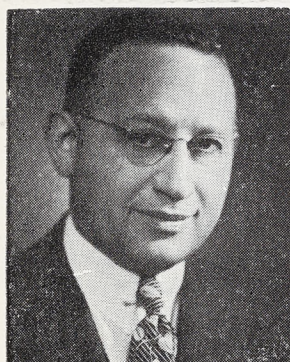

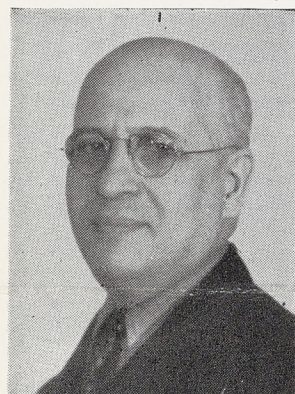

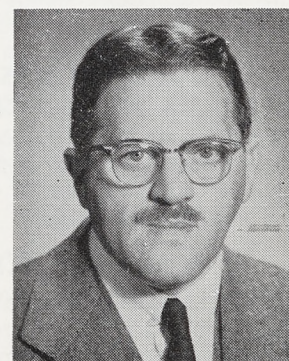

Passover Notes

SEDORIM RESERVATIONS

Our Congregational Sedorim will be held this year at the Bolivar Hotel, Central Park West at 83rd Street (Star Caterers). On Wednesday evening the Seder will begin 7:20 and on Thursday evening at 7:30.

Rabbis Goldstein and Reichel, and Cantor Ellner will officiate.

Reservations for our Sedorim must be in our office no later than this Sunday morning, April 15th.

The charge for each Seder night is \$12.50 per person (this includes gratuities).

Search for Leaven

The search for leaven should be conducted on this Tuesday evening, as soon as possible after sunset. The appropriate blessing and the Aramaic formula, "Kol Chamira" should be recited. The latter declares that we wish to annul and "declare as the dust of the earth" all manner of leaven which we did not find during the search.

The entire household (including the children) should take part in the search.

The crumbs which were collected in the search the night before should be burned by 10:30 on Wednesday morning. At this time the second "Kol Chamira" formula should be recited. Thus, any chometz which remains in a Jew's possession over the Passover holiday, whether by accident or purposely, not having been previously "sold" in accordance with the law, is forbidden to be eaten after Passover.

No matzah, however, may be eaten on Erev Passover. The reason for this is that we must eat matzah at the Passover Seder in the evening with appetite.

SALE OF CHOMETZ

The sale of chometz in one's possession is a required preparation of every person for the Passover holiday. Our Rabbis are available in the Synagogue for this purpose. If you wish, you may use this coupon to make the authorization. It should reach the Synagogue office by Tuesday, April 17th.

Kashering

We set aside special dishes and utensils for the festival. However, under certain conditions, some of the utensils used throughout the year may also be used on Passover. Metal pots and pans can be kashered by first thoroughly cleaning them at least a day before, and then putting them in a pot of boiling water. Utensils used directly over the fire may be kashered by placing them directly over the fire, allowing them to get red-hot. Glassware should be scoured and then soaked in water for three days, changing the water every twenty-four hours. Earthenware cannot be kashered.

The Synagogue facilities for public kashering of vessels will be available on **Tuesday, April 17th, from 10:00 A.M. to 2:00 P.M.**

Every part of the oven or stove which may have been reached by food during the year, must be thoroughly cleaned and scraped. The oven and range must then be heated to a glow. Special tin sheets are placed over the top of the range.

Our Rabbis will be glad to answer questions concerning Passover laws.

Fast of the First-Born

Every first born should fast on Erev Passover, in thankfulness to G-d for having spared the first born of the Israelites when he smote those of the Egyptians. One may, however, forgo the fast if he participate in the customary "Siyum Bechorim" which takes place right after the Morning Services on Wednesday. Eruv Tavshilin

The appropriate blessing and recitation must be made Wednesday afternoon after taking a piece of matzah and some cooked food.

PASSOVER DIRECTORY AVAILABLE IN OUR OFFICE

The @ Passover Directory this year lists a record of 275 kosher products. It is printed in handy pocket size and includes a guide for the preparation of a kosher-for-Passover home. You may pick up your copy in our office.

To make certain that one does not violate the laws of chometz, food or beverages require strict supervision in keeping with the Jewish law. It is a sad fact that some unscrupulous merchants have been known to take advantage of the public by using labels "kosher le-Pesach" indiscriminately.

PASSOVER — AND THE UNITED JEWISH APPEAL

The average American citizen never meets any of the thousands of Jewish newcomers entering Israel. The average Israeli citizen, on the other hand sees such new-comers every day and is deeply affected in his personal life by their problems and by the problems which their presence creates.

Even if he wanted to, the Israeli citizen could not ignore the newcomers. For the fact of mass immigration affects his daily living. Many things he buys, carry an immigration tax. He may worry about the over-crowded conditions in the classrooms where his children study, about the cramped living conditions in Israel, and about the difficulty of improving these conditions.

The situation is so critical because Israel plans on receiving 100,000 immigrants during the current year instead of an expected 55,000. A great part of the cost of this huge immigration and resettlement will be borne by funds of the United Jewish Appeal, but the brunt of the burden is that of the people of Israel and their Government. This burden of immigration—coupled with the task of defense provision—grows constantly. Yet the people of Israel have

determined that no matter what the cost, the doors will remain open. Israel is holding the doors open so that every Jew in a danger zone who has a chance to escape can do so before the opportunity disappears.

The chance for freedom and safety can be lost, however if UJA agencies do not get enough money to transport and resettle emigrants while they can still leave. Each \$1,000 raised for the Emergency Rescue Fund means another life saved.

The United Jewish Appeal Committee for the West Side Institutional Synagogue will launch its 1962 campaign at a dinner to be held on Wednesday evening, May 9, in our own Ballroom. The dinner will honor our Director William Foont.

Israel is calling upon her brothers and sisters and she expects each and every one of us to do our full duty.
