ISRAEL DIARY OF MRS. HERBERT S. GOLDSTEIN

Jerusalem, Sunday July 8th, 1951

Election campaigning, which is going on here, at a violent speed, is similar to this activity in New York, in some respects but very different in others. When I hear the loudspeaker, passing up and down our street, a few times a day, telling us which party to vote for, I think I am back on the corner of 78th Street and Broadway, except that here we get the message in Hebrew instead of in English. The newspapers, greatly reduced in size, due to the shortage of paper, have now reduced their news content to a minimum, to make room for the ads of the different parties. There is one very interesting "ad" inserted by the government. Also due to the paper shortage, it announces that campaign propaganda literature must come within certain regulations. Posters may only be a certain sizethe exact dimensions, (in inches or centimeters, which are used here) are also specified for leaflets, announcements of meetings, and letters from the different parties to the voters. Such letters must be sent without envelopes. It is marvellous to watch normal activities being carried on, under the most abnormal limitations.

The clothing ration points have just been released. It is a couple of months since the last clothing points were released. When I saw an ad, in the paper saying "Trousers—9 points —suits 22 points", I asked somebody how people manage to keep clothed, when you get only 10 points every few months and require 22 for a suit of clothes. I was told that you have to learn how to save and how to figure. You have to decide what articles of clothing you need most and then you wait and save till you have acquired the number of points you need.

496th OF THE 613 BIBLICAL COMMANDMENTS "To Refrain From Dividing The Traditional Forces" By Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein

We read in Deuteronomy, Chapter 17, verse 11, "Thou shalt not turn aside from the matter which they shall declare unto thee, to the right hand nor to the left." Thus, if one is defiant against an injunction or any ordinance of the sages, he is not only violating the Law of G-d, which commands that we should obey the injunction of its diligent expounders.

Since the opinions of men may differ from one another, thereby causing many parties and the breaking of the Torah into many Torahs, therefore, G-d has commanded us to follow in practice the accepted interpretations of our sages of blessed memory. We may differ, even with the Sanhedrin, but we must all act in one way. An illustration for this may be found in the difference between the Tefillin on the head and the Tefillin on the arm. The Tefillin on the head is divided into four parts. In other words, there may be many different mental approaches to the Torah, (1) philosophic, (2) emotional, (3) scientific or (4) historic. But, when it comes to the act. symbolic of the hand, the Tefillin on the hand, it is not divided at all. All

of us should **act** in the same **one** way. (see Talmud Baba Metziah 59B). One who acts against the traditional explanation of the Torah, breaks this negative commandment.

497th COMMANDMENT "Concerning The Appointment Of A King Over Israel"

We read in Deuteronomy, Chapter 17, verse 15, "Thou mayest certainly set him king over thee". Monarchy is not commanded, like the appointment of judges, but permitted. This explains the possibility of the opposition to the setting up of a king-I Samuel VIII. There is no better system of government than that of a constitutional monarchy, provided it is submissive to a higher law, — in our case, — the holy Torah.

The Laws of this commandment are, (1) the king was to be appointed both by the Beth Din of the 70 elders and the prophet; just as Joshuah was appointed by Moses and the Beth Din, and Saul and David, who were appointed by Samuel and the Beth Din. (2) The king was to be annointed with the annointing oil, (3) The kingship was hereditary, providing the successor even unto the brother's children, were worthy of being selected as King. A minor could be appointed under a regency as in the case of Joash. The line of succession had the same order as that of the line of inheritance. (4) If one was not a G-d fearing person, regardless of how much wisdom he possessed, he would not be appointed. (5) The King was to be honored. (6) One who would rebel against him, was to be slain. (7) One was not to sit on his throne or (8) marry his widow. (9) A king could not forgo his honor. This was, of course, for the benefit of the people to maintain authority.
