# Succos Notes

The celebration of Succos "The Festival of Tabernacles" starts this Sunday night.

The Succah is a temporary dwelling which is built especially for the holiday. The roof is made of palms or other greens, permitting sunlight to enter by day and starlight at night.

The Jew is commanded to "live" in the Succah for seven days. During the holiday one should eat in the Succah and spend time therein as if it were his permanent home.

The Succah should be adorned and decorated as beautifully as possible. The furniture and utensils used in the Succah should be of a finer grade.


The four days between the first holidays and Shmini Atzeres are known as **Chol Hamoed** — the Intermediate Days. Although many forms of work are permissible, nevertheless the spirit of Yom Tov should prevail.

# 438th of the 613 BIBLICAL COMMENDMENTS

## "To Bring Ones Contribution Durthe First Pilgrimage Festival"

We read in Deuteronomy, Chapter 12 verse 6, "And thither ye shalt bring burnt-offerings . . . and your "vow", by the First Pilgrimage Festival after the vow or pledge, and your "free-will-offering". The differences between the two is that if one makes a "IT" a vow" he must always make good, but if he makes a pledge and says, "I give this as a "ITCH TICHT is lost, he does not have to make restitution.

This commandment deals with the positive statement, namely, to pay ones pledges within a reasonable time, by the next Pilgrimage Festival.

# 439th COMMANDMENT "Not to bring a Sacrifice outside The Temple"

We were not permitted to offer any sacrifice outside of the Temple Court, as we read in Deuteronomy, Chapter 12 verse 13, "Take heed to thyself that thou offer **not** thy burnt offerings in every place that thou seest." In other words, not in the places "thou seest" suitable, but

only in the place mentioned in the Torah.

This is the negative commandment concerning the place of the offering of the sacrifices, the next will be the positive commandment.

# 440th COMMANDMENT "To Bring Every Offering in the Temple And not Outside"

We now have the positive commandment stating clearly that every sacrifice should be offered in the Temple and not in any other place, as we read in Deuteronomy, Chapter 12, verse 14, "but in the place which the L-rd choose . . . and thou shalt offer thy burnt-offerings."

The purpose of this commandment is that there should be a central sanctuary for all Israel. This made for unity. It will be remembered that when Jereboam wanted to break the unity in Israel he set up new centers for bringing sacrifices. In G-d's scheme there was to be one central place, from which His blessings were to emanate so that all Israel could have their hearts drawn to this central sanctuary, to bring their offerings, to make their confessions, and to receive G-d's forgiveness and blessings.

Of course, in one central place there was also the great advantage of having different types of Israel meet together, each having an influence upon the other, the business man, the farmer and the scholar.

This law pertains to males and females, at all times and all places. Even today if one might think because there is no Temple he might bring an offering, and do so anywhere, he would be breaking our previous (439) negative commandment, and this our positive one.

Esrog". To the Lulav—palm branch, and the Esrog—citron, we also add the myrtle and the willow. These four species, each having an individual characteristic are held together at the time the blessing is said. This indicates the necessity of uniting all positive forces in Jewish life in the service of G-d.

During the Hallel service in the Synagogue a procession of congregants with Esrog and Lulav in hand, takes place. All those possessing the Esrog and Lulav are asked to bring them to the Synagogue and take part in the procession.

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
