

COMMENTS BY RABBI HERBERT S. GOLDSTEIN

Thirteen Principles of The Faith

I BELIEVE WITH PERFECT FAITH THAT THE WHOLE LAW, NOW IN OUR POSSESSION, IS THE SAME THAT WAS GIVEN TO MOSES OUR TEACHER, PEACE BE UNTO HIM.

The existence of the Pentateuch at the time when the other Biblical books were written is clear from the frequent references to it and its laws. To substantiate all this I have but to refer to: "Only be thou strong and very courageous, that thou mayest observe to do according to all the law which Moses, my servant, commanded thee," etc. "This book of the law shall not depart out of thy mouth," etc. (Joshuah 1:7 and 8). "As Moses, the servant of the Lord, commanded the children of Israel, as it is written in the book of the Law of Moses," etc. "And he wrote there upon the stones a copy of the Law of Moses which he wrote in the presence of the children of Israel. And afterward he read all the words of the Law, the blessings and the curses, according to all that is written in the Book of the Law" (Joshua 8:, 31, 32, and 34), "Keep the charge of the Lord thy G-d, to walk in His ways, to keep His statutes and His commandments, and His judgments, and His testimonies, as it is written in the Law of Moses," etc. (I Kings 2.3). "But the children of the murderers he slew not according unto that which is written in the book of the Law of Moses," etc. (2 Kings 14:6), "Remember the law of Moses, My servant, which I commanded unto him in Horeb. (Malachi 3:16).

The authors of the other books of the Bible show familiarity with the words, the phrases, and the contents of the Pentateuch. Thus Psalm 104, is based on the first chapter of Genesis; the flood is mentioned in Psalm 29 and in the prophecies of (Isaiah 54:9); the history of the Patriarchs and of the Israelites in Egypt, and in the wilderness in Psalms 8.70, and 106; the history of Jacob is alluded to in Hosea chapter 12; the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah in Isaiah 1:9, Amos 4:11.

Of the laws contained or mentioned in the Pentateuch many are mentioned or alluded to in, the books of the Prophets and the Hagiographa; the feast of Passover (Joshua Chapter 4) Tabernacles (Zechariah 4:16-20, Ezra 3:4; Nehemiah 7:14-18); the first day of the seventh month (New Year) is mentioned as a "holy day" in (Nehemiah 7:10). The dietary laws are referred to by Isaiah (Isaiah 66:14); the laws of cleanness and uncleanness from the text of a prophecy of Haggai V:10 etc.

Without the Pentateuch the other books of the Bible are unintelligible. There is nothing in the Pentateuch that betrays a post-Mosaic origin. If the Pentateuch had been written in the period of the Kings, the author would have mentioned Jerusalem as the appointed place for the Sanctuary; in the rebukes, the π in addition to idolatry, the social corruption pointed out by the prophets would have been mentioned, and also the restrictive law concerning the marriage to the first generation that entered Palestine.

Dear Parent:

HOW DO YOU BEND A TWIG?

As the twig is bent, they say, so grows the tree.

But there is an art to bending a twig, as any dendrologist will tell you. Good judgment must be exercised to insure just the right amount of pressure to be exerted on the twig. Too little — and no results are achieved. The pressure must also be continuous; sporadic bending has little or no effect. Finally, the pressure must be applied over a considerable length of time.

The proverb refers, of course, to the education of children. The details of twig-bending, therefore, are properly applicable to Jewish education.

Too little Jewish education—and no results are achieved. An occasional hour or two a week can accomplish precious little. Too much? In our society and for our needs, there is no real danger of too much!

Jewish education, to be effective, must be continuous.

Jewish education, finally, must extend over a long period of time. From early childhood until **well beyond adolescence**.

We, who are concerned with the sound and thorough religious education of our Jewish youth, know these facts of twig-bending. You, dear readers, who are surely interested in the growth of fine, upright, stalwart, fruitful members of our people, must put these suggestions into effect.

Assure your children of a GOOD Jewish education. Enroll them —NOW—in our school. Protect your children against a poor environment by urging your neighbors to send their children to our School.
