FROM THE ISRAELI DIARY OF MRS. HERBERT S. GOLDSTEIN

JUNE 21, 1959

The other day, Miss Epstein, the Mizrachi Women's tourist guide, called for me and took me to the Mizrachi Women's Settlement House in Bakaa, which is on the outskirts of Jerusalem. Here between 350 and 375 boys and girls, between the ages of 6 and 15 come after school. First they are given a sandwich and a glass of milk; then, under the guidance of excellent leaders they are interestingly occupied and entertained and kept out of mischief. They are divided into different groups, some singing and dancing, some playing games, some doing arts and crafts work, some practicing in a fife and drum band, etc. It is remarkable to see how well behaved the children are, coming as most of them do, from almost uncivilized countries. This is a great tribute to the training ability of the leaders.

COMMENTS BY RABBI HERBERT S. GOLDSTEIN

HAGGADAH AND ITS INTERPRETATIONS

BUT THE L--D OUR G-D BROUGHT US FORTH THENCE WITH A STRONG HAND AND AN OUTSTRETCHED ARM.

It was necessary to use strong means to free the Israelites at this time through their bondage. They were so saturated in the 49 of the 50 degrees of impurities in Egypt that if it were not for the goodness of G-d in freeing them at this time, they would have been entirely lost. This also explains the reason why we were redeemed earlier than the original schedule of 400 years. We were actually redeemed 210 years after Jacob came into Egypt.

AND THE MORE ONE DWELLS ON THE STORY OF THIS EXODUS THE GREATER HIS MERIT.

The more one learns and finds out about the exodus it shows how high and exalted he becomes, because he sees from the exodus the mental and spiritual freedom attained. The more we explain every angle of the exodus, it shows our interest which indicates our love for our people and our faith which makes us more praiseworthy.

BLESSED BE THE INFINITE G-D, BLESSED BE HE.

"Blessed be He who is giving the Torah to His people Israel, blessed be He!" The word Baruch is mentioned here four times as an introduction to the four children. The question is, what is the praise to say that one child is wicked and another is unable to ask.

First of all the holiday of the Exodus is a children's holiday. Second, no young person is to be considered lost. We need patience and in the long run we are rewarded and every child that we have becomes a blessing.

Funeral Practices

Judaism is concerned with the true purpose of the burial rites. In time of tragedy, great care should be taken that the following rules are observed:

- 1. The deceased should be provided with a religious attendant (shomer).
- 2. There must be proper "taharah" or washing of the body by religiously qualified persons.
- 3. The body must be dressed in the traditional "tachrichim" (shrouds).
- 4. A simple wooden coffin should be used.
- 5. There should be no public viewing of the body.
- 6. The question of embalming which is a very common practice, should be referred to the Rabbi.
- 7. Flowers and music are not permissible.
- 8. The law requires that a tear be made in the garment of the mourner. For this purpose a jacket, vest, sweater or dress should be used. The "ribbon" does not satisfy the requirements of the law and should not be used
- does not satisfy the requirements of the law and should not be used.

 9. Burial should always be in the ground. The grave must be completely filled in, before leaving the funeral service.
- 10. There must be no Sabbath violation in the preparations for the funeral.
- 11. The burial should take place as soon as possible after death.

Besides the clubrooms, there are carpentry, iron work, arts and crafts shops, sewing classes for girls as well as a library and reading room where many of the children do their homework.

There is a room with the walls completely covered with banners, which the children received for excellency in sport contests with outside groups. One banner was presented to their settlement house by the Government and states that the clubs here are the best in Jerusalem.

In the evening, when the younger children go home, boys and girls between the ages of 15 and 18, who work during the day, come for night school, as well as for social and cultural activities.

Since this institution is situated in a district where the Christian missionaries are very active, it serves a most valuable and preventative purpose. Not far from this settlement house there is another most useful Mizrachi Women's project. It is a dormitory where girls who are graduates of the Bet Zeirot Mizrachi, students at the Bezalel school, students at the Teachers Seminary, at the Hebrew University or girls whose parents live in small communities far from Jerusalem, or who, for one reason or another have no place to stay in Jerusalem, are housed. Every day these girls take care of getting their own meals, but for Shabbat, a woman comes in and cooks for them, and they all eat together, so that they get a real Sabbath atmosphere.
