THE PRAYER BOOK

COMMENTS BY RABBI HERBERT S. GOLDSTEIN

Thirteen Principles of The Faith

"I FIRMLY BELIEVE THAT THE CREATOR, BLESSED BE HE, REWARDS THOSE WHO KEEP HIS COMMANDMENTS, AND PUNISHES THOSE WHO TRANSGRESS HIS COMMANDMENTS."

The Book of Job illustrates the vanity of man's attempts to lift the veil that conceals the plan of G-d's decrees. The reader is informed beforehand why Job is afflicted with pains and troubles. But Job and his friends have not been informed. Job desires to find out what act of his has brought upon him this terrible calamity, if it is to be endured as a punishment; he protests his innocence, and criticises the justice of the Almighty. The three friends declare with certainty that Job's sufferings are a punishment for sins committed, and are angry that Job does not accept their view.

G-d appears, rebukes Job for his resumption, but declares that the view expressed by his friends, insinuating sinful conduct to Job, was wrong, and that Job, who contended he did not know the cause of the suffering, spoke more rightly than his friends. For Job had not been afflicted because of his sins, and this was shown to the friends of Job by the compensation which G-d gave Job for all he had lost and suffered.

The acts of Divine justice recorded in the sacred literature serve as a warning to the evil and an encouragement to the good. They are all of a material character, as only in this shape can they be perceived by man. But by no way do they exhaust the ways of G-d. The Divine retribution so frequently referred to in the Law points mostly to the good or evil consequences which the conduct of the Israelites will bring upon the whole community or state, because the whole community is benefitted by the virtues and injured by the misconduct of each of the members composing it. It is the duty of the authorities, by watchfulness and by well-defined punishments, to prevent the spread of disobedience to the Divine Law. What other rewards or punishments await the individual in this life or after death we do not know. But there are, especially in the Psalms, numerous indications that the pious sufferer was sure that everlasting happiness would more than compensate for the absence of material and transient success in this life.

The faithful Israelite is not discouraged at the sight of the successes of the wicked; on the contrary, he believes: "If those who break the Divine laws such kindness is shown by G-d, what must be His goodness to those who obey Him!" (Midrash Yalkut on Isaiah, Chapter 8, verse 1). As regards the troubles of the good, the Sages teach that the good will receive their reward "in proportion to their suffering."

ISRAELI DIARY OF MRS. HERBERT S. GOLDSTEIN (Continued) June 24, 1958

Those who lost their lives in defending the Old City of Jerusalem during the War of Liberation, are buried in the Old City. However, since their dear ones cannot visit their graves because the Old City is now in Arab hands, the names of all those departed war heroes are listed on individual slabs on both walls of this replica of one of the narrow streets in Jerusalem and their dear ones come here as if they were going to their graves. There is a small stone projection in front of each slab upon which flowers can be placed.

Another very interesting section of this cemetery is dedicated to 250 sailors who lost their lives in a shipwreck during the second World War. It is in the form of a pool of water about one foot high, on the bottom of which are individual slabs bearing the name and age of each of these sailors. The water is so clear that it requires no effort to distinguish the names. In the middle of the pool stands the hull of the ship on which is inscribed "And I shall bring them back from the depths of the sea". Psalms 68, Verse 23.

About 5,000 soldiers who gave up their lives for their homeland are buried in the Military Cemetery.

From here we went to see the Holy Land Hotel which was just opened for guests, a month and a half ago. It is simply beautiful and elegant in every respect and certainly represents the present Israel trend of aiming at modernity. It is built on the top of a mountain and on one side it has a most beautiful view of the Judean hills and valley for miles around.

Next we went to the Hebrew University grounds. This is a city in itself and is called University City, with a bus terminal of its own. It is situated on an immense tract of land and just an emuneration of the buildings on these grounds is most impressive, let alone seeing the large attractive efficiently equipped halls of learning. Included among these are the building of the departments of Physics, Economics, Jewish Studies, Botany and Geology, the Administration Building, Library, Planetarium, innumerable laboratory buildings, dormitories and a most uniquely constructed Syna-

Besides this, there is a stadium seating 20,000 people and an amphitheatre, seating 3,000 people with an immense platform in the front part for special occasions.
