COMMENTS BY RABBI HERBERT S. GOLDSTEIN

The 'Shma'

ה' אלקינו ה'

"THE LORD OUR G-D THE LORD".

The name ה stands for Mercy. אלקים stands for Justice. Whether in mercy or in justice, the result of G-d's act is mercy. The Psalmist proclaimed, "Whether it is in אלקים in G-d's Justice, I will praise His word, or whether it is in '¬ in G-d's Mercy, I will praise His word''. (See Psalm 56, verse 11).

אחד "ONE".

The letters of $\pi\pi\pi$ numerically add up to thirteen. (1, 8 and 4). Thus when a boy reaches the age of thirteen, he becomes one with G-d, — a Bar Mitzvah, "a son of commandments", and is duty bound to carry out the will of G-d for the rest of his life.

"BLESSED BE THE NAME, WHOSE GLORIOUS KINGDOM IS FOREVER AND EVER".

This sentence, according to our Sages, was recited aloud by the Patriarch, Jacob — as we do on Kol Nidre night-. We read in the Talmud Pesachim 46, the following: "Jacob attempted to reveal to his children the end of the days (The coming of the Messiah), but the Shechina (Heavenly inspiration) departed from him. Filled with dismay at this spiritual phenomenon, the Patriarch said: Has the glory departed because a moral blemish is to be found in my offspring, even as there was one in my grandfather, Abraham, who begot Ishmael, and with my father Isaac, who begot Esau? Hearing such misgivings expressed on the part of their father, his children joined in saying "Here O Israel, (hear our father Israel), the Lord our G-d the Lord is one". There is only one G-d in our hearts even as there is only one in yours. Thereupon, Jacob immediately cried out "Blessed be the Name whose glorious kingdom is forever and ever". The Rabbis began to consider how to establish the precedent. To say it would be improper, for Moses did not say it; not to say it, would be inconsistent with tradition, for Jacob did say it. Finally, they set down the rule to say it softly during the days of the year.

SHAVUOS NOTES

This Tuesday evening, we usher in the Festival of Shavuos, or the Feast of Weeks. It is so called because it comes at the conclusion of the seven weeks of the Omer which the Bible commands us to begin counting on the second day of Passover. The Biblical command speaks of seven "full" weeks, and for this reason it is customary not to usher in the holiday until nightfall. The kiddush for the Yom Tov meal should be made when it is already night.

The Giving of the Law

Rabbinic tradition has assigned this, the sixth day of the month of Sivan, as the day when the Law was first given to Israel. The holiday is therefore also known as the anniversary of the giving of the law, "zeman matan torasenu." The Bible refrains from giving the specific date of the giving of the Torah, so that we may more easily feel as if each day the Torah is commanded anew and we are bound to observe it as such.

The special portion of the Law read on the first day of the holiday contains the Ten Commandments from the book of Exodus. Before they are read, a special Aramaic (Continued on Page 4)

THE UNITED JEWISH APPEAL NEEDS MONEY

The UJA needs money to bring in the Jews from North Africa to Israel, money to buy arms, money to buy food. It is your duty to help.

Last Wednesday evening, our congregation ran a dinner for the United Jewish Appeal in order to raise money, and fortunately, we did raise a substantial sum. But many of our members did not attend that dinner. More importantly, many of our members who are able to give, did not and do not give their share to UJA. Frankly it's hard to believe.

Just read the following message from the head of the Jewish Agency:

"Is there anyone in the world who doubts that the Arabs purchased their arms in order to attack Israel? Does anyone think that they get arms from Communists in order to fight Communists? Did they fight in the Second World War against Hitler?

Only by acquiring effective defensive weapons can we deprive Egypt and the other Arab countries of the incentive to launch an attack against us.

Finally, we have to build air-shelters especially for our immigrants. Many of them are in border settlements. We are responsible for their safety. We brought them over with your help. There are 320 border settlements built solely by new immigrants. We have to invest roughly \$1,000 per family in those border settlements for shelters and fences.

"These non-military preparations will cost us fifty million dollars, and are designed to reduce the initial impact of any enemy attack. You can help us build these shelters and aid us to accomplish this stock-piling. More than that, you can help us to continue our great humanitarian work involved in immigration.

"I beg of you today to let the facts speak for themselves. You must be convinced that this is the greatest Jewish emergency since 1948. Then you must act accordingly, and together we will demonstrate to the world our capacity to survive, to survive in freedom."

liturgy, Akdamos, is chanted which tells of the greatness of G-d and the Torah and their importance to Israel.

The custom of decorating both the synagogue and home with leaves and flowers is also derived from the connection of the holiday with the giving of the Torah. The floral decoration is reminiscent of the greenery atop Mt. Sinai in the wilderness.

Tikun Shavuos

A beautiful tradition, derived from the practice of the Jewish mystics, the Kabbalists, is the recital of the Tikun Shavuos. This collection ot selections from the Bible and Talmud is recited from a specially prepared book during an all-night vigil.

Our readers are cordially invited to join us in the Synagogue for this vigil, beginning at 10:30 P.M. on Tuesday night. A minyan will be held in the early hours of Wednesday morning for those who remain all night. All are invited to spend some time in the synagogue.

Several reasons have been given for the source of the custom. The most picturesque points to the fact that on the day of the actual giving of the Law in the wilderness, Moses is recorded as having to awake the people to receive the word of G-d. To atone for this, as it were, we remain awake all night to show our eagerness for G-d's commandments.
