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W.S.I.S. LEAGUE NOTES

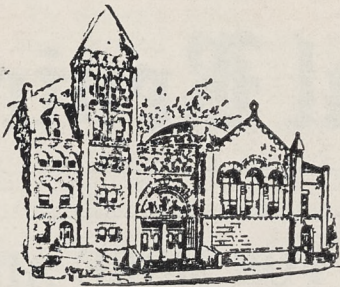

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498th OF THE 613 BIBLICAL COMMANDMENTS

"To Refrain From Setting Up A King Who Is Not An Israelite"

We are bidden not to select a king who is not of the seed of Israel. Concerning this we read in Deuteronomy, Chapter 17, verse 15, "Thou mayest not set a stranger over thee who is not thy brother," so that the king may have the full confidence of and feeling for the people. This is also true in regard to all other appointed officers. The repetition of the same verb indicates that when there is **שִׁים** "an appointment", you shall **תִּשִּׁים** make the appointment from among your brethren. We do not choose one as a king or a High Priest who is a barber, keeper of a bathhouse or a tanner, not because he is unfit to be a king, but because his occupation cheapens him in the eyes of the people. The kingship is to rise from the seed of David. This commandment prevailed only when Israel was on its land. It is forbidden to appoint any one, not only for the kingship, but for any office, who is known to be wicked or cruel.

number of his horses except for the use of the army, and not for pomp or glory. As we read in Deuteronomy, Chapter 17, verse 16, "That he shall not multiply horses to himself". If the king should add one extra horse to what he needs he breaks this commandment. If he breaks this commandment even he is to receive stripes.

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500th COMMANDMENT

"Not To Return To Egypt For All Time"

We are not to go to Egypt to take up permanent dwelling therein. Some say that this referred to Jews who lived in Palestine. Concerning this we read in the Book of Deuteronomy, Chapter 17, verse 16, "Nor cause the people to return to Egypt". This commandment is mentioned three times in the Bible. Three times it was violated, and three times they were punished. The first in reference to our commandment, the second from Exodus, Chapter 14, verse 13, "For you have seen Egypt today and you shall not continue to see it any more forever", and the third from Deuteronomy, Chapter 28, verse 68, "Thou shalt see it no more again". G-d took us out of Egypt, giving us the privilege of walking in the ways of the Torah, His revealed word; therefore, He did not want us to return there again.

This prohibition prevailed at all times. It refers to male and female and one who trespasses it and makes his home therein after having lived in Israel, has broken this negative commandment.

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WARBURG ASKS FOR 10 MILLION DOLLARS CASH
IN MAY FOR THE UNITED JEWISH APPEAL

Extraordinary demands on the United Jewish Appeal for sharply increased financial assistance with which to meet Jewish needs in Israel and other parts of the world have led to the launching of an emergency nationwide mobilization of cash designed to raise a minimum of ten million dollars during the month of May, Edward M. Warburg, National U.J.A. General Chairman has announced.

The cash is needed now, Mr. Warburg stated, to sustain U.J.A.'s unique, four-year effort to help Israel achieve economic independence through financing of a broad program of agricultural expansion, immigrant settlement and housing, and rapid upbuilding of undeveloped parts of the country.

He stressed that this effort has so far added close to three hundred new settlements, 125 thousand housing units, 124 work villages, thousands of reclaimed acres for cultivation and many hundreds of millions of irrigation pipe lines.

During the past four years of statehood, Israel brought in more than seven hundred thousand from the D.P. immigrants of Europe and the Ghettos of the Moslem countries. In March, 1952 alone 4106 new immigrants arrived in Israel who were mainly from Roumania, Iran and North Africa.

You and I have so much to be thankful for living in this country.
