ISRAEL DIARY OF MRS. HERBERT S. GOLDSTEIN JERUSALEM, WED., JULY 4th, 1951

From the depressing sight of the Maabarot, which we just visited, we went to the cheering sight of the well-established Kibbutz Chofetz Chaim. There were not many people around, as everybody who was able to, was out working in the fields. The acres upon acres of flourishing vegetable gardens, the rapidly ripening fruit orchards and grape arbors, and colorful vast flower beds, attested to the amount of work done. Dad and Jacob Kaplan took pictures standing alongside of the sign in the Lester Udell Forest which is getting along nicely. From Kibbutz Chofetz Chaim we went to SDAY CHEMED, the W.S.I.S. Children's Village which was our main objective on the day's trip. The jeep which took me, last time, through the quarter of a mile sandy stretch, from the main road to the center of the village, was not available when we got there. In its place was the old stand-by, the donkey cart. It was rigged up with a chair in it! An inclined board — serving as a gangplank, enabled me to get into it without too much difficulty and I sat comfortably on the chair as the donkey slowly plugged along. It must have been a very picturesque

491st OF THE 613 BIBLICAL COMMANDMENTS "To Appoint Judges" By Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein

As far as capital punishment is concerned, the Sanhedrin was the only group permitted to judge such cases. This prevailed only in Temple times and when the Sanhedrin was set up in Jerusalem. Each community appointed its own Beth Din or Court. If they failed to do it, they trespassed this positive commandment and their punishment was very great, — for this commandment to have judges is the foundation of our religious law.

The Torah understands human nature, and provides for its weakness. Therefore, it provides for judges. When the colony of Pennsylvania was founded in the City of Philadelphia (the city of brotherly love) it was decided not to provide for judges. The good colonists thought that they would live in harmony, and that there would be no need for judges. Within 24 hours after the settlement of the colony, many differences of opinion naturally arose, and the need for the appointment of Judges became very apparent.

We read in this chapter 16, the

epitome of justice, — "Justice, justice shalt thou pursue." Why the repetition of the word, "justice?" The Rabbis in the Palestinian Talmud answer that the Jew must be just to the Gentile, as well as to his fellow Jew. Another explanation for the repetition of the word justice, is that the way to attain justice is by justice and not "by hook or crook", — the end, as a rule, does not justify the means.

492nd COMMANDMENT "Not To Plant Trees In The Temple"

We are not to plant trees in the sanctuary, or near the Altar. Concerning this we read in Deuteronomy, Chapter 16, verse 21, "Thou shalt not plant thee an Asherah (grove) of any kind of trees near the Altar." This planting was practised in the Temple of Idolatry. The reason for the juxtaposition of this command not to place an "Asherah", a "Grove", near the Altar, to the command concerning the appointment of judges, is to point out that just as a grove represents a group of trees known to be poor in fruit but rich in foliage, so judges, without eminance in the knowledge of the Torah, even though they possess high social standing, represents spiritual barenness. The Jewish State as a Torahcracy, was based on loyalty to G-d, and idolatry was regarded as high treason. There is a close connection between the commands concerning judges and idolatrous worship: "He who appoints a judge who is unfit for his office, is as if he were to plant an Asherah, a center of heathen worship" (Talmud). One who trespassed this commandment received stripes. This prohibition refers to male and females and pertains even today.

Then the children came in for lunch, but before they started to eat, they all joined in a special prayer for the health of the sister of our own Director Sam Davis, in accordance with his request. At the end of the meal they had the icecream and cookie treat for which Sam Davis had sent me money, and as we drove away, we heard them singing Hebrew songs at the top of their young lungs. We reached Jerusalem at 3 o'clock hot and tired, and welcomed the opportunity of changing from head to foot and relaxing.
