Panel Of Two Experts To Discuss Electronic Computers At Men's Club Meeting On Monday, February 3rd.

Messrs. Sid Kaplan and Leon S. Levy of David Sarnoff Research Center, R.C.A. Laboratories, will explain Electronic Computers and its Future Business Application.

All members of the Men's Club. friends of our Congregation and neighbors in our community both men and women are in for a real treat at the open meeting of our Men's Club on Monday, February 3rd, at 8:30 P.M., in our Synagogue building. A Panel of two experts on electronic computers, will discuss the importance of electronic computers and its application to everyday business procedures. Both of our speakers hail from the David Sarnoff Research Center of R.C.A. laboratories at Princeton and are well qualified to speak on the subject of electronics.

In this issue for reason of lack of space, we can only give a brief sketch of Mr. S. Kaplan's background in the field of mathematics in general and in Electronic Computers in particular, and next week, we will give Leon Levy's biographical sketch.

Since Mr. Kaplan's graduation from Brooklyn College, with the de-

grees of B.S., in 1934 and M.S., in 1936, his activities in the field of mathematics have been divided in the areas of teaching, government service and private industry. He has taught mathematics at Brooklyn College, Johns Hopkins University, Catholic University of America, and the Graduate School of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

His government service consisted of membership on the statistical staff of the war production board during the war, a staff position on the Business Division of the Bureau of Census, immediately after the war, and later joining the high speed computational group of the Naval Ordnance Laboratory, where he solved many large-scale aero ballistic problems, many associated with early missile development. In 1951 he joined the Office of the Comptroller of the Army, where he programmed for solution on the UNIVAC, the logistical support for a real Army mobilization plan, including the automatic determination of its associated budget.

Mr. Kaplan entered private industry in 1953 at the R.C.A., as a mathematician in the **Bizmac** Engineering Section, where he acted as a programming consultant on large-scale file processing and mathematical problems. In 1955 he was assigned to the David Sarnoff Research Center at Princeton, where he is now, as a consultant on large-scale file reprieval problems.

COMMENTS BY RABBI HERBERT S. GOLDSTEIN

THE וכא לציון PRAYER"

(Continued)

"FOR THE LORD IS G-D, AN EVERLASTING ROCK"

Atheism means anarchy, and confusion Judaism means respect for G-d as the Eternal Rock for the world's safety.

"AND THEY THAT KNOW THY NAME WILL PUT THEIR TRUST IN THEE"

Israel, having witnessed the Revelation, put their trust in G-d even before they inquired into the Torah, the Law that was revealed, as they said, "We shall do and then we shall inquire."

"IT PLEASED THE LORD . . . TO MAGNIFY THE TORAH"

Some of us might say in the spirit of Passover "Dayenu". It would be well if he did not give us "so much" law. When we feel that way, it is an indication of a lower level of the spiritual and moral outlook. We are made better, worthier, nobler, because of the copious Torah and its many commandments. The more commandments we follow, the less is our danger of going wrong, and vice versa. The Torah, in view of its very minute and detailed exactions, points out and indicates the safe road for every individual. Thus Israel was made worthy when G-d gave them much Torah and many commandments.

The "ALEYNU" Prayer

IT IS OUR DUTY

This prayer, one of the oldest, is ascribed to Joshua, when he faced the walls of Jerico. It is an outcry against idolatry and is one of the most universal of all prayers.

Hoshea, is found in The original name Joshua, namely הושע the acrostic of the first letters of the first four sentences of this prayer read

Joshua was afraid that Israel might be influenced by the statues and idols, and thus uttered the words, "for they bow to void and vanity, and pray to a god who does not help" (see Isaiah Chapter 30 verse 7 and Chapter 45 verse 20), which were later removed by the censor, but are now still a part of the Sephardic ritual namely:

IN THE BEGINNING" "WHO FORMED THE WORLD, בראשית

This may be interpreted to mean that G-d created the "beginning" of things, as for instance, wood. Then came man, and made a table out of it, etc.

"THOU HAST NOT MADE US LIKE THE NATIONS OF (THE) OR OTHER LANDS"

Our nation is different than all other nations, ours is a Torahcracy, (as we read in Exodus Chapter 19 verse 6) "And you should be unto me as a kingdom of priests and a holy nation."

"AND HATH NOT PLACED US LIKE OTHER FAMILIES OF THE EARTH"

G-d gave us a "peculiar" or "chosen" or "special" position among the people's of the world, as we read in Exodus Chapter 19 verse 5 "And you shall be unto Me, PECULIAR (special, treasured) from all the peoples of the world.

ISRAELI DIARY

July 9, 1957

On Sunday I paid a farewell visit to our W. S. I. S. Children's Village and besides the items which our Women's League funds had already provided, I added a set of swings, slides and a volley-ball net. I felt this was something which the children had to have.

Yesterday afternoon Mr. Wilk, Head of the Police Department of the City of Jerusalem, nephew of Mr. Sydney, who is a life member of the W.S.I.S., came with a station wagon and took us for a close-up of Mount Zion and the border between Israel and Jordan. We got nearer to Mount Zion than I had ever been so far, as an automobile road has been built this year, half-way up Mount Zion. The rest of the way consists of a large number of steps, which of course is out of the question for me. We saw at close range, the Tower of David, one of the walls of the Old City, the Valley of Shiloah, mentioned in the prophet, (now unfortunately in Arab hands;) the beautiful Hebrew University buildings and the Hadassah Hospital buildings which were built many years ago on Mount Scopus and which are now Arab territory and cannot be used by Israel; the Mount of Olives, where Grandpa Fischel is buried, and which is also out of bounds for Israel. We drove on to a section known as Ramat Rachel (The Height of Rachel) because from there the tomb of Rachel is visible. From that point we also saw at very close range the city of Bethlehem and got a wonderful view of the Dead Sea, which is about 1½ hours' ride from where we were. It is remarkable to be able to see something so clearly which is so far away.
