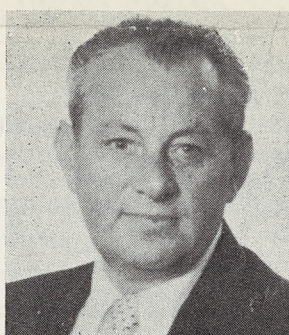

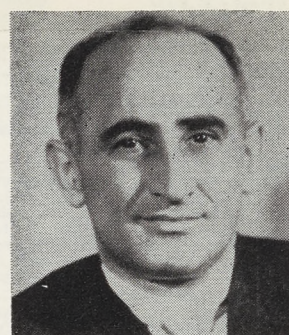
DR. FRANK E. FINK

FIRST CHANUKAH CANDLE THURSDAY EVE., NOVEMBER 30

Chanukah commemorates one of the major turning points in Jewish history. In the year 168 B.C.E., the Syrian Emperor Antiochus Epiphanus launched a campaign of religious persecution against the Jews. His soldiers desecrated the Holy Temple in Jerusalem. For three years Judah the Maccabee led a valiant army of loyal followers against the mighty Syrian legions. After routing

the enemy hordes, they rededicated the Holy Temple and reestablished the traditional worship. This consecration was celebrated for eight days. To this day we kindle Chanukah lamps to celebrate not only the events of the hoary past but also as a symbol of the Almighty's mighty deeds throughout the ages.

The first candle is placed at the extreme right of the Menorah. Each night

following, an additional candle is placed to the left of the previous one. However, the order of lighting the candles is from left to right — so that the added candle is kindled first.

On Friday (the candles should be large enough to last over an hour) we light the Chanukah candles *before* the Sabbath candles; on Saturday night the Chanukah candles are kindled at home after Havdalah is made.

CARMEN

Georges Bizet was the son-in-law and pupil of Jaques Halévy (the Levite), composer of La Juive (the Jewess). Although he lived only to the age of thirty-seven, he created one of the world's great operatic masterpieces. He could not have been aware of the tremendous popularity his Carmen would achieve, for he died only three months after its first performance. In fact, the reception by the critics was less than luke-warm; but, as is not uncommon, this is but another instance of where the critics were wrong. The opera as generally performed today is in many respects at variance with the original work by Bizet, with additions, deletions and a bit of editing by his intimate friend, Ernest Guiraud. However, this year's production by the Metropolitan Opera Company has reverted largely to the original version as presented at its first performance by the Opera Comique in Paris. The New York City Opera Company continues to give the more frequently presented version which has become more traditional.

THE STORY

ACT I

A public square in Seville. The curtain rises after a prelude containing some of the principal motives which appear later in the opera. Noon is approaching; a group of dragoons is idling near a guardhouse and townspeople are walking through the square. Micaela enters glancing about and informs Morales, who approaches her flirtatiously, that she is looking for Don José. She leaves on learning that he is not there but will arrive with the changing of the guard. A band of street urchins mimics the dragoons as the new group, including José enters on the scene.

The noon bell sounds in the nearby cigarette factory from which pours a stream of working girls, smoking as they approach their young men. The last to come out is Carmen, flirting with the field as she sings in a carefree manner. She receives many anxious glances, but is puzzled and attracted by José's indifference. Just before reentering the factory, she plucks a rose from her hair and flings it at the startled corporal.

Micaela returns with news and a letter from José's mother. He looks at her and

listens to her message, but the poison of Carmen's charms is already at work on his mind. Micaela has hardly left when a highly excited group of girls issues from the factory. Carmen and another girl, Manuelita, had gotten into a serious fight and the questioning indicated that Carmen had been the provocator and had struck the first blow. Captain Zuniga orders her arrest and delegates José to take her to prison. With her captor already under her spell, he is a willing collaborator to her escape. He secretly loosens the bonds on her wrists and as he leads her away, Carmen, at the proper moment, pushes José and gets away after having arranged to meet at the inn of Lillas Pastia. Amidst the taunts of the crowd, Zuniga places José under arrest for permitting Carmen to escape.

ACT II

The tavern of Lillas Pastia. A month has passed since the episode of Carmen's escape and José's imprisonment. The curtain rises after a brief entr'acte. Carmen is the center of attraction of the admiring customers of the tavern, entertaining them with her gypsy song. The end of her song is soon followed by enthusiastic shouts, heralding the arrival of Escamillo, the great matador. It takes little more than a glance to add him to Carmen's list of conquests. When he leaves after a short stay, the crowd follows just as the children did in the can of the Pied Piper.

All is now quiet in the inn and the four smugglers congregated there invite Carmen to join their next operation. She must reluctantly refuse, she tells them, because of her love for José. The corporal's voice is heard in the distance, coming nearer until he rushes in to embrace Carmen. A bugle call is heard and José tells Carmen that it means he must return to his barracks. Carmen greets the announcement in a fury. In reply, he takes the rose Carmen had given him from his tunic and in the famous flower song he tells how this flower brought him solace in prison.

Zuniga breaks in on the scene and, finding José there, taunts him into a fight. The two men are separated by Carmen's friends and Zuniga is dragged off. José is now left with little choice and, in a spirit of resignation, he joins the group of smugglers and becomes an outlaw.

ACT III

The mountain camp of the smugglers. As the music of the entr'acte fades away, the curtain goes up on the smugglers'

camp in the mountain. Some time has passed since the meeting at Lillas Pastia's, enough time to cool her ardor for José, who is now plagued by the life he has assumed and the one he has left behind. Nevertheless, he swears his undying love for Carmen. Carmen's friends, Frasquita and Mercedes are engaged in reading their fortunes as told by the cards, which hold out for them a future of lovers with great wealth. When Carmen lays out the cards to read what the future has in store for her, they speak only of death.

As the smugglers all leave, Micaela enters hard upon their heels, seeking José. She is startled by a shot which José has fired at Escamillo, who has come in search of Carmen. They engage in a fight with knives which is broken up by Carmen and her friends. The Treador leaves with a jaunty air and an invitation to everyone to see him in his next bullfight in Seville.

Micaela is discovered in hiding and informs José that his mother is dying and pleads with him to come back to her. José prepares to leave with Micaela but angrily promises the sneering Carmen that they will meet again. At the sound of Escamillo's voice in the distance, Carmen attempts to rush out to meet him, but is prevented by a menacing José, who departs followed by a slow exit of the smugglers as the curtain falls.

ACT IV

Outside the bull ring. A brilliant entr'acte precedes the rising of the curtain upon the final act. The entrance of Escamillo in his splendid toreador garb accompanied by a dazzling Carmen is greeted by a wildly exuberant crowd. Before entering the 'Plaza' with the crowd, Frasquita and Mercedes warn Carmen that they have seen a menacing José nearby.

Even in the face of her approaching doom, Carmen professes no fear and can concentrate her thoughts only upon Escamillo, her latest passion. As the entire ensemble exits to the arena, José appears with burning eyes and pleading voice. The shouts from the bull ring mingle with the pleas of José as Carmen continues to spurn him and repeat her love for the toreador. In a final display of contempt, Carmen removes from her finger the ring José had given her and flings it at him.

As excited cheers come from the arena, Carmen attempts to force her way past José to join the crowd. José, now bereft of all reason, plunges his knife into Carmen's heart. The throng pouring out from the arena finds José kneeling over Carmen's prostrate body. Through his tears and sobs, one can almost hear him say to himself, as Canio did at the end of Pagliacci, "La comedia è finita."
