FESTIVAL NOTES THURSDAY EREV YOM TOY

ERUV TAVSHILIN

It is not permissible to cook, bake or prepare food on one day of Yom Tov for the next day or for the Sabbath. The "Eruv Tavshilin" set aside prior to the Festival, enables the housewife to cook on Friday for the Sabbath. Inasmuch as this year the last day of Passover falls on Saturday, the ceremony of Eruv Tavshilin should be performed on Chol Hamoed Thursday.

A matzoh and some cooked food, such as fish, are placed on a plate. The master of the house lifts the plate and recites the following: "Boruch ataw a-do-n elo-kenu melech ha-olam asher kidsha-nu b'mitzvo-sav v'tzi-va-nu al mitzvahs e-ruv . . . By virtue of this Eruv, be it permitted to us to bake, cook, keep food warm, light the candles, and do all that is necessary on the Festival for the Sabbath."

On Saturday afternoon the food thus prepared on Thursday may be eaten.

"SHEER HASHEERIM"

On Saturday morning, the last day of Passover, the Biblical book, "Song of Songs", is chanted preceding the reading of the Torah. This beautiful series of songs by King Solomon provides a poetic illustration of the love of G-d for His people, Israel.

CHOMETZ AFTER PASSOVER

Any chametz or chametz product in the possession of a Jew during Passover is considered "chametz sheavar alav ha-Pesach" — prohibited products preserved during Passover. We are not permitted to derive any benefit from such products nor may they be eaten. At the conclusion of Passover, one should not use any Jewish baked products until we are certain that the products have been freshly baked.

PASSOVER

BY RABBI HERBERT S. GOLDSTEIN

At the outset let us point out that the strong hold which Passover has among our people was pointed out and also reasons for this phenomenon were indicated. We would now mention another potent factor that has kept Passover alive throughout the years — the fact that this holiday has ever been an inexhaustible fountain of promise in the present and hope for the future. The L--d's intervention on behalf of His people in the past was an irrefutable argument that He would not abandon them at any time, and His

wonder working Providence would again redeem them from new Pharaohs. HAGGADAH AND ITS INTERPRETATIONS

Rabbi Judah made the Hebrew initials into an accrostic DETSACH ADASH B'ACHAB, which appeared on Moses' staff.

DETSACH — Represents the first three plagues, namely, blood, frogs, vermin. They are all earthy.

ADASH — Represents three plagues, namely: cattle plagues, pestilence, leprosy, and they all do not come from the earth, but rather from the air.

B'ACHAB — Represents four plagues, namely: hail, locusts, darkness and the smiting of the first born. Hail comes from the sky, lucusts come from the wind, darkness comes from the heavens and the first born is a combination of earth and heaven, body and soul. In other words, the last four are a mixture of heaven and earth.

Rabbi Jose said, concerning this section the Midrash says, "The Holy One, blessed is He, brought the plagues upon the Egyptians after the military tactics of kings, and concerning the Exodus of the children of Israel from Egypt, it is written that it came to pass on this very day that the L-rd brought forth the children of Israel from the land of Egypt with all their hosts. This teaches us that they did not depart in confusion, but in accordance with military tactics and order." (M. Kasher)

The expression, FINGER OF G-D, is a metaphor for the ten plagues. This was to serve as a warning. If they failed to heed the warning given with one finger then the whole hand of G-d is used to indicate the full punishment for the Egyptians.

RABBI ELIEZER SAID

This paragraph and the next are based upon a verse from the Psalm 78, verse 49. According to Rabbi Eliezer, each plague contained four minor ones and according to Rabbi Akiva each one contained five. Rabbi Akiva starts his enumeration with the word, "Anger" and Rabbi Eliezer with the next word in the Psalms with "Wrath." All this shows how far the people were away from recognizing G-d's power. G-d in turn increased the plagues to bring the Egyptians to their senses.
