be done to one even in his absence".

In case of a note that does not have the place where, or the date when, it was written, then the lender can collect his debt but not from any property that was sold by the borrower, because the party who bought the property can claim that it was bought before the date of the loan, because there was no date on the note.

Every loan bears with it the implication that all the immovable property of the lender is an obligation against it. Therefore if the scribe who wrote the note forgot to include that statement, the note is nevertheless valid and the lender can collect even from property that was sold.

If one took a pledge for a loan and the pledge was lost, then the lender is responsible for it. If the loan is less than the value of the pledge, he must pay the difference to the borrower. In case one lends his neighbor money in a city and the borrower and the lender meet in the wilderness, the lender can refuse to be paid in the wilderness. The reason for this is that the money has no value in the wilderness and he does not want to take the chance of carrying much money with him.

JEWISH MUSICIANS

Although from the time of Solomon Rossi to the Nineteenth Century there were no important Jewish musicians, what a roster of musical personalities of the Jewish race, born 150 or less years ago greets the eye! GIACOMO (Jakob Liebman Beer) MEYERBEER proudly heads the list.

Meyerbeer was born in Berlin in 1791 and died in Paris in 1864. His father was a wealthy banker, and Jakob inherited a great deal of wealth. Much of this money was lent to Wagner, but when the great operas of Meyerbeer won acclaim all over the Continent, Wagner turned Anti-Semitic, and it is principally against Meyerbeer that his diatribe on "Judaism in Music" was directed. In spite of this, Meyerbeer remained a Jew throughout his life.

It would be impossible to give a list of Meyerbeer's operas, although some of them were "The Crusaders in Egypt," "Robert le Diable," and the famous "Les Huguenots." He was applauded throughout Europe not only as a composer, but also as an accompanist. And it is a rather peculiar note to add that Meyerbeer never thought of himself as a great composer but, although generally modest, prided himself on his ability to accompany the great singers of the time. Yet, it was for his great work of composing, that he was made a member of both the Academy of Arts of Paris and of Berlin.

Meyerbeer can only be described in superlatives, for he influenced Wagner and many later composers. Yet it is essential to see the faults of composers, no matter how great they be. Meyerbeer had faults: his operas were too spectacular, many times being very expensive purely to impress the multitude. Wagner and Mendelssohn were his greatest critics but, it is very probable that both were jealous of Meyerbeer's talent. One of his admirers was Moscheles, himself a great composer, although in different lines. Since Moscheles was also Jewish, he shall receive our attention next.

worst enemies. The biddings of this Book reduced to practise by any person would improve him immeasurably. Such a practise, made general, could better the worse community. To obey them perfectly they would empty our prisons, for the very seeds of crime would shrivel up and perish. Society would be cleansed of selfishness, for everywhere in the Bible this virtue is enjoyed.

Bible Aids STATESMEN

If the Bible were only guiding the statesmen of all nations of today!

Bismarck, the power behind the German throne; Gladstone as Prime Minister of Great Britain, both were devout Bible men. These potential national leaders may have frequently held conflicting viewpoints, yet strange to say both held this thought in common. "We all require to feed in the pastures and to drink at the well of Holy Scripture."

Great statesmen realize that the Bible, as with its own time and ours, spares neither riches, nor power, nor

rank, nor antiquity, nor friendship. It clearly sees that the heart is the foundation of corruption. Ignoring popularity it unprecedently directs the brunt of its efforts toward inward reform as the first step in personal religion. All castes and classes; beggars and kings; sages and simple; publicans and priests, are treated with equal favor, in the exactions it makes, the rewards its offers, and the penalties it announces.

No wonder astute statesmen take the Bible as their guide.

Political systems have come and gone; some have taken shape on paper without ever gaining a state of sovereignty over man. In the past, as on the moment, political expedients have been tried and found to be wanting. Many have failed because they aimed to lift the few and lower the many. On these matters the Bible sets forth ancient truths and errors; ancient rights and wrongs, and the prophets tell you in its pages why these great political dreams of men have failed.

THE LAWS AND SYMBOLISMS OF PASSOVER

Rabbi Goldstein gives us the following explanations of the laws and customs of Passover:

Chometz:

We are to search for the chometz (leaven) on the night preceding the Seder (Thursday night) and burn and sell it the following morning. We are not only forbidden to eat chometz, but we are also admonished against having it in our possession. Symbolically, leaven represents all that is mean and sordid in life and Matzoh, the pure, the lofty and the sublime. The prayer spoken while the leaven is being burned reveals that just as the Jew removes all leaven from his possessions, so we pray that all impure thoughts may be removed from the earth.

Abstinence from Leaven:

The abstinence from leaven for the eight days is intended to recall to our minds, each year, Israel's redemption from bondage. The Israel-

ites were in such a hurry to leave Egypt that they did not take time to let their dough leaven.

The Fast of the First-Born:

On the Eve of Passover, which is the anniversary of the plague of the first-born visited upon the Egyptians, our first-born, because they were spared, are required to fast, out of gratitude. However, if the first-born is present at a "Seeyum," the completion of the study of a tract of the Talmud, he may eat thereafter of the meal, which is called "Seuda Mitzvah," a religious repast, in observance of a Mitzvah, in this case, the study of the Talmud.

The Last Chometz Meal:

On the day preceding the eve of Passover, we are permitted to eat chometz only until the passing of the first third of the day. This means until about 9:30 Friday morning.

The explanations of the laws and symbols of Passover will be continued next week.

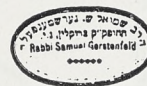

A VISION OF AMERICAN ISRAEL

By RABBI EMANUEL L. LIFSCHITZ

America's active participation in the present world struggle for liberation is well timed with the forthcoming festival of Passover, recalling the struggle for Jewish liberation 3161 years ago. Then the Jewish people achieved spiritual and physical emancipation from Egyptian domination, thus to establish forever the principle that man is inherently a free-being with inalienable rights to pursue an unfettered existence. Today, the Jews of America stand side by side with their fellow Christians helping to bring about the liberation of mankind, to create a world in which peoples and nations will retain their sovereignty, each attempting not to dominate but rather to cooperate as a member in the family of nations.

At the termination of the present struggle we envision not a diminution of Judaism and Jewish life but rather as so poignantly stated by the late Professor Friedlander, a Jewish community "Great in num-

bers, mighty in power, enjoying life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness: true life, not mere breathing space; full liberty, not mere elbow room; real happiness, not that of pasture beasts; actively participating in the civic, social and economic progress of the country; fully sharing and increasing its spiritual possessions and acquisitions, doubling its joys, halving its sorrows; yet deeply rooted in the soil of Judaism, clinging to its past, working for its future, true to its traditions, faithful to its aspirations, one in sentiment with their brethren wherever they are, attached to the land of their fathers (Eretz Israel) as the cradle and resting place of the Jewish spirit; men with straight backs and raised heads, with big hearts and strong minds, with no conviction crippled, with no emotion stifled, with soul harmoniously developed, self-centered and self-reliant; receiving and resisting, not yielding like wax to every impress from the outside, but blending the best they possess they encounter."

CAN YOU HELP?

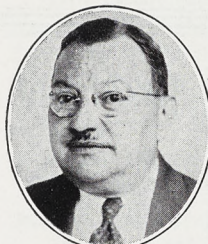
