The Ten Drops of Wine:

The pouring of ten drops of wine recalls the ten plaques. Our cup is not full when others, even though they be our enemies, suffer.

The Five Dishes:

- 1. The Bitter Herbs are symbolic of our bitter life in Egypt.
- 2. Charoses, a mixture of apples, nuts cinnamon and wine, represents the mortar and clay with which the Israelites had to build when they were slaves in Egypt.
- 3. The Salt Water represents the tears shed by the Israelites in their misery.
- 4. The Roasted Bone represents the Paschal lamb sacrificed by our people before they left Egypt and also when the Holy Temples was in existence in Jerusalem.
- 5. The Egg is symbolic of the special holiday offering (Hagiga) that had to be brought for sacrifice (in Temple times) in addition to the customary Paschal offering.

The Cup of Elijah:

Passover is the Festival of Redemption. Therefore, we set a special cup for Elijah, who, according to tradition, will announce our final redemption.

The Opening of the Door:

We open the door during the Seder Service to indicate our belief in the special divine protection of Israel and to show that we are unafraid of our enemies.

Afikomen:

Literally it means dessert. It is a half of the middle matzoh, which is eaten at the conclusion of the Passover feast. After this one may not partake of any other foods that night, similar to the practice in the times of the Temple when nothing was eaten after the Paschal Lamb was consumed.

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PASSOVER MESSAGE — DR. SAMUEL BELKIN President, Yeshiva University

Passover symbolizes the struggle of man to gain freedom. This conflict is raging again in our midst as millions of people in Europe and Asia are fighting for their release from a new form of bondage. Just as the Israelites in Egypt relied upon their staunch faith to see them through, so must this faith in democratic ideals and moral concepts become the guiding light for the oppressed peoples of the world.

We must recognize the fact that neither the Atom or Hydrogen Bomb will, in themselves, put an end to the overwhelming problem of creating a society living in harmony with itself. We need a unifying principle, a "United Nations of the Spirit," a belief in the moral laws as stressed in the Torah; a consecration to the eternal concept of universal justice of the Prophets, and a dedication to Divine knowledge, to elevate us to a higher spiritual stratum.

Our educational system must seek to develop better men and not better technicians. Only through such a program can we hope to develop a civilization where men of all faiths can live, dedicated to a brotherhood of man and fatherhood of G-d.

488th OF THE 613 BIBLICAL COMMANDMENTS "To Rejoice On The Pilgrimage Festivals"

(Passover, Pentecost, Succoth)

We are to rejoice on the Festivals as it written in Deuteronomy, Chapter 16, verse 14, "And thou shalt rejoice in thy feast, thou, and thy son, and thy daughter, and thy manservant, and thy maid-servant, and the Levites, and the stranger, and the fatherless, and the widow, that are within thy gates."

We were cautioned to include the weak and the poor and the stranger in making the holiday a joyous one for them, as we read in our commandment, "and thy man-servant and thy maid-servant and the Levites and the stranger and the fatherless and the widow that are within thy gates." When a person rejoices in that spirit, he will have a good time but not an immoral one. He will remember to share with his fellowman and not forget them in his own enjoyment.

This commandment is to be observed as far as joy is concerned, at every place and at all times and includes male and female. He who

trespasses this commandment and does not rejoice himself and fails to cause his household and the poor to rejoice in honor of the Festival, according to his means, has annuled this positive commandment.

489th COMMANDMENT "Every Male Is To Appear In Jerusalem Three Time A Year"

We are commanded that every male is to appear in Jerusalem in the Temple three set times in the year, as we read in Deuteronomy, Chapter 16, verse 16, "Three times in a year shall all thy males appear before the L-rd thy G-d in the place which He shall choose, — on the Feast of unleavened bread, on the Feast of Weeks, and on the Feast of Tabernacles, and they shall not appear before the L-rd empty."

Every male who had the strength to make the pilgrimmage to the Temple Mount, was obliged to do so, and to bring an offering. This was called, "צולת רא" "Offering of Appearance." There was no stipulated amount of the offering. It could be a large animal or a small pigeon. Three commandments were incumbent upon the Israelites on the pilgrimmage festival: (1) to bring the holiday offering — "Chagigah", (2) to appear before the L-rd in the Temple, and (3) to rejoice on the holiday.

The purpose of this commandment was that all able bodied Israelites were to appear in the Temple and to be inspired to keep G-d's statutes and to fulfill His commandments. During the Sabbatical year, the women and the children and the strangers were also to assemble in Jerusalem on Succos.

COUNTING OF THE OMER

The counting of the Omer begins on the second night of Passover, April 10th and continues each evening, immediately after the appearance of the stars, until Shevuos. If one had forgotten to count the Omer the entire night, he should count in the daytime, without saying the blessing. However, if he should forget to count during the entire day, he should count every night thereafter without the blessing.

Before pronouncing the benediction, one should know the number of days to be counted.

Many tragedies occurred during the days of the Omer. Therefore, some of the rules of mourning are observed-wedding ceremonies and all happy celebrations involving music are forbidden except for a few specified days during this period.

CHOL HAMOED

In Eretz Israel, the first and seventh days of Pesach are sanctified by abstaining from all labor except that required for the preparation of meals. In the Diaspora, the first and second, and the seventh and eighth are observed as holy days. The intervening days are known as Chol Hamoed, the weekdays of the festival, when urgent labor is permitted. On each day, a special reading of the Torah dealing with some aspect of Passover is included in the synagogue service. On the first day in Palestine, or the first two days outside of the Holy Land, after the morning prayers, we recite all the chapters of the Psalms included in the Hallel. The rest of the week we omit parts of two of the chapters of Hallel (Half Hallel). Our rejoicing is not complete, say our sages, since the Egyptians who are also creatures of G-d were drowned in the Red Sea.

ERUV TAVSHILIN THIS WEDNESDAY

On Wednesday afternoon April 9, the master of the house should take a piece of matzoh together with some cooked food, such as meat or fish, and recite the following bene-
