Sedrah of the Week

4:46-47. "ALL THOSE THAT WERE NUMBERED OF THE LEVITES FROM THIRTY YEARS OLD UNTO FIFTY YEARS OLD." Thirty years is the age at which one reaches maturity both mental and physical. Fifty years is the age at which a decline sets in, in the human makeup. Therefore only those between these two ages were eligible for service in the Tabernacle.

The Three Camps
5:2. "COMMAND THE CHILDREN
OF ISRAEL THAT THEY PUT OUT
OF THE CAMP EVERY LEPER.

There were three camps. (1) The tabernacle within the curtains, the camp of the Schechina, from which any who touched a dead body was debarred. (2) Outside of the curtains, the Levites were encamped. This was called the Levitical camp, from which all who were ritually unclean were debarred. (3) Outside of the Levitical camp, came the camp of the Israelites, flanked in four directions. From this camp, only the leper was debarred.

Law Observance

4. "AND THE CHILDREN OF IS-RAEL DID SO, ETC. . . SO DID THE CHILDREN OF ISRAEL." The Rabbis in the Halachic Midrash, the Sifri, say that not only was there a general willingness on the part of those who were to do the sending, but even those who were sent out, acquiesced. We have the expression for the command repeated thus

"They did so," and ויעשו כן "They did so," and "So they did." One refers to the Israelites, through the Beth Din, and the other refers to the lepers.

Social Sin

6. "TO DO A TRESPASS AGAINST THE LORD." A social sin is a double sin against the Lord. Our social duties are not divorced from religion. Robbing is just as much a defiance against G-d as blaspheming. Besides robbing, the guilty one, swears falsely. Thus when one swears falsely one denies G-d, the existence of the Fountain of



"AS R'CHASH SEES

254th COMMANDMENT
"Reverence the Sanctuary"

The Rabbis say this teaches us that the sacred places must be held in reverence even today though they are in ruinous state. The commandment concerning the observance of the Sabbath and reverence for the holy places are placed next to each other, to teach us two things, first, that just as the Sabbath must be observed at all times so must the Holy places be reverenced at all times, and second, lest it be wrongly inferred that the Holy places should be revered, even at the expense of the breaking of the Sabbath, therefore it is written here, "And ye shall keep my Sabbaths, and (then and accordingly) reverence my sanctuary, I am the L--d."

Furthermore, the purpose of this commandment is not merely to respect a building or walls, per se, but G-d who is represented by the Holy Temple. Whilst it is true that G-d, one of whose attributes is מסום Omnipresence, and who therefore is not limited to space, yet the Sanctuary is a special environment through which we are reminded to practice all that is noble and good. It is also customary when leaving the Sanctuary and today the Synagogue or the Holy Ark not to do so with one's back turned to them. Needless to say, it is highly revolting to spit upon the floor of a house of worship. The Talmud in Yevomos 6 a and b, discusses the whole question of reverence for our houses of worship.

This commandment refers to male and females and prevails at all times although the Temple is destroyed today (because of our sins). Nevertheless it is incumbent upon each of us to reverence the Holy place, not to sit even in the Court of the Temple, or to show any signs of levity therein. The Rabbis furthermore make the point that just as we are to keep the Sabbath forever, so are we to reverence the Sanctuary for all time. He who trespasses this law violates a postive commandment.

THE TRAGEDY OF ASSIMILATION

"What I understand by assimilation is loss of identity. It is the kind of assimilation, with the terrible consequences indicated, that I dread most — even more than pogroms.

"It is a tragedy to see a great, ancient people, distinguished for its loyalty to its religion, and its devotion to its sacred Law, losing thousands every day by the mere process of attrition. It is a tragedy to see a language held sacred by all the world, in which Holy Writ was composed, which served as the depository of Israel's greatest and best thoughts, doomed to oblivion. It is a tragedy to see the descendants of those who revealed religion to the world, and who developed the greatest religious literature in existence, so little familiar with real Jewish thought that they have no other interpretation to offer of Israel's Scriptures, Israel's religion, and Israel's ideals and aspirations and hopes, than those suggested by their natural opponents, slavishly following their opinions, copying their phrases, and repeating their catchwords. I am not accusing anybody. I am only stating facts. We are helpless spectators of the Jewish soul wasting away before our very eyes.

"Now, the rebirth of Israel's national consciousness and the revival of Judaism are inseparable. When Israel found itself, it found its God. When Israel lost itself, or began to work at its self-effacement, it was sure to deny its God. The selection of Israel, the indestructibility of God's covenant with Israel, the immortality of Israel as a nation, and the final restoration of Israel to Palestine, where the nation will live a holy life, on holy ground, with all the wide-reaching consequences of the conversion of humanity, and the establishment of the Kingdom of God on earth — all these are the common ideals and the common ideas that permeate the whole of Jewish literature extending over nearly four thousand years.
