This Saturday night at 1:00 A.M. all of us, both men and women, will show our earnest desire to repent and to return more fully to the faith, by giving up part of our sleeping hours and gathering instead in our Synagogue to say the "Selichos" prayer. "Selichos" is the plural of the Hebrew word "Selicho" which means forgiveness. As truly G-d fearing people, we are hesitant to approach our maker on the High Holy Days without having made prior preparations to repent. This is the essence of "Selichos".

THE PRAYER BOOK

COMMENTS BY RABBI HERBERT S. GOLDSTEIN

Psalm 126 (Continued)

"HE SHALL COME HOME WITH JOY BEARING HIS SHEAVES" Please note the plural "sheaves". He will reap not only what he has sown, but many times that amount.

In 1914, I heard the late Rabbi Wolkin of Russia, who came to this country with the late Rabbi Meir Hildesheimer (both of blessed memory) to organize the Agudath Israel. Rabbi Wolkin gave an ingenious explanation of these last two verses. He said "sowing" also refers to charity, as we read in our prayers: "Zoh-ray-ah Ts'daw-kohs" — "sowing charities". Then he explained that whether one "sows" or gives charity tearfully (another appeal!) or whether one gives cheerfully, in both cases they receive reward. But this seems unfair. However, he said, "He who goes and gives grudgingly, certainly gets his reward, but it is only "the measure of his seed"; he gave a dollar, get his reward for the dollar. But he who gives the same amount gladly receives as his reward "MANY SHEAVES", many times the amount he has given.

This Psalm is read before the "Grace after meals."

"BY THE RIVERS OF BABYLON, THERE WE SAT DOWN, YEA, WE WEPT WHEN WE REMEMBERED ZION" This may mean either we sat down, settled there in Babylon in sadness, as is the custom of the mourner (See Isaiah, Chapter 47, verse 1). Another interpretation may be that we settled down, as the prophet Jeremiah declared that we should plant, build houses, and be at peace. In either case we could not forget Zion.

"WE HANGED UP OUR HARPS" Here too there may be two interpretations (1) We gave up joyous occasions, but only for a time, as indicated by the word "taw-lee-nu" — "we hung up" our harps, temporarily, but did not put them away permanently. (2) "The meaning seems to be that the exiles used to accompany their dirges on the harp while sitting by the rivers to lament. When, however, their captors came upon them there and maliciously asked them to go on singing for the amusement of the audience, the harps were laid aside." (A. Cohen Soncino edition Book of Psalms)

"FOR THERE THEY THAT LED US CAPTIVE" The nations always wanted us to forget Zion.

"THE SONGS OF ZION" To sing these songs joyously, for the sport and entertainment of our enemies, was to the captives an awful profanation and degradation.

"IF I FORGET THEE, O, JERUSALEM, LET MY RIGHT HAND FORGET HER CUNNING" What has the right hand to do with forgetting Jerusalem? The answer is that Jerusalem, the Holy City, represents our roots; if one casts aside his roots, he loses his strength. Therefore, the right-hand is employed here, as the symbol of a rule of a man's strength.

"HER CUNNING" is not in the original Hebrew, but some such description is indicated.

"ABOVE MY CHIEF JOY" No joyous experience is to be higher than that of our feeling for Jerusalem. This verse might be translated better, perhaps, as at the height of my joy I may never forget thee O Jerusalem.

"**REMEMBER**" We ask to remember the children of Edom, the Romans, for what they did. They were ruthless, like the Nazis of our day. They destroyed the Temple entirely, laid waste to the Holy City, and attempted to destroy the Jewish religion.

"THE DAY OF JERUSALEM" The sad day of Jerusalem when all this occurred.

"O DAUGHTER OF BABYLON" referring to the 'ity of Babylon.

ISRAELI DIARY OF MRS. HERBERT S. GOLDSTEIN June 26, 1958 (Continued)

As we approached the City of Beer-sheva the all-over picture became oriental. In the middle of a large flock of sheep was a well. At the well were shepherds and shepherdesses drawing pails of water from the well with ropes, and then feeding their sheep from the pails. It was a real biblical scene, strongly reminiscent of Jacob and Rachel at the well.

We saw a Bedouin village with many camels, many sheep and the tents in which the Bedouins live, practically underground.

In this vicinity is the agricultural school dedicated to Haim Weizmann which specializes in Negev agriculture. Each part of Israel has a different type of agriculture, depending upon its soil. The Negev soil is very dry and is only useable for certain types of agriculture. This requires a great deal of experimentation.

When we got to Beersheva we headed for that section of the town where a market is held every Thursday for the neighboring communities. Donkeys drawing heavily laden carts, camels with packs hanging down both sides of their humps, men and women in typical Arab attire were walking in the middle of the street, with no regard for traffic. Of course the pace of camels and donkeys makes walking in the middle of the street not too dangerous.
