CONCLUDING PORTIONS OF THE ISRAELI DIARY OF OUR LATE REBBITZEN, REBECCA F. GOLDSTEIN

July 24, 1960

Yesterday was our last Saturday in Jerusalem. There was a special farewell speech delivered to Dad at the Friday night services. Sermons are delivered here on the Friday evening instead of the Sabbath morning services, as they are in America. The time in between Mincha and Maariv is utilized for a sermon.

The fact that the banks, the post office, transportation and practically all public utilities are suspended in Jerusalem on the Sabbath, added to the fact that practically every store is closed, naturally creates a different Sabbath atmosphere in the streets, regardless of what individuals are doing in their own homes.

In the forenoon old men are seen going to services with their Tallasim over their heads. In the afternoon fathers, mothers and children, whole families dressed in their Shabbas clothes, appear strolling lightheartedly (their weekly cares cast aside) in the middle of the roads as they are not afraid of traffic. Of course all this is already taken for granted here, but I was somewhat surprised when I was told the other day that an eight story chain store building, on the main thoroughfare of Jerusalem is to be closed on Shabbos. Of course, we really should not be surprised since Shabbos in Jerusalem is like Sunday in America and it seems perfectly natural to see everything closed in America on Sunday. I have never yet been out of Jerusalem on a Saturday but I understand that in Tel Aviv the Sabbath is kept quite strictly. In Haifa, however, there is a certain amount of desecration on the Sabbath and buses are permitted in certain sections.

On Monday night I went to Tisha B'av services. All electric lights were turned off and the Book of Lamenta-

HAGGADAH AND ITS INTERPRETATIONS

YISHTABACH (Cont'd)

FOR UNTO THEE PSALM AND PRAISE ARE BECOMING

It is only to G-d that we can safely render praises and to be sure that we would not be belied by later development. It would be unsafe to bestow these fifteen praises upon a human being whose nature is vacillating. Today one may be righteous and excellent in character, and tomorrow he may suffer a relapse into sin. It is G-d alone who is eternal and immutable both in His Essence and in His attributes. Some say that the fifteen synonyms of praise, like the fifteen Psalms "The Songs of Ascent" (Psalm 120 through Psalm 134) were employed to indicate the highest praise a human being could give to G-d. Others say that the number 15 was a reference to the Creator, 15 being the first two letters of G-d's name, as we read, in Isaiah, Chapter 26 verse 4: Kee Beyaw "For with 'yaw' was the world created by G-d.

I should like to point out that no language has 15 synonyms for praise, as does the Hebrew language. Language is an index of a people's thoughts and feelings.

The highest form of Praise of G-d is found and in particular in the Psalms of David, which, by the way are used in all churches. The Psalms have been accepted as the Hymns par excellence of the Protestant church. Well as the late Lloyd George, Prime Minister of England, declared, "We sing the Psalms of David in Church on Sundays, and persecute His children the rest of the week."

tions was read by candlelight. Most of the congregants sat on the floor.

Tisha B'av the traditional date of the destruction of the First and Second Temples is observed with a great deal of feeling here. That is not surprising but what was surprising is that cinemas, theatres, cafes and all public places of amusement were closed.

In Government offices the employees had the option of not working. On Mt. Zion, Israel's nearest spot to the Wailing Wall, the last relic of both Temples, the Book of Lamentations was recited in the chants of various communities. Thousands of people, including many parents and their children whom they wish to imbue with the atmosphere of this event in the history of our people, attended the services on Mt. Zion.

There was a constant and steady flow of people all the evening and the next day, including hundreds of tourists and seminar groups.

In Tel Aviv, which is usually almost as brightly lighted up and as noisy as the "Gay White Way" in New York, it was dark and quiet with all cinemas closed like in Jerusalem and the usually over-flowing

restaurants, bars and sidewalk cafes, empty.

It is believed that this was the most carefully observed Tisha B'av in years, due to a special by-law enacted by the Municipality.

Kibbutz Ramat Rahel is on the way to Bethlehem where Rahel is buried. Ramat Rahel was almost completely wiped out during the war of Liberation by Arabs who made this a target for an intensive attack. There are still evidences of bombshells in the building on the top of the hill which was used as a point of observation for the surrounding territory.

We stopped for a while at the Holy Land Hotel which is Jerusalem's newest hotel. We were able to get a very fine view of the Mount of Olives, the Mosque of Omar and of Mount Moriah where Abraham took his beloved son, Isaac, to offer him up for sacrifice, which he believed the L-rd wanted of him. It was on Mount Moriah that King Solomon built the first Temple, and in later days, Ezra and Nehemia built the second temple on the same spot.
